

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The episode of the Israelites making a molten calf that they wor-



ship in the desert is the context for one of the most engaging dialogues in the Bible. Earlier God had spoken of the Israelites with compassion; but now, because of their idolatry, the Lord no longer identifies them as "my people;" now they belong to Moses. The Lord's plan is for the divine wrath to blaze up against Israel to consume them. Then the Lord will make of Moses a great nation. Now it is Moses' turn to speak and he does so boldly asking why the Lord would show wrath against "your own people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt." Moses tells the Lord they are his people, not Moses'. The Lord listened to his plea and turned away from the threatened punishment. In spite of their infidelity, they are still his people.

Near the middle of the readings from 1 Timothy, Paul writes, "the grace of our Lord has been abundant. He reminds them of how blessed he has been by the Lord and that Jesus did not deal with Paul as his own sins merited. Having formerly been a blasphemer, persecutor and arrogant man who acted in ignorance, Paul experienced the greatest of graces in being treated mercifully. He points out that Jesus, who came into the world to save sinners, uses Paul to display divine patience and mercy. Paul's life, transformed by grace, is to be an example of the mercy that God offers to all sinners.

Jesus' welcoming sinners and eating with them is a joyful proclamation of the good news, but the Pharisees regard such actions as shockingly scandalous. They don't even refer to him by name but call him "this man." Jesus then addresses them with parables that begin with "What man among you?" The Pharisees are to imagine themselves as participants in the parable. The first two are relatively brief; something is lost and searched for until it is found. The third is much longer, with well-drawn characters: the father,

the elder son, and the younger son. Like the sheep and the coin, the younger son becomes the lost article. Jesus is comparing the Pharisees to the elder son who is unhappy about meals shared with sinners. And the response of the father is not to rebuke his older son, but to remind him that his is "my son," and that "everything I have is yours." Now is the time to celebrate the restoration to life, the finding of the lost. Jesus is neither rebuking or rejecting the Pharisees but through the parable invites them to join in the celebration.

St. Martin's Center does more to care for the poor and the needy than any other organization in the city. Several of our parishioners volunteer there, and I would encourage others of you to consider doing the same. They will celebrate their 50th anniversary of serving the poor with an evening at the Bayfront Convention Center including a cocktail hour and dinner. Tickets are \$75 per person and cover the cocktail hour and the dinner.

Our Irish Festival is up and running this weekend and I apologize for any inconvenience. All the inconvenience is worth seeing this many people gather in downtown Erie. Last year we had slightly less than 11,000 people attend, and we hope to break that record this year. I'm especially grateful for the leadership of chair Eric Albright and his assistants, Gary and Becky Johnson, who will become chairs next year. We also have a number of new committee chairs this year, and again I'm grateful that a number of newer parishioners and younger people stepped forward to take over those positions.

Again, I'm amazed at the number of people who visit the church and had no idea that this magnificent building is in downtown Erie. A number of volunteers serve as docents and answer questions people might have about the building. Mark Alloway also does intermittent music on the pipe organ.

As I tell the chairs each year, my priority with the festival is not to make money; my priority is to build community: to get all of us to know one another better so that the good work of this parish will continue long after I'm gone.

Church attendance in Anglican churches in England has fallen so dramatically, that leaders are resorting to very strange efforts to entice people into the churches. Inside Norwich Cathedral, a colorful, 55 foot-tall slide has been positioned. For 2 pounds, people can climb to the top of the tower and slide down. Rochester Cathedral in southeastern England has installed a nine-hole mini-golf course inside the church's medieval nave. Strange way to get people inside the churches!!!!

During the month of July, our Food Pantry served 541 families. We distributed 16,992 pounds of food at a cost of \$492.58. Once again, I did not have to use parish funds for this because of your on-going generosity in supporting the Food Pantry. Know that God smiles on us when we care for his poor and he also manages to forget some of our failures.

The side porch on the rectory has become a dumping ground over the years. Everything just gets dumped in there, so we decided to clean it up. When we did we discovered that the floor was rotted and needed to be replaced. The new floor is very nice. Then we discovered that all of the windows are rotted. You try to open them and they start to fall apart. That was an open porch until around 1950 when it was enclosed, and so the windows are almost 70 years old. So now they are being replaced. With hundred year old buildings, one thing always leads to another.

An Amish boy and his father were visiting a mall. They were fascinated with everything, but especially by two shiny, silver walls that could move apart and back together again. They boy asked, "What is it, Father?" The father responded, "Son, I've never seen anything like it." While the boy and his father were watching wide-eved an old lady in a wheelchair rolled up to the moving walls and pressed a button. The walls opened and the lady rolled into a small room. The walls closed and the boy and his father watched small circles of light with numbers above the walls light up. They continued to watch the circles light up in reverse direction. The walls opened up again and a beautiful 24 year old woman stepped out. The father said to his son, "Son, go get your mother."


