

Today is the Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. God speaks directly to Ezekiel, "You, son of man." As a



son of man, the prophet is a weak human being who shares in human suffering. Along with the other Jews, he is exiled to Babylon and is in his own place of humiliation. Ezekiel preaches his dramatic, often disturbing message. He also serves as a mediator between God and the people, and is in some way a representative of the whole nation. In today's passage, God reaffirms his prophetic call and assigns him the role of watchman. A sentinel looks out over the city and warns people of impending danger, whether from inside or outside the city walls. Today he must pass on the warning that comes from God. If he fails to warn them, Ezekiel himself will be responsible for their death. He is not responsible, however, if they refuse to heed his message. The people are asked to listen, repent and receive God's blessing.

In last Sunday's reading from Romans, Paul tells the people to offer their entire lives in sacrifice. He continues that today by giving specific examples of behavior that flow from a sacrificial life and he summarizes it in one word: love. Both Jesus and Paul cite Leviticus 19:18 regarding loving our neighbor as ourselves. The great Rabbi Hillel (70 AD) had a similar insight: "What is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbor: that is the whole Torah, while the rest is commentary on it. Love is the essence of the Law and of life in Christ.

Today's gospel is taken from Jesus' discourse on the Church as he explains a means of reconciling when one member of the community has sinned against another. The three-step process that Jesus recommends has roots in Judaism. In the Torah, reproving a fellow Israelite is a sign of love and keeps resentment from growing between them. If such a correction is unsuccessful, bringing in one or two witnesses is the next step, keeping the division as private as possible. This shows respect for the erring person and keeps

the disagreement from spreading throughout the community. Only if these efforts fail is the whole group brought in.

The parish is grateful to the late Isabelle Weber for a bequest in her estate of \$10,000 to St. Patrick's Parish. The bequest states that the principal cannot be spent but must be invested and we can use any proceeds. One thousand dollars of the bequest must go for Masses and the remaining \$9,000 invested. Finance Council voted to place the money in our account with the Catholic Foundation.

Air, hotels, transportation, etc. included. A complete itinerary and costs involved are available through the rectory office.

Next weekend will be chaos around here, but a lot of fun chaos with our annual Irish Festival. East Fourth Street will be partially blocked off in front of the church as will the east parking lots. I hope you'll stop down and take advantage of the event. A lot of hard work has gone into it, and I hope you'll support it. We can still use additional volunteers — in any category. Just call the parish office and we'll be glad to accommodate you. We also need some docents to be in church during the hours that the church is open. There is a cheat sheet for you with all of the information about the church so that you can share it with visitors. Each year I'm amazed at the number of people who go into the building and have never seen it before and had no idea there was such a beautiful building in Erie. Our hats go off to Gary and Becky Johnson for chairing the festival again

this year.

During the month of July, our Food Pantry served 412 families including 220 children and 20 elderly people. The total cost to the parish was \$566.63, all of which has been covered by your generous support of the Food Pantry.

A recent report reveals that Iceland has only two Downs syndrome children. Why? And one hundred percent of babies diagnosed with Downs syndrome prenatally are aborted.

The others gave you back 80 years, why can't I have those?" "Okay," said God. And that is why for the first 20 years, we eat, sleep, play and enjoy ourselves. For the next 40, we slave in support of our family. For the next ten years, we do monkey tricks to entertain the grandchildren and for the last ten years, we sit on the porch and bark at everyone.
