Today is the First Sunday of Lent. Many stories in the ancient world tell of a great flood, but only the biblical sto-



ry weaves into it God's profound mercy which exceeds our sinfulness. After the flood, the first thing Noah does is offer a sacrifice to the Lord. When God smells the sweet odor of Noah's sacrifice, he promises never to doom the earth again because of human sin. Our narrative opens with God making a covenant with humanity. It is not simply repeating the original blessing given to the first man and woman; but now God establishes a covenant not only with Noah, but with his descendants and every living creature that comes out of the ark.

The first letter of Peter was a circular letter that was sent to various Christian communities. Today's reading provided essential teachings about Christ for the communities in Asia Minor. It is widely believed that this passage was used both for catechesis as well as in the early liturgy. In the verses just preceding today's reading, Peter wrote about the suffering people experience, particularly because of righteousness. Peter is reminding his readers that Christ, the righteous one, suffered for the sake of the unrighteous. Peter teaches about baptism and makes reference to the image of water by which the righteous in Noah's day were saved. That water prefigures baptism and becomes a theme in the Sundays of Lent as we prepare the elect for immersion into baptismal waters at the Easter Vigil.

Matthew, Mark and Luke all tell of Jesus' temptation before entering public ministry. The account in Mark is by far the shortest. Without describing how Satan tempted Jesus, as Matthew and Luke will do, Mark's brief scene sets the stage for what will happen later in the life of Jesus. Satan is not the only one who will tempt Jesus. "Get behind me, Satan," Jesus says to Peter when he tries to keep Jesus from completing his journey to Jerusalem. As Jesus resisted the tempter in the wild, he will resist Peter's misguided urging, as well as

every other temptation to turn from the will of his Father. Mark has Jesus begin his public ministry with the proclamation, "This is the time of fulfillment." Throughout Jewish history, people had always asked, "Is this the time of fulfillment?" As Mark's gospel unfolds, the answer becomes clearer: the kingdom of God is manifest in Jesus' words and actions. The response, so different from what they were expecting, is repentance and belief.

The annual Catholic Service Appeal begins today. This annual appeal generates 60% of the income for the diocese and partially funds St. Martin's Center, Catholic Charities, etc. It also provides for the Bishop's Breakfast, hot cooked meal prepared every morning for homeless people. Up to a hundred meals are served every morning.

Our goal at St. Patrick's this year is \$81,359. Any money generated above that remains in the parish. Last year we had an assessment of \$74,000 and generated \$115,000 which gave the parish \$41,000 in income. This year our goal is \$120,000 and if we meet it, we will again generate \$39,000 for the parish.

I'm hoping that each of you will support this appeal. I only ask that you do what you can. Some can't do anything and I understand that. Others can be very generous, and you always are. You can make a pledge and pay it monthly or pay the full amount at once.

Lent is not observed in all Christian churches but only in the Catholic, Anglican, Eastern Orthodox, Lutheran and Methodist churches. Some of the evangelical churches observe it. Others do not.

Lent developed rather slowly in the early church. There was always some form of fasting prior to the celebration of Easter but that only lasted 40 hours, not 40 days. By the mid-third century, the fast was extended to six days and it would only be with the Council of Nicea in 325 that the fast would become 40 days. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at the time of the celebration of the Last Supper on Holy Thursday. Last week's bulletin outlined the suggestions for fast and abstinence during Lent.

A two-year study just released offers a look at why young people are leaving the church as early as the age of 13. Seventy-four percent of the former Catholics interviewed said they decided to leave the church between the ages of 10 and 20. Thirty-five percent of the participants told the researchers that they no longer have a religious affiliation while 14% label themselves as atheists. In addition, 21 percent of young Catholics who left the church say that they are now "born again" or evangelical Christians. Although the "nones," those who have no religious affiliation, represent the largest category of former Catholics, the study revealed that the vast majority still believe in God and desire some type of religious community with which to affiliate. The study further reveals three archetypes for disaffiliation: the injured, the drifter and the dissenter. The "injured" are young people who experienced a tragedy or hardship in which God seemed to be absent. Despite their prayers, for example, their parents divorced or ill family members died. The "drifter" is one who typically had trouble connecting their identity as a baptized Catholic to their concrete life experiences in the real world. They struggled to articulate why being Catholic matters. The "dissenters" are those who reject the faith most likely citing the church's sexual ethic as in conflict with their own. Notably, only two percent cited the clergy sex abuse scandal as a reason they left the church. Only 17% of those interviewed said they attended Mass regularly while they were Catholic and almost 80% did not attend a Catholic school.

A special thanks to chairperson Angie Kontur and all who volunteered to organize and staff our recent Homeless Shelter. For some reason, this year saw a surge in homeless women which presented several challenges such as providing a separate area for them to sleep, providing time for showers, etc. Parishioners volunteered to be at the Shelter throughout the night, others prepared a hot evening meal for the guests, etc. I am so proud of the social outreach of this parish.
