



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is Palm Sunday and we begin with the great procession into Jerusalem. People were laying their cloaks on



the ground for the donkey to walk on. It appears that the crowd is composed of people whose lives Jesus had changed, perhaps the once-blind Bartimaeus, Martha and Mary, his mother, other disciples, all caught up in the festive atmosphere. Residents of the neighborhood of the Mount of Olives left their houses to greet the pilgrims. But how quickly the crowd will turn from "Hosanna" to "Crucify him."

In our first reading for Mass, Isaiah describes a mysterious Servant, called by God, whose suffering will win the life of the people. The Servant is not identified; he may be the people of Israel, or a prophet like Moses or Jeremiah, or a person yet to come. His fate prefigures that of the humble Christ, who did not resist the Father's will and was not excused from suffering evil, and he remained confident even to the sacrifice on the cross. In the Christian context, we recognize Christ, the Lamb of God, sacrificed to take away the sin of the world. The suffering of this servant anticipates the Paschal mystery of Christ.

In our second reading this Christological hymn presents the contrast between Jesus' humiliation from death and his exaltation above every other name. Christ did not hold on to divine privilege; rather, he was born in human flesh and became the servant of all, selfless to the point of accepting death on a cross. An interpretation is that Christ is the replica of Adam, the image of God as was Adam, but unlike Adam, he did not work that privilege to his own advantage. The hymn draws a parallel between the pride and disobedience of Adam and the humility and service of the Son of God.

We read our Passion from Luke and we begin with the institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper and then move to the sheer agony of the Garden which must be understood as a complete

abandonment to the will of the Father. We are then introduced to Judas and listen as Jesus is the faithful witness, strong in his declarations before the Sanhedrin and humble before the mockery, the blows, and the bitter hatred toward him. Note that Luke, who has more women in his gospel than any other, has women as the witnesses at the crucifixion. It will be to a woman whom the resurrected Jesus will appear for the first time.

Dioceses throughout the country are noting a sharp decrease in donations to diocesan wide projects. Pastors report that parish donations remain strong, but that people seem to have lost confidence in their bishops because of the coverup of the abuse scandal and are closing their purse strings. Notable exceptions are in dioceses where the bishop has been totally transparent about what is going on and sharing information about abuse openly. That certainly is the case in our own diocese with the way Bishop Persico has handled all of this. "People love their parish, but they've lost trust in the bishops," said Father John Mello, the pastor of two urban parishes in the Fall River, MA diocese. CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) reports that the percentage of lay Catholics who had donated to diocesan financial appeals had declined from 38 percent in April 2002 to around 29 percent today. "We know in the past that Catholics haven't been affected in their giving to their parishes, but the abuse scandal has affected their giving to diocesan collections. We have evidence of that, said Mark Gray, the director of CARA Catholic polls.

To date, the abuse scandals have cost American dioceses \$3.8 billion in total settlements. At least 16 dioceses have filed for bankruptcy protection since 2004.

Remember that next Saturday is Holy Saturday and there cannot be a Vigil Mass at the usual 5 PM time. The Easter Vigil will be held at 8:30 PM and the regular Sunday morning Masses will be at 8 and 10:30.

The Annuariam Statisticumm Ecclesiae, a year-book released each year in Rome this year showed the number of Catholics growing more rapidly than the overall population in Africa and Asia. In the Americas the Catholic population is

growing, although not as quickly as over-all growth. In Europe the numbers remained flat. The yearbook also shows a decline in the number of candidates for the priesthood worldwide. Again the figures for Africa and Asia were more promising, while in the Americas and especially in Europe the decline was more severe.

The Parish Office will be closed on Holy Thursday and Good Friday as well as Easter Monday.

Our maintenance people have finished almost completely re-plastering the side hallway entrance to the church and the Food Pantry. I had no idea it was in as bad a condition as it was. As they finish that area and re-paint it, they are going to start on the walls in the east sacristy. They are also in terrible condition. We have to remember that the plaster on these walls is over a hundred years old. At the cathedral, the plaster is so bad that paint won't stick to it, and they are in the midst of a four year \$4.5 million project to replace every square inch of plaster in the building.

Last fall, the gas company dug up the entire area in front of the rectory between the sidewalk and the street. It's been mud all winter, and as soon as the weather breaks, we'll get it seeded. There is a sprinkler system in there which will keep it watered.

I can't thank you enough for your generous support of the Catholic Services Appeal. As you know we have an \$88,000 assessment and anything raised above that stays in the parish. I have been trying to build up an endowment for the parish so that there will be a source of income in the future. That endowment exists solely for the maintenance and upkeep of the church. It presently has almost \$200,000 in it and I would love to get it to \$500,000. Any monies raised above and beyond our assessment are going in that endowment.

When children exhibit dramatic behavioral changes, adults must find out what caused the changes. Being aware of what's happening with our children means talking to, listening to, and observing them at every opportunity. 

CHANGE IN MASS ATTENDANCE BETWEEN 2010 AND 2018

Every October, every parish in the United States counts the number of people attending Mass. Those figures are reported to the diocese and then become part of national figures. The changes listed below show the change in Mass attendance at all of the parishes in the Erie West and the Erie East Deaneries. The figures are rather frightening. In the neighboring Diocese of Youngstown, Ohio, the average drop in Mass attendance is over 60% in the same time period.
