

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Second Sunday of Easter. In the beginning of Acts, Luke's summary of the ideal Christian life demon-



strates the result of faith in Christ: a community of one heart and one mind. Spiritual needs are cared for in common through the teaching of the apostles, the prayers, meals and the common life. Material needs are answered by the sharing of possessions. He tells how they carried the sick out into the streets and laid them on cots so that at least Peter's shadow might fall on them and they all were cured. The healings were proof of their identity with Jesus, who at the beginning of his ministry identified himself as the healer of a world afflicted.

The theological language of Revelation reveals the church in struggle throughout history, now rejoining in the Lord's triumph over the forces of evil. Christ, resurrected and triumphant, infuses the church with confidence to face difficulties and build a new heaven and a new earth now in the present world. John writes for a persecuted community; he relates how on the Lord's day Jesus appears, whom John envisions as the final judge, and at the same time, as priest and king. In the risen Christ is all our hope of happiness and salvation. The reading presents the theme of the resurrected Christ's lordship over the whole church, represented here by the seven churches of Asia Minor, the "seven lampstands." Christ is described as being like the "Son of Man," as presented in the book of Daniel. He holds in his hand the destinies of all people.

It is the first day of the week, also the eighth day that follows the Sabbath. It is the same day as the marriage at Cana, which overflowed with joy and new wine in the presence of Jesus, the bridegroom. It is the day after the Sabbath, when the paralytic carried his mat into the temple and caused a scandal among religious people, the same Sabbath when Jesus made mud and smeared it on a blind person's face, it is the day when Mary Magdalene and the disciples discover

empty tomb. Suddenly Jesus is in the midst of the apostles as he shows them his hands. On this evening of the resurrection, Jesus also showed them his side, so we could see his heart pierced for his love. Thomas catches our attention with his confession of faith and Jesus' blessing for those who believe without seeing. Thomas is identified as a twin but the gospel never tells us who his twin is. It is highly thought that it is Nathanael. You may recall in the beginning of the gospel, Nathaniel, too, doubts that Jesus is the prophet.

Celebrant of our Masses this weekend is Father Jason Mitchell. Jason is on the faculty at Gannon and helps on weekends at the cathedral. I'm grateful he's willing to cover for me. I confess that I snuck away for a few days to catch my breath after Holy Week. I'm enjoying some warm weather and friends in Palm Springs. I'll be back on Wednesday.

The National Trust of Canada has warned local communities to brace for old church buildings being shuttered or sold off, with as many as 9,000 religious venues now considered at risk. Religious organizations own 27,601 buildings for worship, training or promotion in 2009. Some have already been demolished or abandoned. The New Brunswick Diocese expects to lose 20 of its 53 parishes in the coming years while over 30 of 54 Catholic churches in Montreal were slated for closure in 2018. In Montreal, Anglican pastor Graham Singh has launched a new charity to convert 100 historic church buildings into community hubs to combat the loneliness and isolation in the community.

As soon as the weather breaks, we're going to have some work done on the parking lot behind the rectory. There is a small area of grass behind the rectory that is always getting beaten up with trucks, etc., especially during the festival. We're going to blacktop that area and then put a sealant on the entire parking lot as it is starting to get some serious cracks in it. We're also going to replace the sidewalk entrance to the driveway that comes off of East Fourth Street. Some of that is badly cracked and needs to be replaced. You may recall that last summer we replaced sidewalks that border on our parking lot on Holland

Street.

Eric Albright will again chair the Irish Festival this year and Gary and Becky Johnson will work closely with him. Gary and Becky are going to return as festival chairs next year and again chair the following year, and I'm thrilled to have them back in that position. We met recently to fill the various positions as to who will chair each booth, etc. Some people have chaired a particular part of the festival for years, and we need to rotate those chairs so that others can also come on board. As such, we have a number of new chairs for this year. We have grown in the past ten years from 191 active families to over a thousand, and a lot of the new people want to get involved with the festival, and we need to accommodate everyone.

In addition, we have an Irish group of entertainers coming directly from Ireland this year. This festival continues to grow each year. Gary Johnson has secured a prominent group to entertain on Friday night. Saturday night they will be in Syracuse. NY at an Irish Festival, and we're fortunate to have them. The smartest thing we ever did was to move it down around the church and to get Calamari's to do the food. During the past year, we have purchased some more appliances that we have been renting up until now. Each year we purchase a few more so that eventually we won't have to rent anything. We are getting a much larger tent for the Sports Bar and we are also getting a larger tent for the entertainment (if that's even possible!!). The new tent is about 15 feet longer than the previous one and will run on Fourth Street in front of the church.

The ethnic festivals in Erie continue to grow and become an important part of our summers. The Polish, Italian, Greek, German and Russian Festivals all add to our summer entertainment. Also this year, we will have a Tall Ship Festival in the middle of August which will be the largest one the city has ever seen.
