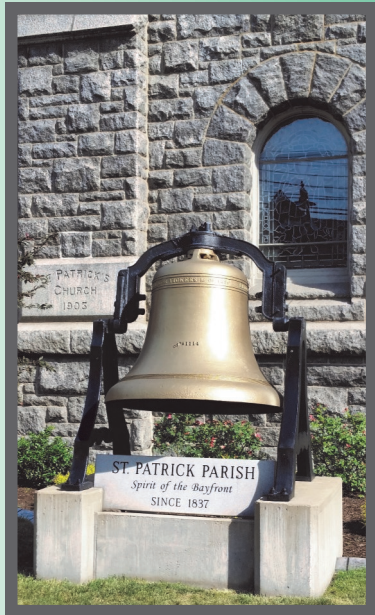

From the Pastor's Desk...



Today is the Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The author of Genesis presents a profound understanding of the Creator's chosen way of relating to his creatures: he does not remain aloof, but strolls in the garden and personally speaks with his created. Even after their sin, he does not abandon them, but approaches them. The consciousness of their nakedness betrays the couple's guilt, and they pretend to escape condemnation by shifting blame. Adam blames Eve and she blames the serpent. God will punish all three and it will be twofold: the weariness of existence and the perennial battle with the seductive influence of the evil one. Human nature will have to await the coming of Christ who will restore human dignity. Note that the man is insecure and ashamed; he tried to justify himself and deflect the blame onto God for giving him the woman and onto the woman for offering him the fruit. Thus they are alienated from one another. Every human relationship has been disrupted. Humiliation, domination, conflict, suffering—all the consequences of sin.

In the verses prior to today's reading, Paul speaks of the adversities he experiences in his ministry and sees himself as the person who lives between Adam and Christ. Earlier he had written that Jesus' affliction and death is constantly at work in us. Now he writes of the life-giving effect of the risen Jesus on us and on the church.

In our gospel members of Jesus' family think he is out of his mind and religious authorities accuse him of being possessed by the devil. This is not the first time that Mark reports that Jesus meets rejection. There is growing rejection and hostility to him because he does not conform to what people expect. Jesus uses the occasion of his family's attempt at intervention to redefine the real family of God. He invites his hearers to become a part of that family, the basis of which is an intimate friendship with God and obedience to his will. The matter in question is Jesus' authority; and the scribes accuse him of using demonic

power to cast out demons. Jesus replies with parables based on one principle: a power that battles against itself is bound to collapse

The work of renovating the Men's Room in church is almost complete. We have now completely renovated the Women's restroom, the Men's restroom and the one behind the altar.

Once the pipe organ work is completed, we will tile the area in the vestibule and the back of church as well as carpet the balcony.

Our parish Food Pantry served 381 families in the month of April distributing 9,854 pounds of food. The cost to the parish was \$274.42. You may notice that the number of clients has decreased significantly from past numbers when we often served 900 families a month. I'm told that this decrease is being seen at all the food pantries in the county and no one is sure of the cause. While the unemployment rate has dropped significantly, most of the jobs obtained by poor people are only paying minimum wage and so they still need help with food. One suggestion is that people are working these minimum wage jobs and are thus unable to come to the food pantry because of their work schedule.

The Irish Cultural Society is going to erect a monument to Irish immigrants on the back of the lawn on the east side of the church. The monument will be a similar granite to that on the church so that the two will blend together. We are going to sign an agreement that the maintenance of this monument is not the responsibility of the parish, but of the Irish Cultural Society.

We held a joint meeting of the Finance Council and Parish Council this past week as there were so many things to discuss that overlap both jurisdictions. They approved some significant expenditures for the parish: \$52,000 to replace the tile in the vestibule and the back of church; \$17,000 to replace the roof on the Food Pantry (this was previously approved and a grant from the Erie Community Foundation is covering all of these costs); \$14,000 for the Men's Room in church. They also approved plans for a Wedding Anniversary service in church sometime in the next few

months followed by a reception in the rectory. We will invite all parishioners having a 60th, 50th, 40th, 25th or 10 year anniversary this year. They also approved plans for another Anointing Service for the sick and elderly to be held in the fall. In addition, they approved the budget which we will now submit to the diocese for the 2018/19 fiscal year. That budget shows income of \$651,000 and expenses of \$643,000. We will publish the budget in the next few weeks so you can all see it. Both council members also took the opportunity to see the work that has been done on the second floor of the rectory.

We're in rather desperate need of additional Eucharistic Ministers. So many of our people spend the winters in Florida that it is really difficult trying to schedule Eucharistic Ministers and not put them on so often that it becomes a burden to them. If you are interested in helping, please contact the parish office.

You may also have noticed that we have two new lectors—both young girls in elementary school who do a beautiful job with the readings. They are Lindsay Armanini and Lauren McCarthy. If any other children are interested in helping with this, please contact the parish office. We'd love to have you.

A new study shows that 40% of all Catholics in the U.S. are Hispanic; 50% of Catholics ages 14 to 29 are Hispanic; and 55% of Catholics under the age of 14 are Hispanic. The study shows that 52% of Hispanics were Catholic in 2016, for a total of 30.6 million, up from 29.7 million in 2010.

If you haven't yet made a pledge or gift to the Catholic Services Appeal, would you consider doing so? Any money generated over our assessment (\$84,000) remains in the parish and will be used toward the cost of new tiles in church.
