

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time. After recalling the desert sojourn from Sinai-Horeb, when



God's providence was manifest (the first chapters of Deuteronomy), the author emphasizes the privilege of the Hebrew people, chosen by God from among all peoples to enter into an unprecedented friendship. This passage is part of the prologue, in which the people are urged to fulfill the Law, the history and details of which follow. The main argument for God's might and goodness is his presence among his people. The law, with its commandments, customs and statues, was understood as the way of life indicated by God for his people. If Israel will comply with the law she will receive her inheritance, understood as peaceful life in the promised land.

The "Father of lights" designates God as creator of the stars and, in keeping with the symbolism of light, the source of everything good. Christians, engendered by God through the word of truth, the Gospel, belong to God as his first fruits. The author specifies that it is not enough to hear the truth, one must listen and put it into practice. The Christian has been chosen out of the world to belong to the light. God's action, His Word, has done this. This Word-in-action inspires the Christian from baptism onward. Fulfilling one's duty to God is best impressed in the care of those in need and in opposition to the forces of evil.

Opposite the Pharisees narrow and legalistic concern about external purification, worship and observance of the commandments, Jesus emphasizes the moral intent of the law, going beyond the literal interpretation. The teaching about contamination coming from within cancels the laws about unclean food and opens the way for unity between Jew and Gentile in the Kingdom. Mark signals this shift by having Jesus leave Galilee territory in the following episodes of the gospel. While the religious leadership emphasizes external cleanliness, Jesus emphasizes that the purity of heat when he says, "from within people,

from their hearts, come evil thoughts." Jesus prefers to associate with an amiable, if somewhat untidy, group rather than a clan of critics with clean hands. The scribes' overemphasis on legalism was choking the true sense of friendship with God.

Our parish Food Pantry served 485 families during the month of July which included 659 children and 322 elderly people. We distributed 11,166 pounds of food at a cost to the parish of \$1,020. Once again, that entire expense is covered by your ongoing generosity.

Congratulations to parishioner Sally Kohler who was recently honored for her 35 years of service on the Presque Isle Advisory Board by having Beach 11 renamed Kohler Beach in her honor. She is the mother of parishioner Becky Johnson.

The diocese has asked us to share with you that parishioners at an Erie parish recently received an e-mail from a scam artist claiming to be their pastor and requesting financial help. The Diocese of Erie, clergy and entities such as parishes and schools will never solicit your personal or business information by any method unless initiated by you. Should you receive an unsolicited request for such information, including a request for gift cards, please exercise extreme caution.

The number of priests in the United States has declined from 135,225 in 1975 to 45,605 today. The number of Women Religious has declined in that same period from 58,909 to 35,181 with a median age of 75. The number of permanent deacons has increased from 898 in 1975 to 18,287 today. However, the number of deacon candidates has decreased by 16% from its peek in 2010. Thirty-eight of 175 programs in the U.S. report no deacon candidates for 2017-18.

Cardinal Jozef De Kesel of Malines-Brussels last week met with a small delegation of local gay people who requested the meeting. The cardinal spoke of their relationships as couples, distinguishing these from Christian marriage between a man and a woman noting that "it does involve a personal encounter." He suggested that the church initiate some type of a celebration of thanksgiving or prayer. He said that gay couples

in a long term relationship should have some type of pastoral response from the church. He said it could not be a religious marriage nor an "ecclesiastical blessing that too closely resembles the blessing of a marriage." He added that "to the extent that the church has maintained a certain reserve on the issue, it is to preserve the great value of marriage and the family to the greatest extent possible."

For several years we've had problems with water coming into the vestibule of the east entrance to the church. The problem is that the parking lot is higher than the entry. In the winter that water freezes and it is dangerous. We also have two drains in that east parking lot that are several inches lower than the asphalt. I recently signed a contract to have the area around that entrance re-graded and then new asphalt. We are also putting lips on those drains and raising them up to the level of the parking lot. Both of those drains are a problem with the festival.

The parish office will be closed on Monday in observance of Labor Day.

You have heard me say recently that we have finally finished restoring the rectory. That building was neglected for years, and we have done extensive work to bring it back to where it should be. The exterior brick was pointed, all of the trim was painted, there are 101 new windows, new heating and air conditioning, And last week a pipe on the second floor burst!! It never ends!!

A large company, feeling it was time for a shakeup, hired a new CEO. The new boss was determined to rid the company of all slackers.
