



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In one of the most familiar prophecies of Isaiah, he ad-



dresses "all you who are thirsty", instructing them with rich and varied imagery and with actions that draw them into relationship with God: come, eat, listen. Seeking the Lord and calling on God are fundamental ways of quenching the perennial thirst of the human heart. Isaiah intimates that seeking and calling out to God are responses to God's initiative in seeking and calling us. In comparing the distance between God's thoughts and ours to the distance between heaven and earth. he isn't suggesting that following God's ways is impossible. Rather, he is directing our thoughts and actions toward God. Seek God, call upon God's name, turn toward God in repentance and ask for mercy. His exhortation has a similarity with the call of Pope Francis: "Whenever we take a step toward Jesus, we come to realize that he is already there, waiting for us with open arms... How good it feels to come back to him whenever we are lost."

Paul writes his Letter to the Philippians while imprisoned, not knowing what the outcome will be. His fundamental conviction is that no matter what befalls him, Christ will be magnified in his body. Paul uses the word body (soma) to refer to his whole being. At death, Paul's body, like that of Christ himself, will be transformed, yet will still remain his body. As he reflects on his present condition, he does so with a view to the ministry to which he was called, in particular he considers the impact his continued life or death would have on the Philippians. Yet for Paul, life is his existence in Christ. Death is therefore gain. If he were to depart this world, he would be with Christ forever, no longer experiencing the limits of time, space and flesh.

In today's familiar parable the landowner is a vivid image of God who acts with generosity. God gives much more than anyone can earn by a lifetime of good works and acts of devotion. God

freely offers salvation to those who appear to be last and least in the eyes of the world, as well as to those who welcome God's generosity at the last moment in their lives. Jesus is teaching us that we would all delight in God's generosity.

We survived another Irish Festival. I can't begin to express my gratitude to Gary and Becky Johnson for their outstanding leadership these past two years. I honestly hate to see them step down as they have brought organization and class to the festival that it never had in the past. Perhaps the wisest move we made was to move the festival from Rainbow Gardens to the church grounds. The crowds are much larger, the event gets larger each year, there are more and more volunteers each year, etc. It also gives us an opportunity to showcase our magnificent church. A large group of Mercyhurst University employees met at the Festival on Friday evening. They do this monthly to socialize with one another outside of the work environment and they chose the festival to be their September meeting.

Father Michael DeMartinis does an outstanding job teaching Scripture classes. A recent series that he did filled the auditorium at Cathedral Prep. I'm thrilled to tell you that he is going to teach a three-part Scripture class at St. Patrick's during Lent this coming year. He will teach a morning session from 10—11 AM and an evening session from 5:30—6:30 PM. I've been doing a similar class during Lent for the past several years, but I'm cutting back on some things to save energy for other things that I need to do. I'm thrilled that Fr. Mike is willing to do this for us. I hope you will make attending this class a Lenten goal.

Claude Paradis was homeless, living on the streets of Montreal and addicted to both drugs and alcohol. He is now an ordained priest and works with the homeless and addicts! He tells of an encounter with God one night while he was homeless and turned his life around. Now the 57 year old priest goes out each night to bring food and shelter to those living on the streets.

In the recent Erie Gives Day, St. Patrick's ranked eleventh in over 200 non-profits. We received pledges of \$68,781 and the check we received

from the Erie Community Foundation was for \$74,588.77 because of our sharing in the pool of money donated by Erie businesses and the Erie Community Foundation.

During the month of August, our Food Pantry served 536 families which included 94 elderly and 236 children. We distributed 11,319 pounds of food at a cost of \$953 to the parish. Thanks to your generous support of this project I never have to use parish monies for this; it is paid for each month through your generosity.

More than half of the British people now claim to have no religion. Some 53 percent of British adults described themselves as having no religious affiliation. Only three percent of adults under 24 say they are Anglican while five percent identify as Catholic. Meanwhile, almost three out of four 18 to 24 year olds say they have no religion. Among those aged 25-34, only five percent admitted being Anglican while nine percent said they were Catholic. Studies reveal that resistance within the Church of England to same-sex marriage, and the difficulty of some churches in accepting LGBT Christians, have alienated many young adults.

A friend of mine is downsizing significantly and has some priceless antiques, etc. He is very graciously donating all of these to the rectory. Among them is a beautiful 13' x 19' oriental carpet that is now in our dining room. There are several other carpets, bedroom set, tables and two one hundred year old sets of china. If you want to see any of it, please stop at the rectory and one of us will be more than happy to show you some of the pieces he donated.

Over breakfast one morning, a woman said to her husband, "I bet you don't know what day this is?" "Of course I do," he indignantly answered, going out the door on his way to the office. At 11 o'clock the doorbell rang and when the woman answered, she was handed a box containing a dozen long stemmed red roses. At noon, a foil-wrapped box of her favorite chocolates arrived. Later in the afternoon, a boutique delivered a designer dress. The woman couldn't wait for her husband to come home. "First, the flowers, then the candy, then the dress," she exclaimed when he walked in the door. "I've never had a more wonderful Groundhog Day in my life."
































To inform parishioners of diocesan <u>policies regarding Child Protection</u>
