

Today is the Second Sunday of Easter. Normally our first reading comes from the OT, but during the Easter season



it will be from Acts of the Apostles. Acts is the story of the early church, beginning in Jerusalem and ending in Rome. Luke intersperses events and speeches with summaries of the church's growth. There are four summaries in the book, the first of which is composed of the teaching of the apostles, the communal life, the breaking of the bread and the prayers. Today's reading is the second summary which describes how the early church grew even after Peter and John had been ordered by the leaders in Jerusalem not to preach in Jesus' name. Today's emphasis is on how they lived a communal life, sharing everything.

In the second reading, John addresses the community as beloved, as believers and as children of God. These three descriptions are intricately woven together, for believing and loving are actions that result in becoming children of God. Believing is a major motif in this reading because of false prophets who were leading people away from the truth. The opening verse stresses a core dimension of the content of Christian belief: Jesus is the Christ, the anointed one of God who fulfilled God's promise of an anointed descendant of King David. The community also believes that Jesus is the son of God. Belief in Jesus as the Son of God leads to the victory that overcomes "the world," signifying that part of creation associated with darkness. The letter emphasizes the connection between love of God and love of neighbor.

Today's familiar reading has Jesus appearing twice, both times on the first day of the week. In both scenes he greets them with "Peace be with you," assuring his fearful disciples that he has conquered death, and that he has fulfilled the promises he made to them at their last meal together. He had said then that peace was his farewell to them and that he would return to them.

He also promised the Spirit and today he imparts the promised Spirit. Between the two appearances is the familiar story of Thomas who comes to believe because he sees; but Jesus proclaims we are blessed who believe and do not see.

Have you considered a gift to the 2018 Catholic Services Appeal? That drive is currently underway in the parish. Funds generated in this drive provide monies for Catholic Charities, St. Martin's Center, etc. and is the largest single source of income for the diocese. Each parish is assessed a set amount and any money raised over that is to remain in the parish. Our assessment this year is \$84,000, and I'm hoping we can generate extra money to replace the tiles in the church vestibule and the back of church. All I ask is that you think about it. Some of you can't do anything; that is fine. Others can make a donation, and I simply ask that you consider it.

The Pew Research Institute has released a study showing that peoples regard of Pope Francis is, for the very first time, colored by their political leanings. The survey shows signs of "growing discontent with Francis among Catholics on the political right, with increasing share of Catholic Republicans saying they view Francis unfavorably, and that they think he is too liberal and naïve." In 2014, one year into his papacy, there was "no discernible difference between the share of Catholic Republicans (90%) and Democrats (89%) who expressed a favorable view of him. Today, by contract, the pope's rating is 10 points higher among Catholic Democrats (89%) than among Catholic Republicans. (79%)." Despite these differences, he still enjoys a favorable rating from the overwhelming number of Catholics.

Work continues on the pipe organ with some of the ranks of pipes have already been put in place up in the balcony. There is still a great deal of work to be completed, and Organ Supply is not yet able to speculate on a date when it will be complete and we can use it again.

As I mentioned earlier, once the organ is in place, we are going to replace all of the tile in the back of church as well as carpet the balcony. Both are in great need for repair. Work will also be completed on the men's restroom in church. Insulation has been placed over the windows behind the pipe organ so that the hot and cold air coming in through those windows will no longer damage the organ. We think that when the pipes were removed is the very first time that people have seen these windows. We know that the pipe organ was in place when the church was first opened to the public, so they would not have seen them at that time. They're beautiful windows and it seems a shame to cover them up, but we have to do that to protect the organ. The insulation that has been installed can easily be removed at any point in the future.

The very ornate, Victorian organ console that was part of the original pipe organ was literally thrown out in the 1970s and replaced with a rather bland, nondescript console. Since we have the blue prints for the original console, it is being built and will look exactly as the original one did. I've seen the partially finished console, and it is absolutely beautiful. When everything is complete, you will be able to go in the balcony and see the console and restored organ.

Celebrant of our weekend Masses this weekend is Father Jason Mitchell of Gannon University. I am in Charlottesville, VA to perform the wedding for the son of parishioners.

Last week I paid our property and school taxes to the City of Erie for a total of \$4,700.

America, the Jesuit magazine, recently published some data on Mass attendance which shows that on a typical weekend, 26% of Catholics attend Mass. That contrasts with a typical weekend in 1958 when 62% of Catholics attended Mass. The data also showed that 68% of Catholics go to Mass on Christmas and 52% on Easter.

In a separate report, the same journal reported that Americans purchase 146 million pounds of candy for Easter at a cost of \$823 million.
