

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Feast of Pentecost. Many of the events in the life of Jesus occur at major Jewish feasts, giving the



feasts totally new meaning. The first reading from Acts occurs on one of the great pilgrimage feasts, Pentecost, fifty days after Easter. Described in Leviticus as a harvest festival, it later became a commemoration of Moses' reception of the Torah on Mt. Sinai. On that mountain, peals of thunder, lightning, a heavy cloud and the sound of trumpet blasts were signs of divine presence. At the festival celebrated by Christians, fire and the sound of rushing wind come from the heavens. The tongues at Pentecost are both visible and audible: the word tongue (glossa) refers first to the visible fiery tongue resting on each person, and then to the speech that is heard by the crowd. Like the theophany on Sinai, the one in Jerusalem manifests God's power and presence. The fire and trumpet blast on Sinai were momentary signs of God's presence, while the Spirit is an abiding, divine presence given "to you and your children and to all those far off."

The Corinthian community to which Paul writes was beset with serious divisions. Among the causes were jealousy and rivalry, divisive attitudes that Paul addresses throughout the letter. In today's reading we hear Paul's consternation at people's envy when one person's spiritual gift appears more important than another's. He admits that there are different gifts, different forms of service, but what his audience does not realize is that they all come from the same Spirit. He then shows that the diversity of gifts is just as necessary for the community as the different parts of the body are for an individual.

As Jesus bids farewell to his disciples he assures them that they will not be alone, that his Father will send the Spirit, one who will stand beside them as their counselor and support, especially in times of trial. The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, will remind the disciples of all that Jesus as told them. Thus, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit will

all make their dwelling place within each of his disciples.

Cardinal Thomas Tobin, archbishop of Newark, in an April 17th interview with NBC's Anne Thompson on the "Today Show," said that the language used by the catechism to describe homosexual acts is "very unfortunate." How can you welcome people that you call "intrinsically disordered?" asked Thompson. "Well, I don't call them intrinsically disordered," Tobin answered. "But isn't that the catechism of the Catholic Church," asked Thompson. "That is," said Tobin, "it's very unfortunate language. Lets hope that eventually that language is little less hurtful." Tobin said, "In too many parts of our church LGBT people have been made to feel unwelcome, excluded and even ashamed." He cited the book by Father James Martin, SJ, which has called for the church to amend the language with which it discusses homosexuality. "Father Martin's brave prophetic and inspiring book marks an essential step in inviting church leaders to minister with more compassion, and in reminding LGBT Catholics that they are as much a part of our church as any other Catholic."

Since 1971, Pennsylvania has closed more Catholic churches than any other state in the country. To date, 532 churches have been closed in the state, followed closely by New York State which has closed 500 churches in the same time period. The next highest state with church closures is Ohio with 171 having been closed. During that same time period, Pennsylvania lost 17% of it's Catholic population while states like North Carolina saw an increase of 922%;; Georgia an increase of 858%; Nevada an increase of 635%. While churches are being closed in the northeast. the church cannot open parishes fast enough for the growing population in the South and West, which includes new generations of immigrants. Texas alone has added 293 new parishes in this time period and Florida 165.

A Catholic-led study released this month claims Germany's Catholic and Protestant churches could lose half their members in the next 40 years amid changing demographics and as more adults abandon their faith. The study notes a significant drop in Baptisms and an aging population which will bring this about. The outcome will leave both churches under severe financial strains and slashed budgets. The authors predict that their combined membership would plummet from 45 million to 34.8 million by 2035 and 22.7 million by 2060. The study calculates that inflation, rising maintenance costs and other factors would lead the two churches to require \$28 billion a year by 2026 whereas today the total budget is \$13.5 billion.

We had planned to carpet the Food Pantry, but the volunteers asked us not to put carpet down because they mop the area each week after the Food Pantry is finished. We've purchased some attractive wooden tiles which are waterproof and they are being installed. That area gets a great deal of traffic on Tuesday mornings with the Food Pantry. A conference room in the Food Pantry is also used for a weekly AA meeting as well as for meetings with the festival chairs, etc.

Thank you for your generous support of the Catholic Services Appeal. That appeal is the largest fundraiser for the diocese, and each parish is given assessment based on your last three years of income. This year's assessment is \$88,000.

Congratulations to parishioner and Eucharistic Minister Shirley Winschel who was recently elected to the Millcreek School Board. She will provide quality leadership.

96 DAYS TO THE 2019 ERIE IRISH FESTIVAL SOME THOUGHTS ON WHITSUN

This weekend is Pentecost Sunday. In Ireland, the 7th Sunday after Easter, the Pentecost, is Whitsunday,

Whit Sunday, or Whitsun, (originally White Sunday—perhaps in honor of the physical appearance of the holy ghost) and it's a very big deal, though mostly for reasons the Catholic Church does not condone.

In England, Whitsuntide, the week following Whit Sunday, is a time of great celebration, marked by fairs, parades, and folk dancing, with girls always dressed in white. It corresponds to an old pagan holiday celebrating the coming of summer and it's actually a national holiday—Whitsun Monday (now the Spring Bank Holiday).

Perhaps because Whitsuntide is so beloved in England. Irish folklore holds that it is a time of bad omens and evil portent. A child born at Whitsuntide is called a Cingciseach (from Cingcis—Irish for Pentecost), and is destined to become a murderer or to die a violent death. It is believed, however, that this "curse" can be removed if the Cingciseach murders something soon after birth, so a worm will be placed in the baby's hand and made to die there. Or, the baby can be passed through a hole in an earthen wall or similar structure in symbolic burial and rebirth. Any animal born at Whitsuntide is also destined to cause the death of someone—a Whitsuntide-born calf. for example, will certainly grow into a bull that will eventually gore someone to death. In order to obviate this, the baby animal is placed on the ground and covered with sod in a similar symbolic burial that will remove the animal's wickedness. Irish folklore also holds that people who are ill are more likely to die at Whitsuntide, so a clod of earth will be placed on their heads, another symbolic burial, to prevent their death.

Cuts or wounds received on Whitsun will not heal until the following year, so farmers refrain from tasks like sharpening tools or shearing sheep. In Ireland, water is especially dangerous at Whitsuntide and children are never allowed near lakes or rivers. And don't fall asleep during the day, give away salt, or paint your house on Whitsun! Very bad luck will follow.

Thus, it is for this reason that the 2019 Erie Irish Festival is held in September. So join us, free of any possibility of bad omens or evil portent, for what will be the biggest and best Erie Irish Festival ever held not at Whitsuntide.
