

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. In the 8th century BC, the ever-expanding and brutal Assyrian empire invaded the northern kingdom



of Israel. The military brought such devastation to land and people that darkness seemed to shroud everything. It is in that context that Isaiah announces that the gloom will be transformed to light. Though the people are still suffering, Isaiah uses verbs that sound as if the darkness has already been dispelled. The first biblical reference to darkness occurs in the creation account when darkness covers the abyss. God's word, "Let their be light," was the first act of creation. In another manifestation of divine power, God will dispel all the darkness, gloom and distress in which wartorn Israel dwells. In the second part of his prophecy, Isaiah speaks directly to the Lord who is the source of light. God's gift of light brings such joy that Isaiah uses three images to describe it. First, the peoples' joy is comparable to the rejoicing at the harvest. In a second image, the people make merry in dividing spoils. Rather than being plunged into the darkness of defeat, they rejoice in the rewards of victory. The final image is the relief of being freed from the weight of yoke, pole and rod, all instruments of servitude and oppression.

Beginning with the opening chapter of his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul addresses a major problem in the Corinthian community: the lack of unity. He uses both positive and negative terminology to look at the situation from various angles. Paul summarized the positive perspective in the verse just before today's reading, telling the church that they have been called into fellowship with Christ. Since communion with Christ is at the heart of their faith, believers should agree in what they say, and be united in mind and purpose. Paul has learned of the division from Chloe, the only time we hear of him and most likely the head of one of the local churches. Some put their trust in Paul, Apollos or Cephas and Paul says no; our trust is in Christ. The Good News does not rest on human wisdom, but on Christ.

After his baptism by John and his temptations in

the dessert, Jesus begins his public ministry in Galilee, a region with a large number of gentiles dating back to the Assyrian conquest and resettling of foreigners. The area was under the control of Herold Antipas, who had already arrested John the Baptism. According to Matthew, Jesus' reason for withdrawing from the area of Zebulun and Naphtali was to fulfill Isaiah's prophecy heard in today's first reading. He begins in the village of Capernaum, a fishing village on the shore of the Sea of Galilee. He begins his preaching by calling for repentance, just as had John. In the next scene he encounters Simon and Andrew and Matthew calls our attention to the power of Jesus' word and the immediacy of a response. He tells them they will continue to be fishermen, but now their catch will be people.

The annual Peter's Pence collection -- monies donated by Catholics around the world and given to the pope for charitable work—has been declining in past years. In 2017, the appeal brought in 60 million euros; last year, it produced 50 million, a drop of 17%. The Vatican itself is also operating in the red. Last year saw a deficit of 70 million euros. There are reports in the European press that much of the Peter's Pence money is not being used for charity, but to help with the operating expenses of the Vatican.

We have a difficult time heating the first floor of the rectory during these winter months. The upper two floors are fine, but the first floor is always cold. In my office, for example, the only heat is that which comes from the fireplace. Some years ago, someone removed all the radiators on the first floor and replaced them with baseboard heating. That system is simply not working, and so we are removing it and putting radiators back in. My apartment on the third floor is nice and toasty warm with the radiators (and, of course. heat rises); but the first floor is always cold. We have separate heating units in the kitchen and the living room which work very well, so we will not be putting new radiators in there, but we will in the main office, my office, the conference room, the Finance office, etc.

The parish recently received a check in the amount of \$2,050 from the diocese. That money comes each year from the Cauley Trust which was established in the 1940s by the last remaining Cauley brother. They were priests here from 1892 until the last one died in 1954. Have you

ever considered remembering the parish in your estate planning? The St. Patrick Endowment exists at the Catholic Foundation for the sole purpose of maintaining St. Patrick's Church. The monies in that fund cannot be used for any other purpose. To date we've been able to built it up to approximately \$250,000.

Employees of Wabtech donated \$2,500 to our Food Pantry at Christmas. That is incredibly generous of them.

Cardinal Reinhard Marx, head of the German Bishops Conference, has expressed the view that homosexual couples can receive a church blessing "in the sense of a pastoral accompaniment" in the Catholic Church, but not in a manner that resembles marriage. The Archbishop of Munich and Freising said, "I can bless them both in the sense of pastoral accompaniment, we can pray together. But theirs cannot be a marriage-like relationship." He said he told the Vatican Synod on the Family in 2015 that homosexual couples, who are faithful to each other and support each other. should not be "negatively bracketed" by the Church or told by the Church that stable homosexual relationships are considered worthless. He also stressed that a homosexual union "is not a marriage" in the Catholic sense of the word, and that the sacrament of marriage is between a man and a woman.

Marx also commented on the sacramental ordination of women and said that Pope Francis told him "the door is closed," given Pope John's Paul's statement in 1994. "Nonetheless, said the German cardinal, "debate on the issue is not over." Archbishop Koich of Berlin said that both hetero and homosexuality are normal."
