



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. An ancient Latin saying, "lex orandi, lex credenda" (the law of



prayer is the law of belief) means that the way we pray expresses what we believe about God. about ourselves and about the world. Today's reading from Wisdom is a notable example of a prayer addressed to the Lord that conveys what the Jewish people believed about God and how they were called to live in accordance with that belief. The prayer, like Wisdom literature in general, combines ways of thinking, believing, living, and teaching those who hear how to be faithful to the God in whom they believe. The prayer begins with a restatement of the fundamental belief that there is only one God who cares for all people. This God who cares is also the God who judges; the God who is compassionate is also the God who can condemn. God's actions in creation and history have taught people how they are to pattern their own lives. Like God, people who are just must also be kind, and the human exercise of power must be tempered with leniency. This prayer shows that the way of praying is the way of believing and the way of living that belief.

Paul tells us that praying is not always easy and we need the help of God's spirit. Our human weakness limits us. The verb Paul uses for "help" is found only one other time in the New Testament when Martha asks that her sister Mary help her with household tasks. The verb means to share the responsibility of the task, to take part in the action with the other, not to take it over, but to join in it. As Martha wanted Mary's help, we likewise want the assistance of God's Spirit working within us as we pray.

Jesus invites us to consider the meaning of the Kingdom of Heaven by using three simple parables. The first, the one who sows seed and one who sows weeds, is the only parable in the gospels that Jesus interprets for his disciples. The sower is Jesus himself, the enemy who sows weeds is the devil. It is important to understand

that both wheat and weeds grow together and only at the final judgment will the righteous and the evil be separated. We can easily see that very mixture in the church itself where we experience both healthy, vigorous wheat, and unhealthy, destructive weeds growing and struggling and striving. We can further see both in our very selves with both wheat and weeds present in our hearts, our thoughts and our actions.

Mark your calendar for Tuesday, August 8th, Erie Gives Day. Any contribution you make to the parish that day shares in a several hundred thousand dollar pool of money that has been contributed by various Erie businesses and organizations. The last two years, St. Patrick's has generated more revenue on that day than any other parish in the city.

A new study by the Barna group looks at people who are churched (attended church within the last seven days), unchurched (not attended in the last six months) and de-churched (do not attend.) The study shows that the most unchurched cities in America are San Francisco with 60% unchurched, Reno, NV with 59% and Boston/ Springfield/Holyoke, MA with 57% unchurched. Also high on the list of those cities were Albany (51%), Philadelphia, Denver and Los Angeles (47%). Both Boston and Philadelphia were once the strongest church attending Catholic cities in the nation, but both were hit very hard by the sex abuse scandal. The most churched cities in the US were Chattanooga, TN and Salt Lake City (59%) and Augusta, GA at 57%.

I have been sharing with you the broad recommendations of the Faith Formation Task Force which are (1) Faith Formation is a lifelong process; (2) We have to incorporate a vision which takes us beyond present structures; (3) Parish leadership has to provide trained professional people for Religious Education, etc.; (4) Diocesan leadership has to develop and provide Diocesan standards for the training of professionals in faith formation; (5) the role of the family must include parents in all aspects of their child's faith formation while we recognize the diverse family structures in our parishes and schools. This stage also notes that one-size-fits-all approach will no longer work; and (6) Lay ministry.

That final recommendation on lay ministry notes that we will need to train lay people to assume leadership positions in various ministries in collaboration with their pastors. It further notes that we have to encourage training and development for anyone involved in ministry. And, finally, it asked that we encourage collaboration for every apostolic and missionary undertaking sponsored by a local parish. This, too, may require some restructuring of funds or new investment.

Today is our annual Mission Appeal. Each Catholic parish is required to host a missionary once a year for two reasons: to broaden our understanding of the missionary work of the church and to lend our prayer and financial support. Our guest this weekend is Father Bill Christy, a Pittsburgh priest who will speak to us about the missionary work in the Archdiocese of Arusha, Tanzania. Fr. Christy is a native Pennsylvanian whose mother is from Erie. As a Spiritan missionary he served 15 years in the Arusha Archdiocese. The Archdiocese covers 26,000 square miles, an area the size of South Carolina.

In 1970, there was one priest for every 800 Catholics in the United States. Today, that number has more than doubled, with one priest for every 1,800 Catholics. The Archdiocese of Los Angeles, the largest in the United States, with a Catholic population of over 4 million, has one priest for every 3,833 Catholics.

Work is finishing up on the rectory garages. Most of the mortar between the bricks was gone and there were just general repairs needed to the building. Again, it's over a hundred years old and has its share of problems. Hopefully, it is now up to par. This summer we've spent \$41,000 on the chimney at the church, \$8,000 repairing and sealing the east wall of the church and \$20,000 on the garages. That is in addition to replacing several more windows at a cost of \$16,000. With what windows we have replaced, there are only 16 left to be done. The rectory has 101 windows, and no two are the same size!!!

Fr. Bill Christy will be preaching on behalf of the Archdiocese of Arusha, Tanzania for the Mission Cooperative Plan. Fr. Bill is a western Pennsylvania native. His mother is from Erie and his father from Tidioute. As a Spiritan missionary he served 15 years in Arusha Archdiocese; 2 years as seminarian and 13 as a priest. His ministry was primarily in First Evangelization with the Maasai people in North Central Tanzania. He was recalled to the US in 2004 and served at Duquesne University in Campus Ministry for 3 years before being sent to Australia to work in Aboriginal ministry. He ministered for 6 years in the Aboriginal reservations of Western Australia. Now having returned to Duquesne University he is again part of the Campus Ministry.

#### The Catholic Archdiocese of Arusha

The Catholic Archdiocese of Arusha is situated in the Northern part of Tanzania. According to the 2013 statistics, Arusha region alone, the population is 2,552,853. The number of Catholics is approximately 500,000. The rest belongs to other Christian denominations and two non-Christian religions, those who follow the traditional religion (traditionalists) and Muslims

Arusha is the third largest town in Tanzania having a population of 282,712 inhabitants at the last census in 2002. Arusha is situated at the foot of Mount Meru and is an important centre of activity in Northern Tanzania. Some areas in the town are very overcrowded. with poor living conditions, housing and sanitation. Several projects are targeted towards street dwellers, street children and orphans.

The surrounding volcanic areas and savannas are inhabited by Maasai with a dominantly pastoralist lifestyle. The main source of wealth and income derives from cattle. Some agriculture has been introduced recently. The Arusha Archdiocese is the largest diocese in Tanzania and covers an area of 26,000 square miles, about the size of South Carolina.
