


Today is the Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Imprisoned, mocked, abandoned, Jeremiah's prophetic mission has



resulted in intense suffering and persecution. Who is to blame? Jeremiah says God is. The Word of the Lord that should have been a source of strength for Jeremiah, has instead brought reproach and derision all day long. Today's reading is Jeremiah's sixth lament and they depict him on the edge of despair. He will even curse the day he was born. In the context of such lamenting, Jeremiah's declaration that "the Lord is with me, " and his jubilant "sing to the Lord, for he has rescued the life of the poor" express an extraordinary mood shift. Such sharp shifts are very common among the OT prophets.

To illustrate God's grace, Paul sets up a contrast between Adam and Christ, between sin and grace. As he develops his argument, Paul uses complicated sentences and logic. He presents Adam as a "type" of Christ. A "type" in the OT is most often seen as a positive foreshadowing that is brought to fullness or perfection in the NT, particularly in Christ. In this passage, however, Adam is a negative foreshadowing. Paul uses the Greek word Anthropos, which in these terrible translations we work with, is translated "man," but it actually means the "human person." Beginning with Adam, sin and death spread throughout the world. Paul says sin entered through one anthropos Adam, but from another anthropos, Christ, we receive something so much greater.

Jesus continues to instruct the twelve. He has already told them he is sending them out as sheep among wolves, that they will endure extreme persecution. He is telling them—and us that we are to speak in the light what Jesus proclaimed in darkness, to proclaim from the rooftops what was a mere whisper. Three times he tells them not to be afraid. He reminds them that they are to expect persecution; they are not above the Master. He tells them not to fear those who can kill the body but not the soul.

From the Pastor's Desk continued...

A recent report on the ordination class of 2017 shows that 590 men were ordained priests in the United States this year. (That compares to 1,594 being ordained in 1965). The average age of the newly ordained is 34 for diocesan priests and 36 for religious order priests. While the Hispanic presence in the American church continues to grow in leaps and bounds, only 14% of those ordained this year are Hispanic. In many areas of the country, the Hispanic Catholics outnumber Anglo Catholics but vocations to priesthood have not kept pace. And, interestingly, 48% of the newly ordained this year said that they were discouraged from considering priesthood by one or more persons. The majority said friends and classmates discouraged them the most, but that family members also discouraged them. Thirteen percent said their mother discouraged them and eleven percent said their father did.

We will close the fiscal year later this week with the end of June. Once all of the data is compiled, I'll publish a spiritual and financial report so that you can see where everything stands. I'm happy to tell you that with the end of this fiscal year, we are completely debt free. You may recall that we borrowed \$780,000 from the diocese when we did the restoration of the church in 2012. Bids for that work came in almost \$200,000 above our budget but the committee voted to proceed with the thinking that we could pay that off and that we would repay the diocese in 5 years. Fortunately, we have been able to stick to that timetable and everything is now completely paid off.

One of the most rewarding realities in our 2016/17 Spiritual Report is a comparison of the number of baptisms to the number of deaths. The baptisms way outpace the deaths; a reality that in many of our parishes today is just the opposite more people are dying than are being baptized. At St. Patrick's, almost 70% of our funerals are non-parishioners. Someone was baptized and married here, etc. and the family calls asking that their parent be buried here. In addition, a large number of people are dying today who do not belong to a parish and call for a funeral here.

Another reality of funerals today is that many families delay a funeral for a week or more and/or many of them schedule a funeral on Saturday so it is more convenient for people. You may recall that Parish Council enacted a policy that we do not schedule non-parishioner funerals more than three days out because what happens is we might get a non-parishioner funeral scheduled for a day (and it was scheduled a couple of weeks ago) and then a parishioner dies and we can not schedule them.

Now that we think (and hope and pray) that we have found the cause of the water leak on the east wall of the church, they are going to go up to make sure that the plaster is dry. If that is the case, we will get some paint from Conrad Schmitt & Co. (the company who did the restoration) and then repair the damaged area. If you have joined the parish in recent years and do not remember the condition of the church before the restoration, you can go into the southeast tower room (the handicapped entrance) and see what the entire church looked like. We purposely left that area unrestored so people could see.

The St. Patrick Food Pantry distributed 13,538 pounds of food during the month of May. The cost to the parish was \$352.12. We served 566 families which included 315 elderly and 729 children.

Congratulations to Robert & Mildred Biebel who today are celebrating their seventieth wedding anniversary.
