

Today is the Second Sunday of Easter and we read first from Acts of the Apostles. Acts was written by Luke as a



continuation of his gospel to show how the apostles and disciples spread the gospel, first to the people of Israel and then to all people. In describing the early Christian mission. Luke takes great care to point out the continuity between the gospel and the tradition of Judaism. Luke's only use of the word koinonia (communal life) appears in today's passage, emphasizing the mutual responsibility and support that bind all the baptized. Today he speaks of their pooling their resources and shows the fruits of their work: they give praise to God, receive the favor of the people and enjoy growth in the community. Remember that these early believers felt that the second coming of Jesus was immanent, a belief that would eventually bring them to great confusion

Though scholars doubt that Peter actually wrote this first letter which we have as our second reading, they agree that it speaks to an audience of Christians undergoing unspecified sufferings. It is addressed to Gentile converts who were underdoing Roman persecution or the ridicule, exclusion or economic boycotts often directed at those who refused to conform to the prevailing imperial culture. The letter has sprinklings of baptismal liturgies, including what seem to be portions of creeds, hymns and homilies. Like Christ, Christians might undergo testing and even anguish, but those who, like Christ, place unwavering trust in God will know salvation.

Today's gospel can be best understood by reference to its end, which most scholars believe to be also the original conclusion of John's gospel. At the Last Supper, Jesus promised to send the Advocate (the Spirit) on his return to the Father. In today's gospel, he fulfills that promise, sending forth the disciples as he was sent; they must now be his revelatory sign. Thomas does not doubt this changed reality; he refuses it with his "I will not believe". When Jesus returns a week later, he

insists not only that Thomas recognize him but also that Thomas be transformed: blessed are those who have not seen the mortal body of Jesus, but have truly perceived the living sign of his Risen Body on earth, the church.

This past week we hosted two groups of bridal couples for an evening at the rectory. Coming in groups of 5 or 6 couples, we have a very casual evening with drinks and dinner. There's no agenda, no program; just an opportunity to welcome them. There is certainly no shortage of conversation as they're all in the same boat and have much to share. We have the original 1908 Cauley family china which is 23 carat gold, and we use all of it for these dinners. The dining room looks like Downton Abbey!!!! It all makes for a fun evening and an opportunity for the parish to welcome these young couples.

Parishes across the diocese are reporting a significant drop in the number of weddings, and we're experiencing the same reality here at St. Patrick's. In recent years, we've had as many as 35—40 weddings a year. This year we have 24 weddings on the calendar. When I was in Palm Springs, CA, I didn't have a single wedding in 10 years. People were all married at the Country Club, etc. I suspect the same thing is now happening here.

With the new registration of some families in the past few weeks, our total number of families in St. Patrick's Parish now exceeds 900 families. That is a rather incredible growth, and we continue to register new families on a regular basis. In the early years of the parish, when the number of families at St. Patrick's exceeded 450, the diocese would split the parish and form another one. That began first with the cathedral in 1892, then St. Ann's was created and carved out of territory that had been St. Patrick's; then St. Andrew's was created and also carved out of territory that had been St. Patrick's.

In times past, parishes were either territorial or ethnic. Catholics were required to attend the church in whose territory they lived, unless they belonged to an ethnic parish such as St. Paul's for the Italians. Saint Patrick's actually has the smallest territory assigned to it of any parish in the diocese. Our territory extends from the Bayfront to East Sixth Street and from Parade St. to State Street. While territories used to be extremely important, that's not the case today. In many instances today, people attend the church they want to attend rather than the one in their neighborhood. With over a hundred families from Fairview, for example, they would drive past Holy Cross, St. Julia, St. Jude, St. Andrew and the cathedral to attend Mass at St Patrick's We also have a significant number of people who attend here regularly but do not belong. Anyone who wishes to attend here is more than welcome. They do not have to formally join the parish.

Cardinal Reinhard Marx of Munich, Germany, announced recently that he is going to appoint lay people to administer parishes, rather than close parishes because of the clergy shortage. He also suggested that mature married men could be ordained to the priesthood. The Archdiocese of Munich, which has a Catholic population of over 1.7 million, will ordain only one new priest this year.

During the month of March, our Food Pantry distributed 14,722 pounds of food at a cost of \$1,083 to the parish. Food was distributed to 1,565 families which include 38 new families this month.

St. Patrick's Parish received a bequest of \$10,000 from the late Vicki Weber. As per her will, the principal cannot be spent, but is to be part of the St. Patrick Foundation for the ongoing maintenance of St. Patrick's Church. The interest gained on the principal can be used for that purpose. Have you ever thought of remembering the parish is your estate planning?

146 DAYS TO THE 2017 ERIE IRISH FESTIVAL

OH, DANNY BOY.

Elvis Presley said he thought the angels had written it and it was played at his funeral, and at John Kennedy's, and at so many others. It's one of the most beautiful and recognizable songs in the world, perhaps the greatest of Irish songs. But *Danny Boy's* lyrics were written by an Englishman and the tune, which was probably composed in the 17th century by a blind Irish harpist, was brought to him from the Colorado gold fields by his immigrant sister who had supposedly heard it being played by some Australian prospectors some 300 years later. It's quite a song, and it has quite a story--many competing stories actually--more than we can fit here, but we'll give you the flavor of them.

In the early 1600's, the English were bent on confiscating the land of the Irish nobles who opposed them in Northern Ireland and snatched some property from the O'Cahan clan, one of the descendents of which was Blind Rory Dall O'Cahan, a virtuoso and composer on the harp, who lived near Derry, or Londonderry as the English called it. There are two stories about the composition of the "Londonderry Air," (not to be confused with a London Derriere), which would become the music for *Danny Boy*. One is that the land grab enraged Blind Rory and he wrote the tune. Another is that Blind Rory, staggering home drunk one night, passed out and heard the fairies playing a haunting melody, which, when he sobered up, he remembered, and played for friends on his harp. We prefer to believe the latter.

It was another blind Irish harpist, a fellow named Denis O'Hampsey, born in the late 1600's, who brought the tune with him into the early 1800's, where he died at the age of 112. But the music was not actually written down, it seems, until later in the 19th century when an English woman, herself a composer, heard it being played by a blind fiddle player (there's a pattern here) named Jimmy McCurry. It then made its way to America with the great wave of Irish immigrants fleeing the potato famine. Long story short (too late), Frederic Weatherly, an English lawyer who also wrote songs, had written Danny Boy but with different music. The song was a flop until his sister heard Londonderry Air being played in the Colorado mountains by gold prospectors and brought him the music. The resultant marriage of Blind Rory's tune and Weatherly's lyrics became a phenomenal hit—perhaps because it coincided with the outbreak of World War I and it speaks so movingly to separation and loss.

If you come to the Irish Festival, and we know you will, there's a good chance you will hear *Danny Boy* once or twice, and, if you also sample some Irish whiskey, you may even hear it as Blind Rory did, played by the fairies.
