

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Ezekiel preached to the people of Judah when they were



in exile in Babylonia and he shared their humiliation and loss. It was a time of questions. How could this happen to us? Is it the guilt of our ancestors who brought us here? In the midst of their suffering, the people cried out "the Lord's ways are not fair." Ezekiel told them they were not suffering because of the sins of their parents, which was a common way of thinking. He tells them that each person bears responsibility for their own actions and when he says that they must die because of their iniquity, he is not referring to physical death, but to the exile, a form of death itself. He also tells them there is the possibility for restored life if they repent and live in justice. He alone offers them hope in their suffering.

On Palm Sunday and on the Feast of the Holy Cross, we hear the magnificent hymn to Christ that we hear again today. The hymn proclaims Christ's emptying of himself. It is often called the Kenotic Hymn since the Greek word kenosis is emptying. Christ empties himself by not clinging to his equality with God, by taking the form of a slave and by obediently emptying himself to death on a cross. The hymn is one of the earliest in the church and was probably sung when they gathered for the Eucharist. Paul uses the hymn to teach his readers that the Philippian church is to live in humility, obedience and self-emptying. All in the church are to "humbly regard others as more important," repeating the example of Christ who humbly did not deem equality with God something to be grasped.

Today's gospel parable is directed to the chief priests and elders, among the most powerful of Jesus' opponents. They are indignant that he is entering Jerusalem to cries of "hosanna." They seem to be caught off guard when they answer that the first son did the father's will. By their answer, they unwittingly show their own prejudices. They considered tax collectors and prostitutes to

be outsiders, but Jesus sees the outsiders entering the Kingdom of God even before those who looked down on them

Once predominantly Catholic Ireland has seen the church almost completely collapse in the past twenty years. Much of the cause of that was a clergy sexual abuse scandal that far outshone even the horror we witnessed here in America. Not only parish priests but bishops were indicted and often sent to prison. Up until about 1980, Ireland ordained an average of 800 new priests a year. Today, there are less than 10 ordinations a year and now the Irish church has begun to bring priests from Africa and from Romania to staff their parishes.

As part of the Irish Festival, Gary and Becky Johnson invited couples whom I have married over the years to submit a photo, come to church on a given date to renew their yows and then come to the rectory for drinks and food. About 30 couples participated, and it was one of the nicest evenings of the year. A brief ceremony in church was very touching and then everyone had a great time in the rectory sharing memories, and, unfortunately, telling Kriegel stories. What I'm going to do next year is not have this be part of the Irish Festival, but invite everyone who is observing 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40 or 50 years or marriage to come to church on a given date, renew their vows and then come to the rectory for drinks and food.

The Vatican recently gave permission for a Canadian nun to officiate at a wedding in a rural diocese in western Quebec. The exceptional ceremony took place in a Catholic church in Lorrainville, 650 km west of Montreal. In the rural diocese of Rouyn-Norand, the lack of priests is such that priests are often responsible for up to seven or eight different parishes. Although rare, such an event is in fact authorized by canon law. "Where there is a lack of priests or deacons, the diocesan bishop can delegate lay persons to assist at marriages with a vote by the local Conference of Bishops and the permission of the Holy See," says the canon.

During the Irish Festival, we went through 71 kegs of beer (8,800 pints), 79 bottles of whiskey,

nearly 12 gallons of Irish Cream Liquor and 120 bottles of wine!!! That's a lot of alcohol to be consumed in 3 days!!!!

Congratulations to St. Patrick parishioner Bill Bloomstine who was recently honored by St. Mary's Home for his support and dedication to St. Mary's. The honor was conferred during a gala at the Bayfront Convention Center which honored Bill, Donna Geiger and James and Mary Ann Toohey.

Today's bulletin contains a letter inviting you to list the names of deceased family and friends whom you wish remembered in a particular way during the month of November. Our bulletin for the first Sunday of November will include a listing of all of the names which you submit.

Mark Alloway, our music director and organist, has been working closely with Organ Supplies of Erie as we start the restoration of the pipe organ. The original console was unfortunately discarded in the early 1970s during work on the organ. We are attempting to restore rather than renew the pipe organ and take it back to its original format. We have the design of the original console and are working to recreate as much of that as is possible. The wood will match the woodwork in the church and the multitude of stops on the console will be made out of wood rather than the metal ones which were installed in the early 1970s. All of the experts who have examined the organ tell me that much of what was added to it during that particular restoration has not enhanced the organ but has taken away from some of its grandeur. A lot of work is being done now so that immediately after Christmas we can begin to disassemble the pipes, install the new console, etc. In part that will entail temporarily removing some pews in the back of church to accommodate a lift.
