#### From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In all three of today's readings we find elements of the conviction that spirituality does not consist only in one's personal relationship with God, necessary as that is, but also in concrete and just relationships with one another. Amos was a prophet in the northern kingdom during a time of great economic growth and he challenges the greed of many of the people. Religious festivals that afforded the poor a brief respite from their labor, were seen by the rich as obstacles to moneymaking. The text today verbalizes the secret thoughts of the greedy, but Amos declares that God is neither unaware nor unconcerned about the plight of the poor. The closing line reveals that God is ready for action.

In our second reading Paul is tapping the wisdom that Jesus demonstrated when he advised the Pharisees to "repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar." But that advice does not include worship of the emperor, which was expected. Praying for the emperor laid a blanket of protection over the early Christians. The practice of praying for kings was ancient, but Paul is calling for self-less prayer that ultimately contributes to the common good. He notes that God is the God of all and that he desires justice and peace to prevail.

Jesus was sometimes dismayed that disciples lacked the will, determination and resources to work as effectively for the kingdom as non-believers worked for their interests in the world. To inspire this initiative he shares today's parable. Normally we meet people in the parables who are likeable; but not today. The steward is stealing; he is maneuvering and building a great deal of good will for later when he will need it. Jesus encourages us to emulate that initiative, becoming as proactive with resources for eternal life as we are with the wealth we have in this

world. Remember, it is the steward's prudence, not his dishonesty, which Jesus praises. The bottom line today is that we must own our possessions, not let them possess us. Only if money is used with a view to our heavenly destiny (and that requires sharing with the poor) can we be sure it has not become an idol that has usurped God's rightful place at the center of our lives.

Excuse the chaos this weekend, but it's fun to have all of this excitement in our neighborhood as well as the large number of people. Gary and Becky Johnson and their committee chairs have put in endless hours preparing for this weekend, and it looks like their efforts were well worth it. We are fortunate with the large number of volunteers that we have. Several of the local ethnic festivals simply do not have enough volunteers left in their parishes to staff the event. As a matter of fact, several of our parishioners volunteer each year at Holy Trinity's festival because they do not have enough people.

One advantage to having the festival here is that people can tour the church. I continue to be amazed at how many people have never seen the interior of the church and are overwhelmed by its beauty. People keep saying, "I never knew there was such a beautiful building in Erie."

This Tuesday evening, the representatives from all of the Erie parishes will meet at Our Lady of Peace for the final presentation on the reconfiguration of parishes in the city. The following night, the bishop will travel to the eastern end of the diocese to present the reconfiguration there and then the following night to the western end of the diocese. According to what information we have at present, everything will take effect in early February. There will be some pain and some tears shed; mourning is part of this letting go. But we have no choice. We can't continue as we have been and we should have undertaken this

process 25 years ago. All of our neighboring dioceses have gone through this process years ago and are now settling into the new alignment.

I'm grateful to so many of you who have volunteered to help staff the festival this weekend. One of the great things that the festival achieves is that it helps build community, ie., we get to know one another better and will be better able to be there for one another when need arises. We have an incredibly diverse parish membership (practically no one lives in this neighborhood and some people drive 45 minutes to get here for a weekend Mass. Working together at the festival breaks down the barriers between us and helps us get to know one another better.

Before winter sets in we are replacing several more windows in the rectory. Two of the windows are in the living room on the ground floor and those windows are so big that the replacements cost \$1,600 each! Once we replace those two and two in an adjoining copy room, we will be finished with the first floor windows. In addition, we are replacing 3 windows on the third floor. Next spring we will finish the third floor, and then we'll start to wrap up the second floor. About half of the windows on the second floor have already been replaced. It's an expensive project, but it will make an incredible difference in heating bills.

In the recent Erie Gives, Saint Patrick's was number 22 out of 354 non-profits. \$30,385 was donated and coupled with what we got from the matching fund, we received a check for \$31,935. Again, I thank you for your generosity.

If anyone is interested in helping count the Sunday offertory, please contact the office. We count after 10:30 Mass and it takes about an hour and a half.
