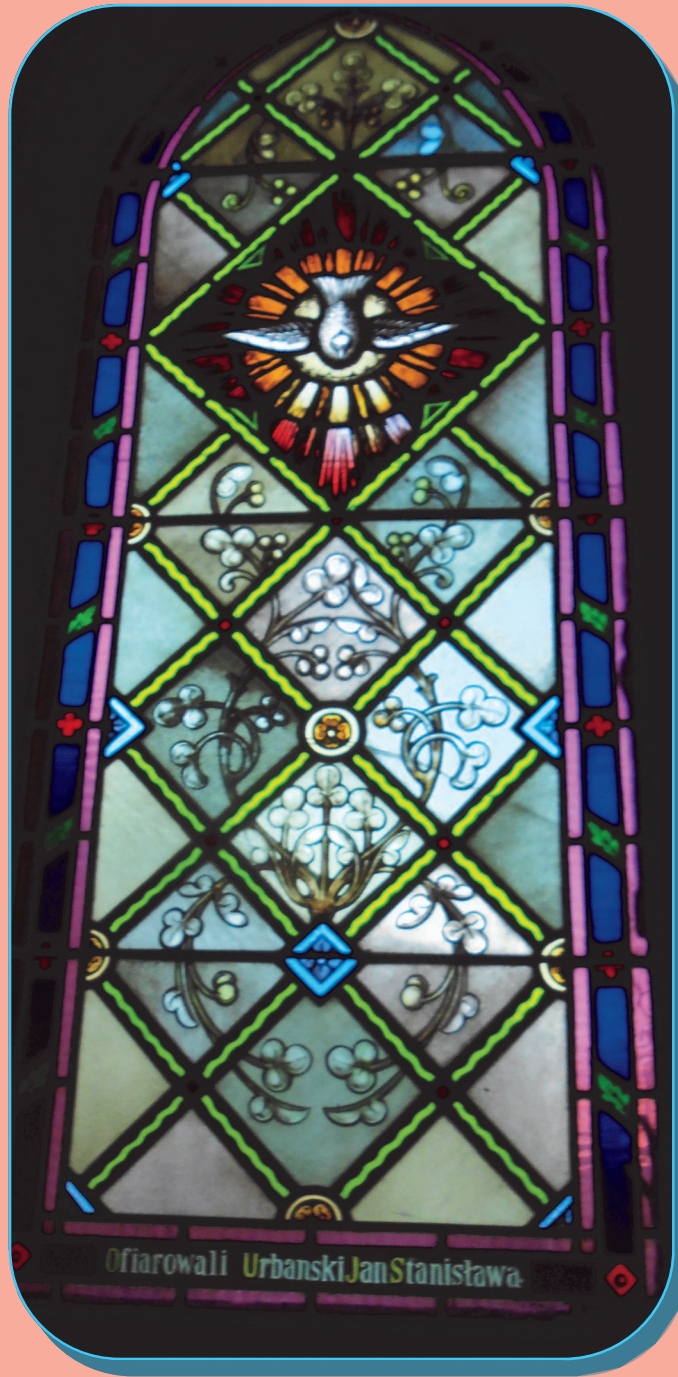

From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Feast of Pentecost and our Sunday readings begin with Acts of the Apostles. "Pentecost" is the Greek name for the Jewish "Feast of Weeks" that celebrated God's giving of the Law to Moses on Mt. Sinai. During the celebration, the Spirit's sudden arrival surprised all who had gathered: the newly reconstituted "Twelve," and an additional one hundred disciples who included Mary, the mother of Jesus. Ten days before, the apostles bid farewell to Jesus and received their mandate to witness to him to the ends of the earth. Now, his promise of "another advocate" is fulfilled. The Spirit comes upon them not as a "tiny whispering sound" which was the prophecy in I Kings, but as a rushing, violent wind that shakes the house and makes their hearts tremble. They lose control of their tongues and utter words they do not know, manifesting the Spirit at work. Since Pentecost required every adult Jewish male to pilgrimage to Jerusalem for the feast, the men hear words that each can understand in his own language.

Today's brief second reading reinforces the first reading, that we are one in God's Holy Spirit. Paul notes that each of us exist to serve one another.

In our gospel we meet the apostles, still on Easter Sunday, who are locked away in fear and Jesus appears in their midst and offers them the peace that only he can bring. He bolsters their faith by showing them his hands and his side. No sooner is Jesus recognized than he commissions them to go forth. We read that he "breathes" on them, an image that conjures God the Creator breathing life into Adam. Just as God gave life to Adam, now Jesus gives new life to these disciples. And as he imparts his Spirit to them, he bestows on them the power to forgive sin. The Risen Lord not only wished them peace, but he now

gives them the surest way to sustain it.

Archbishop Paglia, head of the Vatican Congregation for the Family, has issued a document commenting on the recent papal document on marriage and the family. He makes some very interesting observations. He writes that the papal document is the "basis for a new relationship between Church and family. The lives of families are not to be primarily a series of moral questions the church must answer, they are to be the wellspring of a lively faith that brings God's love to mankind."

