


From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time. The exile is officially over, and the Jews returning to their home coun-



try expect the restoration of the sovereignty of Judah promised by the prophets. The return was not immediately accompanied by joy, however. The once-defeated Jerusalem, slow to recover from the recent disaster, remains a palpable sign of God's distance. But the prophet is not carried away by sadness; on the contrary, he announces the salvation that God will fulfill among his people. The relationship between God and the people will imitate the true love that unites wife and husband. The prophetic voice infuses hope. The people, personified by the city of Jerusalem, is God's beloved fiancé. He will not abandon her. The prophet speaks of a wedding feast between God and his people.

Paul displays the character of the spiritual gifts which flow from the one Spirit. The accent on the "same Spirit," "the same Lord,": "the same God," contrasts with the diversity of the gifts, which are manifestations of the Spirit for the common good. Paul notes that everyone shares in the gifts and we need to recognize them in others. The body of Christ is no place for envy or ill will, distributed according to God's will.

Two scenes help us grasp the meaning of the wedding feast of Cana. The first goes back to Genesis and the couple leaving paradise, where abundant water fertilized and refreshed the garden. In this departure from paradise, nothing is cheerful. In another scene, woman and man meet again. The woman stands facing the cross, and the voice from the cross, "Woman, there is your son," echoes his own voice at Cana, "Woman, what can we do?" Just as Cana abounds in water, transformed into wine, two fountains, water and blood, springs from the pierced body of Christ. Cana represents the marriage covenant between God and his people. The transformation of water from the stone jars into wine is the quality of life we find in and with

Christ. We no longer feel abandoned and our land is no longer devastated (first reading) because we are espoused to God who cares about us and gets involved in our lives. The first reading and the gospel share the prophetic theme of the wedding between God and his people as a covenant of love. Despite our infidelities, God constantly renews his covenant.

A new statistical analysis seeks to contextualize data about child sexual abuse by Catholic clergy in Pennsylvania. The analysis was done by the Philadelphia law firm Lewis Roca Rothgerber Christie, LLP. The Grand Jury report claimed to have identified more than 1,000 victims of 301 credibly accused priests and notes a devastating portrait of cover-up by church authorities. The statistical analysis focused on 690 allegations over an 84 year period from 1934 to the present. The remaining cases, the analysis said, were so "deficient" that they could not be included. Since 2003, 23 new cases emerged or 3% of the total. By way of comparison, the authors write that in 2016, the PA Department of Human Services identified more than 3,000 total substantiated allegations, more than three times the number of total allegations against the Catholic Church, identified by the Grand Jury over an eighty year period.

"What is true in Pennsvlvania is also true on a national level," the analysis reads, noting that nationally, 24.7 percent of women and 16 percent of men have experienced childhood sexual abuse. "Evidence shows that sexual abuse of minors is a huge epidemic that touches every major institution in society. Further, by all accounts, few institutions have done as much as the Catholic Church to learn from past failures and take steps to prevent abuse going forward." Citing a 2007 New York Times report, the analysis says that "Insurance companies receive 260 reports per vear of sexual abuse of a minor in U.S. Protestant churches. This annual number is more than the total accusations against Catholic clergy since 2005." And according to a 2004 Education Week study, 290,000 students experienced some sort of physical sexual abuse by a public school employee from 1991 to 2000.

None of this information is intended to make light

of the devastation imposed upon children by abusive clergy and the cover-up by inept bishops; but merely intended to show how widespread and horrific is the sexual abuse of children in our country.

Have you ever considered remembering your parish in your estate planning? We established the St. Patrick's Foundation which exists solely for the maintenance and upkeep of the church. None of that money can be spent on operating expenses. We presently have a little over a hundred thousand dollars in it, and I would love to see it grow so that we can be assured of the ongoing maintenance of the church. Perhaps a gift from your estate could be directed to the Foundation.

We recently received our assessment for the 2019 Catholic Services Appeal: \$87,561. This makes us the fifth highest assessment in the diocese with Our Lady of Peace first, then St. George's, St. Jude's and Queen of the World, St. Mary's being the only parishes having higher assessments. Any funds raised above the assessment remain in the parish and the diocesan Finance Office reports that \$1.5 million remained in the parishes. At St. Patrick's, we had an assessment of \$81,400 and raised \$113,000 leaving \$31,600 in the parish.

Lawyers and judges in Erie donated over 80 \$60 gift cards from Walmart which are being distributed through St. Martin's Center. Atty. Andy Sisinni coordinates this each year.

- 1. Log in to your Online Giving donor account.
- Click on "View My Giving History & Tax Information." View a detailed History of your past Online Giving.
- 3. On the right side, click the "**Print**" button.
- 4. Set your date range from 1/1/2018 to 12/31/2018.
- 5. Change the report type to "Full Detail Report (Tax Purposes)."
- 6. Leave the tax filter option checked.
- 7. Click "Print."
- 8. Your report will open a new window
- 9. You will need to export the report to a PDF to print the full report.

To print, click on the PDF link at the top of the screen. This will open the report as a PDF and will let you print the report. Make sure you have your pop-up blocker disabled.
