



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Lent. The people are encamped at Gilgal, the first stop in the Promised Land.



and their Passover celebration enlivens their hope for the future. It is the beginning of a new stage in Israel's history. The manna that fed them in the desert is done; from now on, they will feed on the fruits of the Promised Land, which the Lord has given. There is no need to fear the enemy; the Lord's words indicate a rupture with the past: "Today I have removed the reproach of Egypt from you." The reading highlights three things that are required: obedience to the law, the liturgy, and cultivation in the land for food.

In today's second reading from the Second Letter to the Corinthians we learn the extent of God's gift. God has reconciled us through Christ, who gave his own life to save us from sin, but it is up to us to accept that reconciliation and return to the house of the loving Father in our real, everyday lives. Paul's mandate is precise: "entrusting to us the message of reconciliation...on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." Reconciliation is envisioned, above all, as a re-creation of the believer, a "new creation," resurrected in Christ. Paul's "brothers and sisters," having been reconciled to Christ, are sent to the entire world as "ambassadors for Christ."

Our gospel gives us the greatest story of forgiveness found anywhere in the Scriptures, and it is found only in Luke. The loving father exercises incredible patience with his wayward son, but when the son returns, the elder son separates himself from the family on a principle of mistaken righteousness. Of the three, the eldest son is unable to enjoy the fruits of the family home; instead, he ponders his own virtue, meditating on the kid goat he never requested of his father. Rather than rejoice that his father's dearest hope has been realized, he clings to his resentment and refuses to enter the celebration of his brother's return. The eldest son cannot live in a house where the heart is more important than order and

discipline, where mercy surpasses justice, where the sinner receives forgiveness without reproach? The parable is a story of the boundless love of a Father, who offered his repentant child the gift of unconditional reconciliation. The eldest son reminds us of the need for a change of heart and mind through discovery of the Father's mercy.

The Catholic Church runs approximately 220,000 schools in all pre-university levels throughout the world, educating more than 65 million children. More than half of the registered students are not Catholic and large numbers not even of other Christian churches.

We recently paid our property taxes to the City of Erie which totaled \$3,524.14. We pay taxes on the rectory, the parking lot, any green space, etc. The only area we don't pay taxes on is what is termed "the sanctuary," ie., the church itself. And we have a responsibility to pay our fair share as we benefit endlessly from services rendered by the city.

The Urban Land Institute was invited to Erie by the Jefferson Society, the city of Erie, the Erie Community Foundation and Erie Insurance to provide recommendations based on the panelists' expertise and experience. The problem statement of their report notes that Erie has seen significant loss of jobs over the past several decades, the population of the city has declined to under 100,000 with much of its housing stock vacant or significantly compromised. However, it notes, "amid these severe problems and challenges a remarkable change has begun to unfold. Erie residents are starting to believe in their city again." It noted that in 1970, 40 percent of its job base was in manufacturing. Today it accounts for 15 percent. As manufacturing decreased, Erie diversified into medical, insurance, education and tourism.

Perhaps the most compelling statement in the report is "The Erie community is in trouble owing to problems shared by many older industrial cities. These are deindustrialization, loss of population, and suburbanization. But while these are extremely hard problems to solve, at root, they are technical, garden variety, clearable hurdles.

Far more noteworthy, is that Erie is in trouble less because of loss of jobs and less because of suburbanization and less because of population loss, and less because of petty bickering with the county, than because of the community's tendency towards self-inflicted wounds...in other words, self-defeating habits and attitudes in Erie are what's really in the way of prosperity." No truer words were ever written.

In the block occupied by St. Patrick's Church, the Land Institute recommends taking part of our parking lot on Holland Street, part of Hamot's and then continuing along East Third Street on the Hamot parking lot until the end of it and redeveloping it with new residential row houses and up to 11 new cottage units enclosing the parking lot. Throughout the downtown area, there is a strong effort to expand housing to get professional people living in the area as well as to hide all of the parking lots from public view.

The suggested plan for the entire Modern Tool block would be to provide new and renovated commercial space of 40,000 to 45,000 square feet for the first floor, between 40 and 50 new residential units on the second and third floors, and parking with 105 to 115 spaces.

We're living at an incredibly exciting moment in the history of this city and St. Patrick's Church sits right in the middle of it.

Our Food Pantry served 434 families during the month of February distributing 9,912 pounds of food at a cost to the parish of \$265.02. Once again, as is the case every month, the parish did not have to take money out of our operating budget because of your ongoing generous support of the Food Pantry. Our neighbors at the Russian Orthodox Church also offer a Food Pantry but on a much more limited scale than ours and we have talked about merging them.

A priest is walking down the street when he notices a small boy trying to press the doorbell of a house. Unfortunately, the boy is too small and the doorbell is too high for him to reach. After watching the boy's efforts, the priest walks up behind the little guy and gives the doorbell a solid ring. Crouching down to the little boy's level, the priest smiles and asks him, "And now what, my little friend?" The boy replies, "Now we run like hell."
