



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Book of Joshua is more than a long report of battles and



conquests; it is a theological tract about the faith-fulness of God who fulfills his promises. The concluding chapter, from which today's reading is taken, includes a call to commitment—an invitation to the people now taking possession of the Promised land, to renew the covenant their ancestors made at Sinai. After the prologue which reviews what God has done for his people, Joshua measures their determination to remain faithful.

In our second reading, Paul lays out a theological foundation for the Ephesians' domestic and community life. His opening statement, "be subordinate to one another," is a shorthand way of telling them to grow together peacefully. Out of Christ's death was born a church holy and unblemished. In Christ believers are a single body, the growth of which depends on the well-being of every member. Drawing on the institution of marriage in Genesis 2:24, Paul stamps the marriage bond with a new meaning: the intimate relationship between Christ and the church. The wife is to serve her husband in the same spirit as the church represents Christ's interest, and the husband is to care for his wife with the same devotion as Christ cares for the church. The husband represents Christ, who gave his life for the redemption of the church, and the wife represents the church, who is submissive to Christ. This is a difficult reading to hear today. It does not promote a senseless, blind obedience or degrading submission of women to men, and it does not imply the abuse of power of one person over another. The relationship is modeled upon Chris's self-sacrificing love and indicates the constant concern on the husband's part for her well-being.

Jesus knows that as long as he performs miracles, the crowds will follow him. But, after filling bellies and reviving hope, Jesus does not excuse us from the test: he talks about the Bread of

life and invites us to renounce any material benefit we might have planned for ourselves; instead he focuses on our spiritual nature.

A very good friend of mine who lives in Chicago is an accomplished organist. I've spoken with Peter and he is going to come and present a Sunday afternoon 4 PM concert on our pipe organ on Sunday, October 28. In discussing the program, he noted that most organ concerts are with the classical organ compositions that organists are familiar with, but not the average person in the pew. He suggested that, instead, he do a series of improvisations on religious music that we are more familiar with and which will highlight all aspects of the organ. The concert will also include a couple of presentations by our choir. Peter has also asked that we get a trumpet player so that he can do one or two organ and trumpet pieces. The concert will be open to the public at no charge.

Our pipe organ was built by the Tellers Organ Company of Erie in 1903 at a cost of \$2,853. A similar pipe organ was built for the Basilica of the Sacred Heart at Notre Dame University in 1869. That 3,000 pipes pipe organ was used until 2015 when the Murdy family donated a new much larger pipe organ of 5,125 pipes.

Each year we rent a number of items for the Irish Festival. These are all items used in the preparation of the food, ie., deep fryers, etc. The cost each year is \$1,700. Eric Albright, chair for this year and next, came to me recently and said he had explored the possibility of our buying these items, and we could do so for a cost of \$4,500. I told him to go ahead and purchase them as they will pay for themselves in 3 years. In addition, Calamari's will rent them from us several times a year for events they are having thus giving us additional income from them.

On Wednesday, September 26, we will host a Wedding Anniversary Celebration. Invited are couples who this year are celebrating their 10th, 25th, 40th or 50th wedding anniversary. We will gather in church at 5:30 PM for a brief ceremony in which everyone will renew their marriage vows. Following that brief ceremony, everyone is invited to the rectory for a two hour cocktail party with a

bar and heavy finger foods. We ask that you call the parish office (454-8085) and indicate if you will be attending and what particular wedding anniversary you are celebrating this year. We did this last year, and everyone seemed to enjoy it very much so I would like to make it an annual event.

On Sunday, October 14, we will host an Anointing Service in church. We invite the elderly, anyone who deals with an illness, etc. to come and receive the Sacrament of the Sick. Several priests will be here to anoint people. The brief ceremony is followed by people coming up to be anointed. If there are people who can't come up for the anointing, one of the priests will come around church to your pew and anoint you then.

Replacing the roof on the Food Pantry has turned into a nightmare!!! The contractor told me it took him over 2 weeks to get all the layers of the old roof off. Each time the roof was damaged, he said, that rather than removing the damaged roofing and putting on new roofing, they merely added new roofing over the old. When he finally got all of the layers off, they discovered that the actual wooden roof was completely rotted through and had to be replaced. What started out to be a \$20,000 project is now at \$26,000 and still going. Remember—we're dealing with hundred year old buildings and these things are to be expected. It also helps that I like wine!!

This has been a difficult time for we Catholics as we come face to face with the reality of ugly abuse which took place in the church. Not only did these phony low life men abuse children, but equally appalling is the way the church covered it up. The victims reached out for help and were instead told to be quiet, not to tell anyone and to go away. That is utterly disgusting, and I am ashamed of my church for what it has done. Our first and foremost concern in all of this has to be the victims, and I pray, along with you, that they have found some peace in this.

During a funeral service the organist played a beautiful rendition of Bach's "Sheep May Safely Graze." After the service the minister complimented him on his performance. "Oh, by the way, do you know what the deceased did for a living?" asked the minister. "No idea," said the organist. The minister smiled, "He was a butcher."



19 DAYS TO THE 2018 ERIE IRISH FESTIVAL

A MESSAGE FROM "SAINT MARY."

Mary Wegelin has been running the Festival Kitchen longer than anyone can remember. She puts it together, keeps it together, and tears it down when it's all over and everyone is back home patting their full tummies and smiling. Last year we canonized her for the miracle she performs each year feeding us all—and last year she fed more festival goers than ever before with more food than ever before! Now "St. Mary" is asking for your help:

"Hello from the festival kitchen. As all of you know, we put out some great tasting Irish fare and we put out a lot of it! Our Reubens are the best in town and our Friday Fish Fry is becoming a thing of legend. Our cooks come from Calamari's. They begin roasting our corned beef briskets a week ahead of time—1,260 pounds of it! And then they make stew and shepherd's pie, and get the Harp batter ready for the fish and the fish for the Harp batter. And then the magic happens on the griddles and in the ovens. We couldn't do it without them. But we also can't do it without you.

Calamari's fine chefs do the cooking, but it takes about 70 volunteers to do the plating and serving—to get the food from the chefs to the people's tummies. On Friday and Saturday evenings we need at least 12 volunteers in the kitchen to keep the crowd happy and well fed. And we need help setting up for each day, beginning on Thursday evening when we shuck the fresh sweet corn and put the haddock in its beer bath and get the loaves of Irish Soda Bread ready to slice. And someone has to wash the utensils and keep the pots clean. And when it's over, we need a whole crew to clean it up, pack it up, and put it away.

Sounds like a lot of work and it is, but it's also a lot of fun. We have a great time back in the kitchen because being part of a great team is a great, rewarding experience.
