From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Feast of the Holy Trinity and we read first from Proverbs, returning now to the Old Testament for our first reading after reading from Acts during the Easter season. Today we meet Wisdom, a manifestation of God's activity and self-communication in the world. In today's description, wisdom observes God's creative activity and identifies herself as God's "craftsman," an intermediary who brings God's gifts to humanity. Later books will give her a more active role in the divine work of creation.

Next we read from Paul's Letter to the Romans. He is using a Trinitarian formula to rejoice over the salvation that "God" accomplishes through "Jesus Christ," and which is sustained through the "Holy Spirit." The first piece of good news is that Jesus restored peace between God and humanity. Faith in Jesus gives us access to that peace and also to grace, that is, God's own life surging within us. Faith leads to peace and grace and they open the door to hope. But there is more. The seemingly unthinkable—boasting of our afflictions—is now as logical and expecting to share God's glory. Paul says that affliction makes us strong and gives us endurance which in turn builds character and character gives us reason to hope, a hope "that does not disappoint."

Taken from the long discourse at the Last Supper found only in John, today's brief text presents Jesus, as ever, trying to care for his disciples with careful explanations. Jesus realizes that they are not yet ready for all the truth, so he holds back certain things, like his impending passion and death. What they can "bear" he shares forcefully, and that truth concerns the coming of the Spirit of Truth who will make clear everything that we have learned from Jesus. In the verse just prior to today's reading, Jesus says that it is

better that he goes, "for if I do not go, the Advocate will not come to you. If I go, I will send him to you." The Spirit will come, not to bring new revelations, but to help them understand what Jesus has already told them.

I know you join in welcoming Father Michael Polinek to St. Patrick's this weekend. A group of us flew earlier this past week to Paris for a few days and then are doing a Viking River cruise out to Normandy where we will visit the beaches, museum and the cemetery where 10,000 young Americans are buried who shed their lives in the D-Day invasion. We will return on Thursday.

Father Polinek is our Diocesan Vocation Director and Bishop Persico has asked that he speak in every parish about vocations. We all need to raise our awareness of the dire need we have for more priests and women religious. I know you will welcome Father Polinek and hopefully keep vocations in your prayers.

I can't thank you enough for your generous participation in the Catholic Services Appeal. You may recall, we have an assessment from the diocese this year of \$64,000. Any monies we generate above that remains in the parish. I was hoping against hope that we would be able to raise \$100,000; and as you can see, we have exceeded that goal. Only about 1/3 of the parish participated in the appeal, and I only wish that more would—in whatever amount you can afford. The same percentage is generally true with the regular offertory collection. Only about 1/3 of parishioners participate.

As parishes explore ways in which we can work better together and share resources, one of the best examples in our diocese is in Meadville where the three parishes—St. Agatha, St. Brigid and St. Mary's—now all call themselves the "Catholic Community of Meadville." They have

one pastor for the combined almost 1,200 families but remain as separate parishes but share one Religious Ed program, one Parish Council, one Catholic school, etc. During Holy Week, the services are offered only once each day, at a different church. Bishop Persico is asking all of our parishes to explore every possible way that we can all share our resources and work together for the good of all.

Our current census at St. Patrick's is 843 families which means that the parish is the largest it has ever been in history. If you examine the history of the parish, every time that the population exceeded 500 families, the diocese would establish a new parish and take families from St. Patrick's. St. Andrew's, the cathedral, St. Ann's were all created out of areas that were originally part of St. Patrick's parish. Remember that years ago, families were much larger comprising 6, 8 or more children and so the parish seemed much larger but the actual number of families today constitute the largest population in our history.

Work is complete in replacing ten of the windows in the rectory. We have now replaced all of the windows on the first floor of the house, about one third of them on the second floor and none have yet been done on the third floor. We're trying to do a certain number of them each year when we are able to fit it into the budget. We're able to do ten more windows this year and that work will be done in the summer.

Some interesting thoughts: "Lord, give me coffee to change the things I can change and wine to accept the things I can't." "People who wonder whether the glass is half empty or half full miss the point. The glass is refillable." "I've got salad for dinner. Actually fruit salad. Well, mostly grapes. Fermented grapes. Wine. I've got wine for dinner." "Sometimes when I reflect back on all the wine I drink I feel shame. Then I look into the glass and think about the workers in the vineyards and all of their hopes and dreams. If I didn't drink this wine, they might be out of work and their dreams would be shattered. Then I say to myself, 'It is better that I drink this wine and let their dreams come true than be selfish and worry about my liver.'"