He continues, "Sadly there are some who would like the church to be a courtroom...that accuses, a prosecutor who gathers evidence of transgressions without taking into account the unfortunate circumstances of life or the difficult choices we make. That view is one-sided and forgets that the Church has been commissioned by the Lord to be courageous and strong in its protection of the weak, in forgiving wrongs, in healing wounds." He writes toward the end of his document that "marriage is indissoluble, but the bond between the Church and her children is even more so an indissoluble bond that cannot be broken."

Isn't it wonderful that, thanks to the leadership of Pope Francis, the Church is moving away from judgement and condemnation of people to being what he calls a "field hospital," a place where people come to experience healing, mercy, forgiveness and acceptance. And that applies to everyone.

We received a check from the Saint Vincent Health System Community Service Fund for \$1,715.00 to the Saint Patrick Food Pantry. This fund is supported by the employees at Saint Vincent's and then offers funding grants to various charitable organization. At their recent board meeting, the board voted unanimously to allocate this money to our Food Pantry.

From the Pastor's Desk continued.....

One of the issues each parish is being asked to explore as part of our Pastoral Planning process is "how can we better cooperate together?" In reviewing our efforts at St. Patrick's in this direction, we noted our participation in the Eastside Religious Ed program. All of the parishes on the east side of the city come together to support and finance a religious ed program for our children. Another area in which we cooperate is in the Homeless Shelter in which we have worked closely with St. Jude's in providing a two week window of shelter in February each year. Another area is our festival where we have worked closely with Holy Trinity parishioners through their invaluable assistance as we began having a street festival and our helping to staff their festival. An area that we could consider for the future would be making our annual Scripture classes available for all eastside parishes, perhaps joining together in RCIA, etc.

It is so nice seeing the cooperation between parishes and the wide-spread support for the pastoral planning process. There are some hiccups and they're being nicely discussed with some positive suggestions for solutions. There couldn't have been any major surprises in the plan as we have been talking about this for years.

A while back, I was sitting on the edge of the bed, watching my wife who was looking at herself in the mirror. Since it was her birthday, I asked her what she'd like. "I'd like to be eight again," she replied, still looking in the mirror. On the morning of her birthday, I got up early, made her a nice bowl of Coco Pops and then took her to Adventure World theme park. I put her on every ride, the Death Slide, the Wall of Fear, the Screaming Roller Coaster, everything there was. Five hours later we staggered out of the park and I took her to McDonald's and ordered a Happy Meal with extra fries and a chocolate shake. Then it was off to the movies, popcorn, a soda, etc. Finally she wobbled home and collapsed on the bed. I leaned over and with a big smile lovingly asked her, "Well, dear, what was it like being eight again?" Her eyes slowly opened and her expression changed. "I meant my dress size, you idiot." The moral of the story: Even when a man is listening, he is going to get it wrong.

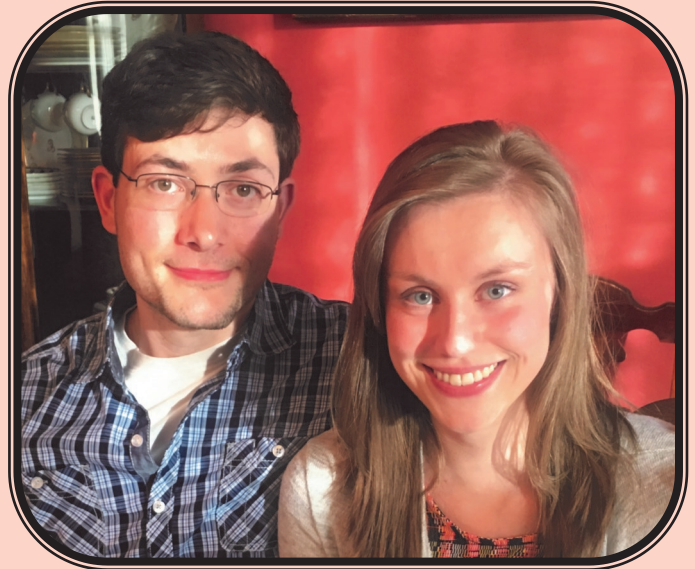


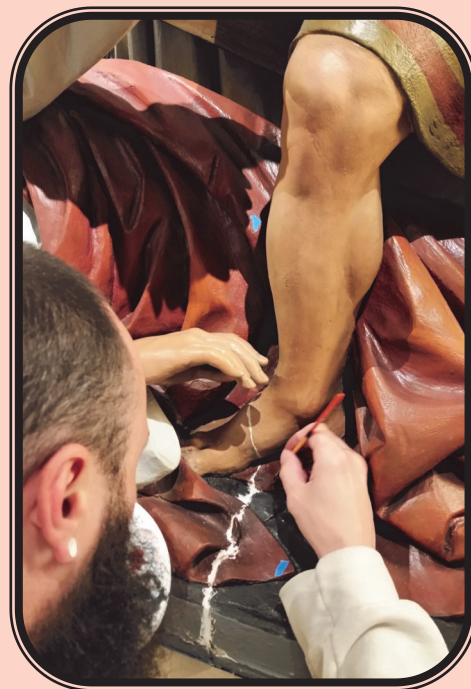
