

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Sixth Sunday of Easter. The story of the Roman centurion Cornelius begins with a vision that leads



him to a meeting with Peter. Peter also has a strange vision of unclean animals that he is told to eat. As a faithful Jew, this goes against everything he believes. Then he is invited to the home of Cornelius, a Gentile, somewhere a Jew would never go. Then Peter realizes the meaning of the dream. Cornelius recounts his vision to Peter who then says, "I see that God shows no partiality." Peter comes to realize that anyone who fears God and acts uprightly is acceptable to God. Our reading illustrates two conversions: Cornelius to Christ and Peter's to openness to Gentiles. Even as Peter is speaking the Holy Spirit falls upon all who are listening, confirming that Gentiles are to be included in the community.

Our reading from I John today is one of the most beautiful poems in all of the New Testament. The word "love" is repeated in various forms, creating a rhythmic cadence and resonance, beginning with the address to the community as "beloved." Closely associated with love is another repetition: "God," the source and goal of life and love. We are told that the love of God and the life that God gives through Christ are both a present reality and one still awaited in fullness.

Today's gospel is a continuation of Jesus' teaching on the vine and branches heard last Sunday. Both segments are from Jesus' last discourse to his disciples in which he prepared them for his coming suffering and death. Before he leaves them he wants them to understand how he has loved them, and how they are to love one another. The love of the Father for Jesus, and the love of Jesus for his friends, illustrates for them how they are to love one another.

A group of over 300 young Catholics gathered recently at the Vatican for a week-long preparation for next year's Synod on Young People. Pope Francis asked them to "shout" what they

they believe and what they want. And they gave him an earful. They told the pope and the cardinals they want a more transparent and authentic church, where women play a greater leadership role and where obeying "unreachable" moral standards isn't the price of admission. They warned that "excessive moralism" is driving people away and that out-of-touch church bureaucrats need to accompany their flock with humility and transparency. "We, the young church, ask that our leaders speak in practical terms about subjects such as homosexuality and gender issues, about which young people are already freely discussing," they said. They concluded that the church often comes off as too severe and its excessive moralism often sends the faithful looking elsewhere for peace and spiritual fulfillment. "We need a church that is welcoming and merciful, which appreciates its roots and patrimony and which loves everyone, even those who are not following the perceived standards," they said.

The views of these young people will become part of the working document that will guide discussions at the upcoming October Synod of Bishops. On four separate occasions in the 16 page document, the participants demanded greater and equal roles for women in the church, calling for "real discussion and open-mindedness" about ways to promote the dignity of women. "Some young women feel that there is a lack of leading female role models within the church, and they too wish to give their intellectual and professional gifts to the church," they said.

The document is brutally honest in places. It notes that young people are leaving the church in droves, in part because they have experienced "indifference, judgment and rejection" by the institution. Church leaders, they say, are too focused on administration than community, and use words like "vocation" and "discernment" that young people don't understand. But, mostly, they said, the church needs to admit that it is human and makes mistakes, and that its mentors aren't perfect people but forgiven sinners. The pope may not have realized that when he invites young people to shout out their needs, they're going to take him at his word. The real test of all of this will come when the bishops and cardinals gather next October to discuss the issues these young

people have raised.


