

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Feast of Pentecost. This feast is a major one in the Jewish calendar, taking place fifty days after Passo-



ver. Luke's description of the coming of the Holy Spirit draws a very clear link between the Christian Pentecost and God coming to Moses on the mountain. We're told that today the apostles experienced a strong wind and tongues as of fire. Wind, both in the Hebrew and Greek traditions, is associated with spirit or breath. The noise of a gust of wind heralds God's new intervention in salvation history. "Tongues as of fire" recalls Exodus 19:18 where fire symbolizes God's presence on Mt. Sinai as he formed a covenant with Israel. In today's text, the Holy spirit prepares the apostles to proclaim the new covenant. Suddenly the scene shifts to the street outside the house where a large crowd has gathered. They are identified as coming from towns throughout the Roman Empire to signify the universality of this new covenant. Some hear only babble while others hear the apostles speaking clearly, each in their own language. It is a reversal of the confusion of tongues at the Tower of Babel.

In his letter to the Corinthians, Paul insists that the varies of gifts (in Greek, *charisma*, meaning "gift of grace.") and services can be traced to the same spirit, the same Lord and God. No single gift is prominent in and of itself and a person cannot play one gift against others. Every gift is also a form of service or ministry. He also emphasizes that no one can boast of have a *charisma*, because it is not private property or the result of personal achievement. The gifts are given for community benefit—the common good. Paul uses the metaphor of the body to explain Christ's relationship with believers. By baptism, all believers, despite the variety of ethnic or social origin, are integrated into one body.

In the gospel, Jesus appears on the evening of the first day of the new creation, the day he rose from the dead. The disciples receive the new spirit by Christ breathing on them, a gift that

recalls Genesis 2:7, when God breathed life into the first human. Just as Adam's life came from God, so now the disciples' new spiritual life comes from God's Son

Celebrant of our Masses this weekend is Father Tom Fialkowski, retired pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Parish and longtime faculty member at Cathedral Prep. A group of us are in southern Italy and Sicily and will return very late today.

Church of England congregations at one of three churches are singing along to taped recordings due to a chronic shortage of organists in the country. Most churches report having a working pipe organ but those with the skills to play them "are a dying breed," according to a recent report. Fifty percent of organists are 70 or older and only four percent are under the age of 30. "Most churches have an organ and most of them are in working order so it really is just down to a lack of players," said study author Richard Hubbard. Our organist, Mark Alloway, tells me that a similar crisis is about to hit American churches because very few people are studying to be organists.

The Diocese of Saint-Jerome, north of Montreal, is suggesting closing 33 of its 55 churches in early June. About 40 places of worship have been shuttered every year on average in the province since 2011. "We are not managers of old buildings," said Father Martin Tremblay, vicar general of the diocese, noting that heating costs for one church alone stand at \$25,000 a year.

In the past six years, the number of Christians in the Gaza Strip has plummeted from 4,500 to just under a thousand, due to the harsh conditions under which they are living, according to the pastor of the territory's sole Catholic church. Gazans "live like it's an open prison since we can't leave. We can't visit relatives, look for work, medicine or good hospitals on the outside," said Father Mario da Silva. The Gaza Strip is a 141 square mile area, part of Palestine, located to the west of Israel and home to 1.8 million persons. Since 2007, it has been ruled by the Islamist Hamas. Since

Hamas came to power, Israel and Egypt have conducted an economic blockade of the Gaza Strip, restricting the flow of persons and goods in an effort to limit rocket attacks on Israel launched from the territory. The priest sais that inhabitants have only three hours of electricity a day and there is a shortage of water. Most Gazans are unemployed and those who do work only earn about \$150-200 a month.

In his new letter on holiness, Gaudete et Exsultate (Be glad and rejoice), Pope Francis chastised those who would see abortion as a more important issue than migration. "Some Catholics consider immigration a secondary issue compared to the grave bioethical questions. That a politician looking for votes might say such a thing is understandable, but not a Christian." "Our defense of the innocent unborn, for example, needs to be clear, firm and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development but it should not supersede the defense of the poor or migrants. Equally sacred, however, are the lives of the poor, those already born, the destitute, the abandoned and the underprivileged, the vulnerable infirm and elderly exposed to covert euthanasia, the victims of human trafficking, new forms of slavery, and every form of rejection," he said. In reality, he is writing that single issue Catholicism is incorrect.

In writing about holiness, he writes that "Christian joy is usually accompanied by a sense of humor." In another section he writes, "Thanks be to God, throughout the history of the church it has always been clear that a person's perfection is measured not by the information of knowledge they possess, but by the depth of their charity." Elsewhere he writes, "The devil does not need to possess us. He poisons us with the venom of hatred, desolation, envy and vice."

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments Prevalence of Child Sexual Abuse:

Child sexual abuse is a great deal more prevalent than many imagine. Some studies suggest that as many as one in six boys and one in four girls will be the victim of some form of sexual molestation before the age of 18. That means that, directly or indirectly, child sexual abuse will touch most of us during our lifetime. And although we would like to believe that most accusations are false, the facts tell us that children rarely lie about being molested. In fact, they rarely tell anyone at all. An adult study about the prevalence of sexual abuse found that 42% of the men and 33% of the women who were victimized as children never told anyone.
