


Today is the Fourth Sunday of Easter. After the healing of a crippled man, Peter addressed the crowd in a

speech we heard last weekend. As he was still speaking, the authorities, annoyed at the apostle's teaching about Jesus' resurrection, arrested both Peter and John. In their interrogation, they ask by whose authority they acted. Peter's answer is another speech, this time to the assembled Jerusalem leaders. He tells them that he healed the man by the power of the Spirit in the name of Jesus. The word Peter uses for healing (sozo) can mean a physical cure or being made well or whole. It is the same word used in the NT to speak of God's ultimate deliverance from sin and death. The physical healing of the crippled man is a sign of God's full, life-giving, saving activity.

The first word in John's letter is "see." Seeing is more that beholding with the eyes; it includes spiritual insight and discernment as well. In asking his audience to see, John is inviting them to be attentive to the reality of God's love that they have experienced. God's love, already revealed through creation and history, took on human flesh in Jesus. God's love is life giving; it brings about a new creation in the believers themselves. John then refers to that part of the world that cannot see, know or accept Jesus. This is the situation that John's audience is now facing. John then invites them to "see" beyond the present age. Risen along with Christ, they will see him and know him in glory.

In the OT, sheep and shepherds were so much a part of daily life that they easily became a means of illustrating the relationship between God and Israel. We're told in the psalm that "The Lord is my shepherd." In contrast, some of Israel's leaders destroyed and scattered the sheep, leaving them as food for wild animals. Jesus applies the metaphor to himself. Just as the God of Israel was totally different from Israel's unfaithful leaders, Jesus is different from hirelings who have no

concern for the sheep. In today's reading, Jesus describes himself as the Good Shepherd who will even lay down his life for his sheep. And after speaking of those who are already part of his "flock," Jesus foresees others who do not yet belong and says that he will lead them and they will hear his voice.

I recently signed a contract for \$17,000 for work to be done on the roof of the Food Pantry. We have had trouble with that roof as long as I've been here, and it really needs to be replaced. We have work done on the roof, then we paint and repair inside the Food Pantry and the next big rain storm, we have water coming in again. We have to keep remembering that we're dealing with hundred year old buildings and it is constant maintenance. The area that we use as the Food Pantry was originally an apartment where the maintenance man and his family lived. In fact, the maintenance man's wife gave birth to two babies in that apartment while they were living there. We may be the only church in the diocese where babies were born!!

Today's second collection, the Good Shepherd collection, is to help cover the costs for our 68 retired priests. Last year's appeal generated \$201,051.

Our annual Catholic Service Appeal continues. You can see the amount pledged so far is rather amazing, but we've still got a long way to go. Our assessment this year is \$84,000 and we hope to raise money beyond that to replace the tiles in the back of church and the vestibule. Have you considered making a pledge in whatever amount you feel you can? Some people can't afford to do anything, and that is fine; but others are able to step forward and make a pledge. I simply ask that you think about it.

Organ Supply is located in an office park just off of West Grandview and Zuck. They are doing the restoration of our pipe organ and have told us recently that they hope to have the organ in place and functioning by the end of June. They have already brought several ranks of pipes back and have installed them. When I've been up there and see the 3,100 pipes all over the place I keep wondering how they're ever going to put the whole thing back together again.

We're finally able to do work on the second floor of the rectory. That entire floor has been neglected for years and years. Whole ceilings had to be replaced, large sections of plastered walls had to be replaced, the woodwork hasn't been touched in at least 50 years, etc. We have two guest apartments now finished as well as the large center hall. The chapel on that floor had been kept up. As a matter of fact, I celebrated daily Mass in there every day for the 7 months the church was closed in 2012 for the restoration. I'm told that in the last years when his health was failing, retired Bishop Murphy, who lived at St. Patrick's in retirement, celebrated daily Mass there. We've recarpeted in the chapel but otherwise it was in fairly good condition. Two large rooms on the second floor are used for the Irish Festival. If anyone ever wants to see any of this completed work or anyplace in the rectory, just stop in and someone will be glad to show you.

Speaking of the Irish Festival, chairperson Eric Albright has already started things rolling. He met earlier this month with all of the chair people of the various committees, etc. I'm grateful that Gary and Becky Johnson, chairs for the past two vears, are helping Eric as he learns the ropes. They have been a great help. Under the direction of Patty Dailey, a number of women have been working in a room on the second floor of the rectory putting together displays of jewelry that will be sold at the festival. Mary Beth Watcher is already baking bread for her booth. Parishioner, Laura Chandley has taken over the raffle ticket sales from longtime chairs Eileen Balczun and her twin sister Kathleen Wehan. We've also already received a grant of \$4,600 from the local gaming authority to help get things going for the festival. If you've never been part of the festival in the past, perhaps you would be interested in volunteering this year. As we get closer to the date, we will post all of the volunteer positions so that you might be able to step forward. The real purpose of the festival, in addition to highlighting our Irish heritage, is to build community, to help all of us in the parish to get to know one another better as we continue to grow.
