

From the Pastor's Desk...

The allegory in today's first reading of the Lord breaking off the top of the cedar tree and planting it on Zion is a



reference to King Zedekiah, the corrupt king who is the cedar, and his nephew Jehoiachin, now in exile in Babylon, who is the sprig. God will accomplish what earthly kings attempted and Israel will thrive under an honest ruler from the line of David. When Ezechial proclaims that "all the trees of the field shall know that I, the Lord, bring low the mighty tree, lift high the lowly tree," he asserts God's design that Israel and every nation will acknowledge God's sovereignty. God will first destroy, they restore.

In our second reading, Paul demonstrates how the awareness of the last things can affect the way we live in the present. He expresses the tension between present and future with the metaphor of temporary residence in the land. We are like migrants living far from our home, who is the Lord, in whom we believe but have not yet seen. The union with Christ will take place at the end of life as we know it. While we are exiles, we are confident that our hope will be fulfilled. At death we will be faced with the shallowness or depth of our actions and commitments in life.

Today's parable stressed the power of the seed to grow in and of itself. Jesus initiates the reign of God by sowing the Word; it sprouts and develops discretely yet assuredly until the harvest at the Last Judgment. God's reign begins with something very small that grows of its own inner strength into something very big and provides a nesting place for birds, an image for the universality of God's reign (a reference to the first reading). The farmer can see the seeds starting to sprout, also the weeds, etc. But from another perspective, if a grain of wheat could speak for itself, how might it recall the adventure? It can't see the whole field blossoming any more than we can see the whole of God's reign. We are in the thick of it. God, on the other hand, is like the sower who can see the whole thing from above.

From the Pastor's Desk continued...

Today is Father's Day, and our prayer is that God particularly bless our fathers and grandfathers and reward those who have gone before us with eternal life.

A multigenerational study that began in 1971 finds a little more than one in fiver boomers became more religious in the transition from their 50s to their 60s. Those people cite several reasons for the change from seeking solace in life after the death of a spouse to finding other sources of meaning after the loss of a job to a desire to pass on religious beliefs to their grandchildren. The study reveals that not only are grandparents expected to live longer, more vigorous lives, but the research finds their level of religiosity can have a significant impact on the faith of their grandchildren. Fifty-six percent of aging boomers say their religiosity was stable over the period, but 21 percent reported an increase in religiosity. Twelve percent said they were never religious. Some form of suffering was influential for baby boomers who reported being more religious. In the study of adults 65 and older, prayer was associated with increases in self-esteem, optimism and increased life satisfaction for participants who reported a close, loving, supportive attachment to God. The study finds that grandparents influence their grandchildren independently of parents. Finally, the study concludes that this may be the last generation to have had such widespread exposure to religion in childhood and to have been active religious consumers in their earlier lives.

U. S. Catholic dioceses contributed more than \$58.7 million to recovery efforts in the wake of 2017 hurricanes and Mexico earthquakes. In a breakdown, Catholics gave \$37.2 million to Hurricane Harvey relief; \$12.8 million to Hurricane Irma; \$6.1 million to Hurricane Maria and \$3.5 million to the earthquake in Mexico. That is an incredibly generous response on the part of American Catholics.

A recent Pew Research study shows that western Europe has become one of the world's most secular regions. Although the vast majority of adults say they were baptized, today many do not describe themselves as Christians. Yes most adults surveyed do consider themselves as Christians, even if they seldom go to church. The survey showed that non-practicing Christians make up the biggest share of the population. In the United Kingdom, for example, there are roughly three times as many non-practicing Christians (55%) as there are church-attending Christians (18%). Interestingly, Christian identity in Western Europe is associated with higher levels of negative sentiment toward immigrants and religious minorities.
