From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today the church celebrates the manifestation of Christ to all the world, beginning with a reading that overflows with light, radiance and glory. This passage comes from the last section of Isaiah (chapters 56-66) which was written about the time of Judah's release from Babylonian captivity and their return to the Promised Land, around 586 BC. Twice in the first two verses, Isaiah uses the Hebrew word kabod, translated "glory." This term indicates an outward manifestation of divine presence, nearly equivalent to God himself. The earlier prophet Ezekiel, deported among the first wave of exiles to Babylonian, saw a vision of the glory leaving the temple, a sign that Judah's final desolation had begun, because without God's saving presence, the city lay vulnerable to attack. But Isaiah now announces that not only will they return to their land but that the "glory" of God will again dwell in their midst; and that foreign lands will notice this new glory.

Though our second reading is labeled "Ephesians," the letter does not focus on a specific community, but was written for circulation among a number of local churches in Asia Minor. It stresses that the Israel of the new age embraces both Jew and Gentile. Paul speaks of the mystery of the gospel; but the Greek word *mysterium* points to much more than something difficult to understand. The mystery encompasses God's plan of salvation, ultimately revealed in Jesus, and it is completed in one united Body of Christ on earth, both Jew and Gentile.

Matthew addresses a Jewish audience, many of whom did not envision Gentiles as part of salvation. Jewish purity laws of the first century prohibited all contact with non-Jews. By the time MT writes in 85 AD, many Gentiles had converted, but tensions remained. Listen and you will hear MT show how Jesus fulfills the prophecies. Magi come from the East which makes it clear that they are Gentiles. In ancient times, a great star heralded a royal birth. MT quotes Micah that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem, the city of David. In a few sentences he shows how Jesus is the fulfillment of all OT prophecies. He very cleverly includes both Jew and Gentile in the birth of the Messiah.

During a recent homily, Pope Francis said that eternal damnation is not a torture chamber but distance from God. And those who will not be received in the kingdom of God, he said, it's because they have not drawn close to the Lord. These are the people who journeyed along their own path, distancing themselves from the Lord and passing in front of the Lord but then choosing to walk away from Him. "Eternal damnation," he said, "is continually distancing oneself from God. It is the worst pain, an unsatisfied heart, a heart that was created to find God but which, out of arrogance and self-confidence, distances itself from God."

Bishop Robert McElroy of San Diego has asked his priests to encourage Catholics who are divorced and remarried to consider whether "God is calling them to return to the Eucharist." He instructed pastors to post notices in parish bulletins, inviting divorced and remarried Catholics to "utilize the internal forum of conscience" in making their decisions whether they should receive Communion. He also said that parishes should welcome gay and lesbian couples and couples cohabitating before marriage. He said that the recent diocesan Synod "pointed to the need to invite young couples lovingly, non-judgmentally, and energetically into Catholic marriage and to provide mentors for them." The Synod said that parishes should provide a supportive environment for these couples and that this attitude might require reconsideration of "practices which, while they have a certain legitimacy, alienate

many people.

The coming year is going to prove to be an exciting one for all of us living in the East Bayfront neighborhood. Erie Insurance recently announced the construction of a new \$132 million office complex just two blocks south of us. In addition, UPMC Hamot just announced the construction of a seven story \$111 million addition to the hospital which will be located just two blocks north of us. What was once a highly blighted neighborhood is coming miraculously back to life. Drive through the neighborhood and see some of the improvements. Over 60 blighted homes have been demolished; others have been restored; two grand old mansions at 6th and Parade have been meticulously restored by Erie Insurance; there are over 35 new homes in the neighborhood and Erie Insurance transformed a boarded up armory into a gleaming office complex. And two of the anchors in the neighborhood are St. Patrick's church and the neighboring Russian Church of the Nativity. If you have never seen the inside of that church, make sure you do sometime. It is one of the gems of Erie with magnificent icons and paintings, and it's onion shaped gold leaded dome is visible throughout the entire neighborhood.

Have you ever thought of including your parish in your estate planning? Both the church and the rectory at St. Patrick's are over a hundred years old and require constant maintenance at great expense. The church is one of the most beautiful in the diocese, and we want to maintain it that way. A remembrance in your will could help.

- 3. Monitor all programs for the safety of children and youth.
- 4. Be aware of and sensitive to what is going on in the lives of children.
