

#### From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time and we read first from the Prophet Habakkuk. Though he is in a unique relationship with God, he still struggles with the guestion we all face: Why does evil occur before God's eyes? Why does God not prevent or at least erase the evil? If such questions seem out of place in Scripture, we need to look more closely at God's word that never shies from earnest expressions of human emotion, even anger, bitterness and despair. Habakkuk's doubts stem from the desperate circumstances of his time. Judah languished amidst both religious and political upheaval and Habakkuk wonders if God is really in charge. When the Lord responds, it is not with a solution, but a promise. Six times the prophet will write down the vision he is given.

Attributed to Paul who writes from prison, these words urge the reader not to let the sufferings of Christ or of Paul become a source of scandal or embarrassment. The world expects success to look like success and be accompanied by fame, wealth, etc. Paul knows well that the gospel does not bring such things, but he also knows the wearying effects of enduring hardships. So he encourages Timothy, a bishop whom he had ordained, to find again the faith that first flamed within him so that he can again remember the sweet taste of that for which he may have to enduring suffering will we experience the burning power of the Spirit.

Jesus taught by example. Though he often spoke of faith, it was how he lived it that touched the disciples. He demonstrated that it was necessary to have faith to cast our demons, to be forgiven, to experience the healing of limbs and spirit. Because they have seen the depth of Jesus' faith, the disciples cry out, "Lord, increase

our faith." His response is a no-nonsense example of a master who expects his servants to do their work without having to thank them for simply doing their duty. Discipleship is its own reward. Faith transforms us into servants who do what's necessary: love, give witness, repent, forgive.

Archbishop Nikola Eterovic, the secretary general of the Synod of Bishop, wrote to the world's priests recently telling them to keep homilies to less than 8 minutes in length, and to work from an outline rather than a script to allow for better eye contact. In the letter he quotes a saying, "If you haven't struck oil in seven minutes, stop boring." He said that God created the heavens and the earth in less than a week; why should priests feel they need to take almost as long to explain it to people!!!! He notes that the 8 minute time period caters to people who have short attention spans. My problem is that my attention span can't go that long. I don't think I've ever preached as long as eight minutes. Can't keep focused that long!!!

Congratulations to St. Patrick parishioner Elisa Guida, founder and executive director of the Strings for Care Foundation, which recently received a \$7,500 grant from the Carey Foundation. That foundation was established to help fight breast cancer, and Elisa's organization funds medical assistance and living expenses for people with breast cancer.

A special thank you to everyone who volunteered and helped with our recent Irish Festival. It was over the top. A special thanks to Gary and Becky Johnson who chaired this year's festival and have agreed to chair it again next year. They did an outstanding job of organizing and planning the event. We had several new committee chairs and fresh blood always brings new ideas, etc. More than being a fundraiser, that event helps build community and enables us to get to know

one another better.

I hope you took some time to review the Spiritual and Financial reports which were in last week's bulletin. Those reports reflect some amazing growth and good health at St. Patrick's. We have grown by over a hundred families in the past year; our baptisms far outpace our deaths (in fact we had more than 4 baptisms for every death); and that unfortunately is not the case in most parishes in the diocese. On the financial side, your generosity is evidenced in the report. I can't thank you enough for the generous way in which you support the parish. More than that, however, is the outreach to the poor and needy through our own Food Pantry, the February Homeless Shelter, the helping at St. Patrick's Haven, Emmaus Soup Kitchen and St. Martin's Center. As you know, we also make a monthly contribution to Emmaus Soup Kitchen and St. Patrick's Haven giving each of them \$100 per month.

Saint Patrick Food Pantry distributed 15,583 pounds of food in August. Recipients included 489 families among whom were 281 elderly and 668 children. The cost to the parish for August was \$848.01. Again—because of your generosity, that cost is absorbed every week.

A doctor, a lawyer, a little boy and a priest were out for a Sunday afternoon flight on a small private plane. Suddenly, the plane developed engine trouble. In spite of the best efforts of the pilot, the plane started to go down. Finally, the pilot grabbed a parachute, yelled to the passengers that they had better jump, and then he bailed out. Unfortunately, there were only three parachutes remaining. The doctor grabbed one and said, "I'm a doctor. I save lives, so I must live," and jumped out. The lawyer said, "I'm a lawyer and lawyers are the smartest people in the world. I deserve to live." He also grabbed a parachute and jumped. The priest looked at the little boy and said, "Son, I've lived a long and full life. You are young and have your whole life ahead of you. Take the last parachute and live in peace." The little boy handed the parachute back to the priest and said, "Don't worry, Father, the smartest man in the world just took off with my back pack."

If you wish someone remembered, please complete the information below and make sure it is in the parish office no later than Monday, October 24. An offering is optional.




