



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In the prophecy from Isaiah, the Lord speaks to the people on



their way home from the Babylonian Exile. Upon their return they find their beloved Jerusalem, including the Temple, in ruins. While they are mourning this bleak reality, God urges them to rejoice in the midst of their present sorrow because of what God will do for Jerusalem in the future. He offers them the most comforting and reassuring of images: a mother nursing her child. The verses just before today's reading describe Jerusalem giving birth and how she will care for her offspring. The image of Mother Jerusalem is replete with words that emphasize the extent of God's generosity. The word we hear is the familiar shalom, a rich concept that means wholeness, harmony and completeness. The entire image expresses the constant care and delight that a mother takes in her children.

In the final verses of his letter to the Galatians. Paul writes to the community "in his own hand," giving his concluding remarks a deeply personal tone. Having argued throughout the letter against those who demanded circumcision, Paul summarizes his gospel: the cross of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Paul is so immersed in Christ that he can say he is co-crucified with him and has died to this world. Although the world (kosmos) is sometimes a neutral term referring to the earth and its inhabitants. Paul uses the word here to refer to those in opposition to God, those who reject the cross of Christ. The "world" signifies the old order in contrast to the new creation inaugurated by the cross of Christ. Those who receive God's word live neither according to the standards of the world nor according to the standard imposed by the law. After the harsh language in Galatians, this closing is filled with affection.

In sending our seventy two disciples, Jesus inaugurates the mission of spreading the gospel to the whole world. In Genesis 10, seventy two symbolizes the number of inhabitants of the whole

world. Jesus frequently uses images that would be familiar to his audience. The harvest metaphor would be familiar in first century Palestine. The second image is lambs among wolves, familiar to the shepherds watching their flocks. He concludes by telling them they are not to be weighed down by anything that would prevent them from continuing on their journey

A new study examining the correlation between religion and marital happiness found that women who are part of a highly religious traditional couple are most likely to report being happy in marriage, as well as sexually satisfied in their relationship. In addition, a woman in a highly religious couple was most likely to report that she and her spouse share responsibility for important household decisions, rather than one spouse making all the family's decisions. The study of families in 11 countries, conducted by the Institute for Family Studies, found that "highly religious couples in heterosexual relationships" enjoy happier marriages and more sexual satisfaction than less religious, mixed or secular couples. The authors focused on four outcomes regarding marriage: relationship, quality, domestic violence and infidelity. They note that many societies are experiencing a general turning away from "traditional" family life as fewer people get married and have children, and more people cohabitate or wait to marry later in life.

In the study, 19% of couples reported never attending religious services, 60% attended only minimally, and 21% attended regularly. Both women and men in "highly religious" couples—ie., regular attendees, reported significantly greater satisfaction in their relationship than did both the other groups, with liberal, secular couples running a close second. The difference was most notable for women: those in "highly religious" relationships were about 50% more likely to report that they are "strongly satisfied" with their sexual relationship than their secular and less religious counterparts.

In preparing to do work on the large side porch of the rectory, we discovered that it was an open porch for much of its life. You might notice drains all along the side of it to drain water from rain and snow. The windows which today enclose the the porch were not installed until the 1940s or 1950s. We found some old photographs that show the area as an open porch. When I was a young priest in the early 1970s, Father Tom Plunkett, then the pastor (and a great nephew of the Cauley brothers), hosted an Open House every Friday night for priests of the diocese. In those days the enclosed porch was filled with rattan furniture and was regularly used. The small room we now use as a copy room was a bar! And the dining room table was piled high with cold cuts. macaroni salad, potato salad, etc. There would be 50—75 priests here every Friday night. Today we barely have that many priests in the entire diocese. And Sunday night was open house at St. Peter's Cathedral the entire time that Msgr. John Slater was pastor. Again, there would be 50—75 priests there. Those days are long gone. Today we only have two parishes in the entire diocese with an assistant. In every other case, priests are now living alone sometimes in huge rectories.

We are laying a new floor on that porch, similar to the new floor we laid in the Food Pantry. Once that floor is laid, the new entrance door will be put in place and locked. People coming to that entrance can ring the bell and the office staff can see them from their desk as well as speak with them. If they determine they have business here, they can release the door from their desk and allow the visitor to enter.

We recently received an \$800 donation to the St. Patrick Foundation in honor of Margaret Zattosky's 90th birthday!

68 DAYS TO THE 2019 ERIE IRISH FESTIVAL

HOW NOT TO INSULT AN IRISHMAN WHEN ORDERING A BEER.



One of the most popular beverages that we serve at the Erie Irish Festival is a beer "cocktail." It is composed of 8 ounces of Harp—a pale Irish lager—with 8 ounces of Guinness stout laid on top. When made properly, pouring the Guinness carefully over a spoon, the two beers do not mix, and you get a glass with a golden bottom and a dark brown top. Over here we call it a "Black and Tan," but in Ireland, where the drink is also popular, they call it a "Half and Half."

The term "Black and Tan" is abhorrent to the Irish as it conjures up the brutality of English oppression. One hundred years ago, during the Irish war for independence, Winston Churchill, then British Secretary of State for War, in an effort to quell the rising tide of Irish nationalism, recruited a para-military police force called the Royal Irish Constabulary Special Reserve (the RIC), mostly from English veterans of WWI, and sent them to Ireland to maintain order and to fight the Irish Republican Army (the IRA). The RIC showed up in Ireland with a hurriedly devised uniform of British khaki and dark green or blue and were dubbed the "Black and Tans" by the Irish. The term is an insult based on the resemblance of the uniform to the coat of an Irish beagle.

The black and tans were poorly trained and poorly disciplined and in response to IRA attacks engaged in vicious reprisals against civilians, committing revenge killings and burning the homes and even the villages of suspected IRA members or their families. Laying siege to the town of Tralee, they killed three civilians and prevented the inhabitants there from getting food for a week. And more. One hundred years later, "Black and Tan" is still a hated term in Ireland. In fact, recently, both Ben and Jerry's and Nike have had to apologize to the Irish for promoting products with that name.

You will no doubt hear the still popular Irish song "Come Out, Ye Black and Tans" at the Erie Irish Festival. The song describes an Irish father who comes home "tight" from the pub and invites his RIC neighbors to come out and fight "me like a man."

So now, when you buy your festival raffle ticket and win the trip for two to Ireland (and you will), and you pop into that charming little pub in Tralee for a pint (and you should), you'll know to order a Half and Half and not a Black and Tan, and you'll know why.
