

From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. "Ecclesiastes" is the Greek translation of the Hebrew name of this book, Qoheleth, which means a collector of wisdom. The singularly pessimistic perspective of the book seems foreign to everything else said in the Bible. While an occasional ray of sunlight breaks through the author's gloom, the book's overall message reeks of skepticism and argues against finding any lasting value in the things of life, not money, not fame, not pleasures, nothing. The author sees life as futile and pointless. Death awaits us. It's no wonder this is the only time we read from this book in the Sundays of the year. But remember that it is written by a man of faith. There is no denying the truth that nothing endures; we can't take our wealth or fame with us for our favorite possessions. Jesus will say the same in today's gospel.

The chief difference between our first two readings today is that Paul offers a clear alternative to the things of this world that he says lead to futility and meaninglessness. Like Ecclesiastes, he tells us that worldly things don't sustain us and don't endure. In baptism we experience the saving death of Christ as well as a share in his resurrection. He notes that our new life is hidden from a world that doesn't understand us and from the devil who would take it from us. It's even hidden from ourselves if we lose heart. Paul concludes by noting that differences have been removed in Christ. It's our oneness in him that makes us distinct, not our differences in color or nationalities.

Echoes of our first reading can be heard in the gospel, but the impact is quite different. First, Jesus refuses to arbitrate a quarrel between brothers because it is driven by greed. He notes that possessions don't substitute for the real things of life. The theme of the first reading continues as

we hear a parable about someone fretting about their wealth, while Jesus warns that we must store up treasure not for ourselves but instead become rich in the kingdom of God.

Should a homeless person approach you and ask for money, please do not give them anything. We have programs in place to care for their every need: meals, shelter, medical care, haircuts, dental care, etc. Any money you give them is only going for alcohol or drugs. By giving them money you are worsening their situation, rather than bettering it.

Pope Francis recently visited Armenia and gave a homily on how we deal with life situations that are unsettling and difficult. As I read his words, I thought of so many of our people going through the transition from the parish they have known their whole life to a new parish setting. As we experience this pastoral planning and parish reconfiguration, let me share a few points he made. He suggests that when faced with such situations. the first foundation is *memory*. We cannot forget all the good that we experienced in a situation such as our parish. Memory is incredibly important lest we forget all that was accomplished in a situation. Second, he says, is *faith*. He notes that change and danger can dim the light of faith and there arises the temptation to remain in the past, to hang on to something that belongs in another age as if faith were an illuminated book to be kept in a museum. He noted that once we get locked in history, faith loses its power to transform. Faith is constantly born and re-born from the living moment; not the past. And, finally, he said we need a merciful love. We are called, he said, to build and rebuild, to create paths of unity not division. He noted that the journey of life includes constant change, but a change that is most clearly marked by charity, love and unity. The Christian doesn't fight change. We cannot live in the past, he concluded.

I apologize for how difficult it was to understand the priest who was here. He spoke on Saturday evening, but Sunday morning I spoke on his behalf and had him thank the congregation for your prayers and support.

Erie Gives Day is Tuesday, August 9. Any gift to St. Patrick's Parish that day receives a share of the fund established to provide more dollars.

Pope Francis has greatly expedited the annulment process, and Bishop Persico has added staff to the Marriage Tribunal to help process cases in our own diocese. In addition, he has waved all fees connected with an annulment, so there is no charge. If anyone is interested in pursuing an annulment and have questions, please contact me and I'll help in whatever way I can.

Poets have glorified it, patriots have died for it, tenors sing its praises—and there's a reason why. When we think of Ireland sometimes we run to the clichés—the rowdy pubs of Temple Bar, the beautiful green eyed girls with fiery red hair and the tempers to match, the lilting broque and the friendly smile of the local shopkeeper—and to be sure, that's all there. But there's more, so much more. If you've been, you know. If you haven't, you need to know. And the only way to know, is to go, and go deep—off the beaten path, along the warren of hedge-row fringed back roads, through those impossibly green fields rimmed with white stone walls, to that little village over the rickety bridge that doesn't even seem to be on the map, where everyone turns and smiles when you walk into the dark little pub for directions, and where you find yourself, still sitting, four hours later, chatting like a local, over a pint, with your new Irish friends. Well that's the trip that we are raffling off this year at the Festival.

This year's trip is truly special—an opportunity to get lost and found at the same time: It's a self-guided, self-driven tour that includes a car, bed and breakfast accommodations at any of 800 3 and 4 star B&Bs, heavy on the second B with full Irish breakfasts, guide books to help you navigate (but plan to get lost, it's more fun!), and discount vouchers for attractions. The tour is provided by CIE Tours International, one of the most experienced and trusted travel companies around. And St. Pats picks up the airfare. Six nights, two people, heaven on earth—and yours perhaps for the price of a raffle ticket. Can we guarantee you will win? No. But we can guarantee you won't if you don't have a ticket.

Each family in the parish has been sent 12 raffle tickets to sell (or buy—hey, no one says you can't buy your own raffle tickets). They are 3 for \$10. If every family sells (or buys) their 12 tickets, we'll have \$32,000. And it's easy: once you sell (or buy, we're okay with you buying them), fill out the stubs, stick them in the envelope provided, along with the cash or check, and mail them or, even easier, drop them in the collection basket at any mass. If you can't sell all of your tickets, please drop them back in the collection basket so others can try to sell them.

If you are the lucky winner, and we're sure you will be, but you absolutely cannot make the trip to Ireland during 2017, you can opt to take a cash payout of \$3,000. Although we recommend that you do indeed arise and go to Innisfee, as W.B. Yeats did 125 years ago, we understand that three thousand bucks is a lot of money that could help do a lot of things. The choice is yours.
