

From
the
Pastor's
Desk...

The first two chapters of Habakkuk are a conversation between he and the Lord. Today, he accuses God of not



listening to his cry for help and not intervening in the face of violence. The prophet sees ruin, misery and destruction, realities so often in Israel's history that they could refer to almost any period. Even readers today can identify with the situations that Habakkuk laments. In verses omitted from today's reading God responds to Habakkuk's complaint. With words that would seem to increase the prophet's dismay, God describes the power and violence that Israel endures, Then Habakkuk says that God has made people like fish of the sea, like creeping things without a ruler, suggesting that God has reversed the order of things established in creation. The divine response is to be written down so it can be read. The fulfillment of the vision is certain and will not disappoint, even though it will come in its own time. It ends by describing the two kinds of people who await the vision: the proud and the just.

Paul's two letters to Timothy are referred to as "pastoral epistles," because they guide Timothy as a pastor or shepherd. Writing from prison, Paul urges Timothy to exhibit courage and to accept hardship as challenges associated with being a pastor. Paul is a living example for Timothy of the steadfastness needed to be a pastor. Paul repeatedly emphasizes that neither he nor Timothy's words and actions are accomplished by their own efforts but through the power and presence of God.

As the apostles continue with Jesus on the journey to Jerusalem, they have witnessed his teaching and his expectations of discipleship. As they ask him to increase their faith, he notes that even a very small amount of faith—like the mustard seed—is powerful. He then moves on to emphasize that those who have faith are to be servants. Household slaves are simply doing their duty. If one has faith, however, he serves willingly and freely for the good of all.

From the Pastor's Desk continued...

A new Gallup Poll shows that twenty years ago, 76% of Catholics belonged to a parish. Today, 63% do. And a new report from CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) reports that there are now 1,500 fewer parishes than in 1991. The largest reduction has taken place in Pennsylvania with 532 closed since 1991. A much more ominous statistic is that 50% of Catholics 30 years old and younger have left the church. Other research, conducted by the Catholic Leadership Institute, suggests what contributes to a positive experience of parish life. Data drawn from more than 600 parishes in 28 dioceses in North America reveal what makes a parish work and what doesn't. The top drivers include people's view of their pastor, their experience of Sunday worship (especially the preaching), peoples felt sense of the parish as a welcoming and accepting community, and their being helped to recognize how God is at work in their lives.

It should come as no surprise that the ongoing decline in the birthrate in America has led to fewer baptisms, which then leads to fewer school enrollments, fewer sacraments administered (Confirmation, First Communion and Marriage), fewer clergy ordained, and less of everything in terms of participating and supporting the life of a parish. The empty pews today show not so much an intentional flight as a passive, drifting away from the faith. For many, the routine of going to church seems simply no longer to be worth it. Given the decreasing numbers of clergy and congregants, the next major shift to be experienced will be cutbacks in educational opportunities and social services. A clear indicator of what lies in the future will be a lack of religious ed programs. Parents will have to become very actively involved in the religious formation of their children. Gone will be the days when parents dropped their children off for class and picked them up an hour later.

It's an exciting moment to be in downtown Erie with all that is happening. Erie Downtown Development Corporation is purchasing whole blocks on the lower area between French and Holland and north of North Park Row. Erie Insurance continues to take a leadership role in all of this with their ongoing commitment to the downtown and with their generous gifts to help all of this come to

reality. Erie is in a transformational moment and it's an exciting time for all of us. And St. Patrick's sits right in the middle of all of it. It's truly an exciting moment in Erie's history. In addition to downtown, five grand old mansions on Millionaire's Row (West Sixth Street from Peach west) are being completely restored. A row of townhouses on the north side of West Sixth Street between Myrtle and Walnut are also being completely restored from top to bottom.

I hope some of our young couples with children will accept Jim & Julie Fetzner's invitation to join them this week at the Russian Social Center to plan a program to deepen their faith. Their goal is to involve their children ultimately in the journey, and isn't that what this is all about. This type of small group faith sharing is what the present stage of our Diocesan Pastoral Planning is all about. It is adults continuing to grow in the understanding of their faith and passing that faith tradition on to their children.

Our Food Pantry fed 420 families during the month of August. We distributed 15,136 pounds of food at a cost of \$298.70. Once again, your generosity in supporting the food pantry paid for these expenses. God always remembers those who care for the less fortunate and overlooks a great deal of the failings of those who care.

Have you ever considered remembering your parish in your estate planning? The St. Patrick's Endowment is located in the Catholic Foundation and income from that can only be used for the ongoing maintenance and upkeep of St. Patrick's Church. It can't be used for anything else. A bequest to the Endowment in your estate planning can allow you to be an ongoing part of St. Patrick's Parish for years to come.

2 p.m. New and used books and DVDs will be on sale. Book prices begin at only \$1. Proceeds benefit St. Jude School.












