From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Second Sunday of Lent and read from Genesis. God had previously promised Abram that he would become a great nation. In the verses before this reading, Abram is lamenting the fact that he has grown old and still has no heir. So God reassures him by comparing his future descendants to the number of stars in the sky. But when God promises land, Abram asks for a sign. God complies with an ancient contract ritual that's as alien to us as it is bloody. Animals care cut in half and the people walk between the two halves to signify their willingness to suffer the fate of the animals is either should break to contract. The birds of prey represent threats to the covenant just enacted, but Abram stands guard. Then the "theophany" of divine encounter, deepens. Abram enters into a trance and in the "terrifying darkness," Abram's interaction with God has shifted from dialogue to immersion in aww-inspiring mystery. Abram emerges with no proof of what God will do, but with a deeper faith.

Paul has heard that his hard work among the Philippians is being threatened by false teachers and he writes urgently from prison. Those who argue for ritual of the old Law are negating the efficacy of Christ, and Paul won't stand for it. He asks them to imitate himself who let go of the law to stand on the rock that is Christ. Paul wants to free them from focusing on earthly things via the law and turn their attention to heaven, the place from which will come the savior.

Today we encounter one of the most startling events in the gospels. The man the disciples knew as friend and rabbi is suddenly revealed to a privileged three as God's Son. Remember in the gospels that Peter, James and John enjoy a unique relationship with Jesus and he takes them into his confidence more than anyone else. Today's experience leaves them utterly silent as

they try to digest what has happened.

We welcome Msgr. Casimir Bogniak, retired pastor of Our Lady of Peace, as celebrant of the Masses this weekend.

On Wednesday, March 2, I will begin the first of a three-part Scripture series for Lent. The morning class, from 10—11 AM, will be held in church and will focus on the Passion, Crucifixion and Death of Jesus. We will explore the rather dramatic differences between the four gospels and try to reconcile them so that we might better understand what happened. The evening class, to be held from 6-7 PM, will be an Introduction to the Four Gospels. We will look at the different portraits of Christ which each of the evangelist gives, sometimes dramatically different approaches. There is no charge for the class; all I ask is that you call the rectory office and register so that I know how many hand-outs to give.

If you think Mass attendance among Catholics is down, a recent report shows that less than 2% of the English population now worship in an Anglican church on the average Sunday. Only 12% of births are marked by a baptism and only 31% of deaths were marked by a church funeral.

If you have not yet made a pledge to the 2016 Catholic Services Appeal, can I plead with you to consider doing so? This annual appeal raises funds for Catholic Charities, St. Martin's Center, the diocesan Marriage Tribunal (remember we no longer charge for annulments and so the expenses of this office are coming from the CSA), the added costs of priests retirements, etc. At St. Hedwig's, we have an assessment this year of \$10,910. At St. Patrick's, we have an assessment of \$63,542, up from \$44,000 last year. In light of that sharp increase, I really need your help. Would you consider making a gift. Pledges can be paid at once or over the course of the year.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

Monthly reminders are mailed to all people who are paying on their pledge over a period of time.

If you happen to stop in at St. Patrick's rectory, you will notice that our offices are shining like they haven't in a long time. That is thanks largely to Erie Insurance who have donated new desks. chairs, file cabinets, etc. to us. In addition, we had the main office re-carpeted for the first time in over twenty years. The centerpiece of the main office is a hundred year old desk that belonged to Father Peter Cauley, pastor here from 1892 until his death in 1934 and the priest who built the present church and rectory. That desk had fallen into disrepair, drawers wouldn't open, etc. We've had it completely restored and it is now again being used.

You may also have noticed a large chandelier in the main hall of the first floor of the rectory. Rather dull looking, it dates to 1915 when the house was built. We discover that it is an amazing Waterford crystal chandelier that probably hasn't been cleaned in 50 years. We are restoring it, and you might need sun glasses when it is finished. It is a rather spectacular piece of art.

The next thing to be sent out for restoration is going to be the pastor!

The St. Patrick's Food Pantry distributed 16,314 pounds of food during December. The pantry served 780 families which included 436 elderly and 1,063 children. Total cost to the parish was \$1,942.61, all of which was covered by your ongoing generous support of this work. For the entire year of 2015, we distributed 206,314 pounds of food at a total cost to the parish of \$12,921. Again, your generosity made all of this possible.

The young couples' church discussion group was studying the story of Abraham and Sarah. who in their nineties were blessed with a child. Among other things, the teacher asked, "What lesson do we learn from this story?" A young father raised his hand and said, "They waited until they could afford it!"
