



From

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Lent. In describing God's choice of David as King of Israel, todays first reading rais-



es a familiar theme of the Scriptures: God neither judges nor acts according to human standards. In the previous chapter, God has rejected Saul, the first king, because of his disobedience. The prophet Samuel goes to Jesse and presents each of his seven sons to God beginning with the eldest and God rejects them all. Samuel does not even present the youngest because he is still a shepherd youth. As soon as Jesse brings forth the young shepherd, Samuel declares him the new king and David receives the divine presence. This point emphasizes another important theme in Scripture: anyone given a task by God also received continuing divine power to carry it out.

As a whole, the Letter to the Ephesians focuses on the universality of the church and its unity in Christ. Many scholars suggest that rather than a letter to a particular community, this work is a circular letter written by a later follower of Paul, intended for the entire church. The letter stresses the unity of Christians: the church, including Jews and Gentiles, is one body. All are members of Christ through baptism, living in the one Spirit. Like several other New Testament writers, the author compares life with or without Christ to living in darkness or in the light. The closing phrase, "Awake, O sleeper..." comes from an early hymn used in baptism liturgies.

John's gospel reflects religious tensions of his time. John's repeated negative reference to "the Jews" does not reject the entire Jewish people, but points to those of his time who strongly opposed or rejected belief in Jesus. Among those who rejected Jesus were the Pharisees and they are portrayed in today's reading in a very negative light. In his gospel John will strongly note the need for belief in Jesus. He uses the word 98 times and always as a verb. He contrasts the two attitudes of belief in Jesus or rejection in the

Pharisees and the blind man: those who refuse the Light of the World sink more deeply into darkness, while the blind man, illumined by Christ, comes to see clearly and believes.

Pastors have been notified by the bishop's office that the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday this year cannot begin before 8:30 PM. There is no 5 PM Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday.

From all reports, the transition of many of our parishes into partnership with others or complete merger into others has gone rather smoothly. It was the process that enables this. Parishioners were walked through the process, were listened to, were active participants in the process. What happens now is that any church which was merged into another parish now goes on the tax rolls unless it continues to be used for worship. We pay taxes, for example, on our property, the rectory, parking lots, etc. The only building that is tax exempt is the church building itself. Once that building would cease to be used for worship, it goes on the tax rolls. In addition to taxes, the new parish now has to assume costs of insurance, utilities, maintenance, etc.

There is a company in Hermitage just outside of Sharon that processes a great deal of religious art and artifact that comes from closed churches. There is also a large facility south of Pittsburgh that does the same. In a large number of instances, when a new church is being built in the southeast or the southwest (where population and the migration of others allow the Catholic population to grow), many of those congregations are seeking out some of the artifacts from closed churches and integrating it into their new building. I had a wedding a few years ago in Virginia in a new \$12 million church. All of the stained glass windows were from a shuttered church in New England, a high altar against the back wall of the sanctuary was from a closed church in New Jersev and the Stations of the Cross were from another church that has been closed. I know that at neighboring St. Mary's Church, the stained glass windows have been removed and are in large wooden crates on the church floor. The statues, the huge cross, etc. have all been removed so that there are no religious artifacts in the building.

If you have not yet made a pledge to the 2017 Catholic Services Appeal, can I ask that you consider doing so? This annual appeal is the largest source of revenue for the diocese and funds most of the outreach programs to the poor and needy. We are assessed \$74,000 this year and any funds generated in excess of that amount will remain in the parish. I'm hoping to raise \$100,000 so that we have money to put toward the restoration of our hundred year old pipe organ. We hope to do that work without a capital campaign in the parish.

Congratulations to a number of people who were installed as Knights and Ladies of St. Patrick at a dinner last weekend. Among those installed were four St. Patrick parishioners: Mary Wegelin, Patti Brunner, Debbie Slusarz and Kay Sauers. The people who are installed are given this honor because of their service to both parish and community. Mary Wegelin has run the kitchen at the Irish Festival for more years than any of us can count. Patti Brunner has taken over the financial end of the festival and done an incredible job of tracking income and expenses, showing where we are making money and where we are not. She also supervises the counting and depositing of the money each day of the festival. Debbie Slusarz manages our web page, is one of our Sunday offertory counters and is always ready and willing to help in any way that she can. Kay Sauers is actively involved in the Food Pantry and the Irish Festival. She also bakes the finest pies in the city of Erie as many of us can testify. Whenever I have the bishop and the priests in for a meal, they always ask if we're having one of Kay's pies for dessert. We're blessed to have these four individuals in the parish, and I know you join me in congratulating them on this recognition. The Knights and Ladies sponsor the annual St. Patrick's Day parade and usually undertake financing a parish project each year.
