

From

Today is the Feast of the Epiphany. In our first reading, Isaiah offers the people hope as they rebuild after the exile



and he paints a marvelous picture of a new Jerusalem, resplendent in glory and radiant with joy. God's light shining upon it, within it, makes the city light for the nations. The exiles begin to return, countless people stream toward the city, an abundance of good things flows in for their benefit. He personifies Jerusalem as a woman who radiates light, while darkness and clouds envelop other nations. Jerusalem, like a mother, welcomes all people as her returning children.

The image of the ideal king becomes God's plan for the hopes of all creation to unite all peoples. The author expresses the breadth of this unity by coining words with the prefix *syn* ("together" or "co.") The Gentiles are now co-heirs with the Jews, members of the same body. The reign of this king is more ideal than anyone imagined. Ephesians presents revelation as a unifying process initiated by the Father, realized by the Son, and developed by the Spirit in the church. Gentiles are now joint heirs of the inheritance, members of the same body and beneficiaries of Jesus' promise.

Matthew is the only one to tell us the story of the Magi, just as Luke is the only author to tell us the story of the birth of Jesus. It is not found in any of the other gospels. Our account today is a combination of a star and a dream. After the angel of the Annunciation and the dream of Joseph, God's wonders continue, so we can fix our faith on the one who comes, on the basis of the testimony of a guiding star and a dream. The signs God sends have a character of light and clarity but, at the same time, of subtlety. Throughout the gospels, from the Annunciation to the Resurrection, there is always room for uncertainty and the challenge of faith. What would the doubting Thomas answer to the report of the Bethlehem star? We have to ask how could the Magi see something that no one else has seen? Matthew teaches, through

the Magi's experience, that God is not found without leaving the routine and following something as tenuous as a star and a dream.

Our Food Pantry served 474 families for a total of 1,577 people during the month of November. That number includes 207 children and 98 elderly people. We distributed 9,959 pounds of food at a cost to the parish of \$331.62. The amount of food is particularly high because of Thanksgiving and the distribution of Thanksgiving turkeys and trimmings. Once again, the parish incurred no cost because of your ongoing generous support of the Food Pantry. Whenever you help one of God's poor—his most precious people—he tends to forget a lot of our failings and shortcomings.

A radical overhaul in the nation's third largest diocese could shutter many of Chicago's houses of worship by 2030 as it deals with decaying buildings and an anticipated shortage of priests. Chicago archbishop Cardinal Blasé Cupich told priests in a recent meeting that studies anticipate a total of 240 priests available in 2030 for the archdiocese's 351 parishes. It is estimated that as many as 100 churches could close over the next 14 years. At the present time, approximately a quarter of Chicago parishes are subsidized by the archdiocese. One such church is the Polish parish of St. Adalbert's. Modeled after St. Paul's Basilica in Rome, the parish features Italian marble, stained-glass windows and one of the world's largest Kimball pipe organs. Its 185 foot towers are the highest structure in the neighborhood. But in recent years they have been crumbling and \$3 million needs to be raised to repair them. Parish membership has declined dramatically.

We keep reading of this process throughout the Northeast and in the northern United States, but are there not other possible answers? What if we opened priesthood to married clergy, what if we ordained women deacons, what if we engaged the laity, particularly women, in more decision making? Could we not possibly revive these dying parishes, see more young people attend and breathe new life into the church?

As we begin the new year, it's hard to realize that St. Patrick's Parish will be 182 years old this

year. When the parish began in 1837 the church was a small wooden building on the east side of German Street, just north of East Fourth St. That building was replaced in 1849 when the second St. Patrick's Church was built and stood where the present rectory stands. When the Diocese of Erie was established in 1852, that second church became the pro-cathedral of the diocese and the bishops lived in a house at East Fifth and Holland Sts. The present St. Peter's Cathedral opened in 1892 and the present St. Patrick's Church was built between 1903 and 1906. The exterior walls, roof and windows of St. Patrick's were in place in one year and it then took Italian craftsmen another two years to finish the interior. The Stations were hand-carved from hemlock in 1892-93 in Munich, Germany at a cost of \$600 each. In 1903, Father Peter Cauley had the architect design the church around the Stations. The architect, William Ginther, designed 85 churches in Ohio and Pennsylvania. Among them are Erie's St. Ann's and St. Andrew's, St. Stephen in Oil City and Holy Rosary in Johnsonburg.

Thank you for your incredibly generous response to the Shining Star program for inner city children through St. Martin's Center. 



Cleaning of the Stations of the Cross By Dan Brewer

St. Patrick Church ~ Stations of the Cross

The Stations of the Cross in St. Patrick's Church are unique in the entire world. There is another set - in St. Anthony's Chapel in Pittsburgh - but they are smaller and much less detailed than are these. The Stations were hand carved in Munich, Germany, in 1892 and 1893. Each Station is made from two pieces of hickory wood. When they were created, they were life-size which shows you how much we have grown in the past 130 years. Father Peter Cauley commissioned them at a cost of \$600 each. An engraved plague is located at the base of each one telling who donated it. Today they are insured for \$4.6 million. There are two additional unique features to the Stations. You will notice tears in the eyes of many of the statues. We only discovered these when we put new lighting in during the church restoration in 2012. Secondly, if you go to the Fourth Station, you will notice that the Roman soldier is not wearing a traditional Roman military hat, but, instead, is adorned with a Bavarian hat which would have been worn in Munich at that time. The Stations were then put into storage until Father Cauley could find an architect to design St. Patrick's Church around them. The church was built between 1903 and 1906.
