

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The account of Jeremiah's vocation tells of the prophet's twofold convic-



tion. He is conscious of being an ambassador to foreign nations, even while his own people reject him. The prophet's first task is to trust in God's Word, taught to him from his youth. Throughout his life, he will contend with civil authorities who endanger the people's freedom and with religious authorities who place their trust in the temple and external cult, while Jeremiah preaches a religion of the heart. But he remains faithful to his vocation in the face of adversity. He will doubt, but the believer in him stands up and speaks. And God reassures him, "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you."

Paul's hymn to love adds another layer to this Sunday's themes. No other gift, not even faith or hope, outshines love that will never pass away, because it shares in and expresses God's very life. Love, the foundation of all, never fails; it is patient and enduring. Love allows Jeremiah and Jesus to endure suffering and persecution. Knowledge of God's love, even though seen as "in a mirror," inspires trust in God's rescue and praise of God's justice. In the final analysis, love is what really counts. Paul does not use the Greek word eros, understood as possessive desire that seeks its own good. He spells out agape, understood as charity of compassion, that is, love that spreads outwards and does not keep for itself.

In the gospel we hear the outrage of people to his placing himself among the prophetic line of Elijah and Elisa, who spared outsiders from starvation and healed a foreigner's leprosy. The reaction is so strong that it will ultimately result in his expulsion from the city, his death on Calvary and his Resurrection. We're told that "Jesus passed through them" and went away. Throughout his ministry, Jesus will face Israel's disbelief; he will extend the gospel beyond the people's customary boundaries. There is a parallel between the

the first reading and the gospel. Both Jeremiah and Jesus speak against the tide, as they emphasize the extent of God's goodness; yet they are rejected by many of their audience because they do not flatter them. Today's readings refer to the prophetic vocation. The prophet is one who has an experience of God, so the divine word possesses him or her to such a degree that nothing prevents them from bearing witness.

A new study, "Going, Going, Gone: The Dynamics of Catholic Disaffiliation," studied why young American Catholics are leaving the church. The report says that a third of them leave because of church teaching on matters such as same-sex marriage, which they see as "an issue of social justice and human dignity, not an issue of sexuality." Some 87 percent of respondents to the study said that nothing the church could do would bring them back.

Mass attendance in once all-Catholic Chile has declined from 16 percent in 2010 to eight percent this year. The poll also showed that the number of people identifying as Catholic had fallen from 70 percent in 2006 to 58 percent in 2018. Even more frightening is that only 15 percent of the remaining faithful say they trust the church. The poll involved interviews with 2,011 people. Chile has been racked by perhaps the largest sex abuse scandal in the world.

Our parish Food Pantry served 421 families during the month of December. That number included 197 children and 86 elderly. They distributed 8,223 pounds of food at a cost to the parish of \$260.25. Once again, we did not incur any costs because of your ongoing generous support of the Food Pantry. Thank you for helping some people who simply don't have the skills to help themselves.

Speaking of the Food Pantry, the work is finished on replacing the supports under the floor and the installation of a new laminate floor. They did a beautiful job and it should be good for another hundred years!

When we carpeted the balcony, we only carpeted the east and west side and left the area in front of the pipe organ as a wooden floor. The company who restored the pipe organ strongly recommended our doing this saying that the carpet in the area would absorb too much of the sound of the pipe organ; whereas flooring would allow the sound to bounce off and be better. What we did was put a laminate floor in that area; but we are also blocking that area off so that people are not in there. This allows Mark more freedom to play the organ as well as not having some of the sound absorbed by people's clothing.

At their next meeting, I'm going to ask the Parish Council to approve another concert on the Jacox Memorial Pipe organ, hopefully sometime in the fall. The concert we had this past October with an organist from Chicago was very well received, and we would like to do another one. The same organist is willing to come and play. I think particularly over the Christmas holiday, you had a chance to hear the organ in all its glory. What a great gift this has been to the parish from Morgan and Kathy Jacox.

The German bishops conference will meet in May and the agenda item is an open discussion of celibacy. They have invited a number of professional people to address their gathering on the subject as well as a number of women. These guests are being asked to analyze the subject of celibacy. Last November the lay Central Committee of German Catholics voted by a large majority to abolish mandatory celibacy for priests. Pope Francis said recently that he is not open to optional celibacy but would consider ordaining older married men in areas of extreme shortage. Next October's Synod of Bishops will address the Amazon and high on that agenda is further discussion of celibacy as there is such a shortage of priests in that area of the world.

Moses is praying to God to release his people from bondage when the voice of God booms from the clouds, "Moses, I have good news and bad news." "What's the good news?" asks Moses. "If the Pharaoh will not let my people go, I will send down a rain of frogs, a plague of locusts, and I will turn the Nile to blood." "Wow," says Moses. "And if Pharaoh's army pursues you," continues God, "I shall open a path for you in the Red Sea and then close it again and drown his army." "That's incredible," says Moses, "but what's the bad news?" "Before I can do this, you must write an environmental impact study."




