

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Book of Sirach is part of Israel's Wisdom literature and



addresses the question, "How do I live wisely?" In today's passage, he considers anger, vengeance and forgiveness and God's response to them. Sirach's insights on vengeance and forgiveness have a twofold application. First, he exhorts people to let go of anger and any desire of retaliation, to always be ready to reconcile. Second, he emphasizes each person's need for forgiveness. Certainly we hope for human forgiveness, but Sirach focuses on divine forgiveness. The Lord will heal those who forgive their neighbor.

Our brief second reading has Paul quoting from an early hymn "Live for oneself....die for oneself....live for the Lord...die for the Lord." The poem from which he quotes also has a baptismal ring, a reminder that in baptism each believer dies and rises to new life in Christ. Once baptized, we no longer belong to ourselves, but to Christ, and are members of his body. Our attitudes, way of thinking, our relationships, and behaviors are patterned on Christ's own. Belonging to him must also mean belonging to one another. Remember that infant baptism would not emerge for several more centuries; people were baptized as adults only.

Jesus' teaching to Peter in today's gospel continues his long discourse on church life. Peter's initiating question flows naturally from Jesus' instruction on the process of forgiveness that we heard in last Sunday's gospel. Now Peter asks just how far forgiveness extends. When Peter suggests forgiving as many as seven times, he apparently thinks he is being magnanimous. Most Jewish teachers of the day taught that we have to forgive three times, so Peter goes beyond that. Jesus must have shocked Peter and the disciples with his command that we offer an almost impossible offer of forgiveness. Jesus concludes his teaching on forgiveness with the familiar parable of the king forgiving an excessive amount to a slave

who then refuses a much smaller debt. The parable concludes with the king calling back the unforgiving servant and punishing him for his lack of mercy.

The second collection today is the collection for Catholic education. Half of the collection is sent to the diocese to be used for scholarships for students to attend Catholic schools. The other half remains in the parish to apply toward our costs for Catholic education.

Things are a little chaotic this weekend with the Irish Festival in full swing, but it's also fun. Isn't it great to see all of these people downtown? Once again we're grateful to Erie Insurance for the use of their parking lots without which we could never have moved the festival to the church grounds.

Cardinal Reinard Marx, Archbishop of Munich, Germany, announced recently that, rather than closing and consolidating parishes, he will allow lay people to lead parishes where there is no priest. He told his Diocesan Council that he does not believe in clustering parishes and closing others; but that the church needs local parishes. He does not have enough priests to staff all of them and is turning that responsibility over to lay people.

Bishop Persico met with all of the priests of Erie County recently to discuss providing spiritual coverage for UPMC Hamot. It was decided that we will on be on a rotation schedule and each of us will take a 24 hour shift to be available at the hospital for emergencies. In addition, we are all asking our parishioners to notify us if they are going to be a patient there in case you want to receive the Sacrament of the Sick or a visit while you are in the hospital.

Bishop Persico also asked us to discuss having outdoor weddings. The Bishops of Pennsylvania are meeting soon and will discuss the issue, and Bishop Persico wanted our opinion on it. Only one diocese in Pennsylvania—Harrisburg— allows outdoor weddings. My observation of the discussion among the Erie County priests was that the priests are divided right down the middle with about half of them in favor and the other half not in favor of it.

Heritage Pipe Organ Co. of West Valley, NY is the company who will rebuild our pipe organ. They recently completely rebuilt the pipe organ at St. Mark's Seminary, and the staff there couldn't be more pleased with the results. We have recently secured a copy of the original order to the Felgemaker Organ Works of Buffalo who built the original pipe organ in 1906. There are 2,500 pipes made of wood, zinc, tin and lead. The pipes range in length from a few inches to sixteen feet. Over the years alterations were made to the original pipe organ, and in this restoration we are taking it back to the original. Not all of those alterations have been beneficial.

We have to get a lift into the church to get the new console up into the balcony as well as bring pipes down and then back up. That will necessitate our temporarily removing a few pews in the back of church while the work is being done.

Bishop Persico recently hosted a day-long event for teachers, administration and staff of the new Catholic school system. Also invited to participate were all of the Erie pastors. I sat at a table with teachers from Blessed Sacrament school and I have to tell you, their enthusiasm and excitement about all of this is contagious. What a great group of teachers who are so incredibly dedicated to their jobs. Our Catholic schools are going to be better than they've ever been.

I'm often saying what a great neighbor Erie Insurance is, but let me give you a specific example. When they started digging up the south side of East Fourth St. to lay fiber optic cable throughout their entire campus, they met with me to explain the project and to tell me who to contact if we had a funeral, etc. so that they did not disrupt. In the course of their doing that work, I had three funerals. I called them and each time, the workmen stopped working for that hour or so until the funeral was gone. Great neighbors.
