

Today is the Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. The author of Genesis expresses God's care for his creatures



by presenting God as a potter who works to perfect his craftsmanship. The creation of the human is not yet concluded: what is needed is to live in union with another human being. The human does not find equal rank among the animals and so God creates the woman from the very cell of man. Thus there exists complementarity between the two. The rare Hebrew term translated "deep sleep" refers to a suspended state when a person is open to supernatural incentives, as if God suspended the life he had infused in the man to remodel him and embark on the future in a new way: two persons, man and woman, not just one.

In the Letter to the Hebrews we are reminded that suffering, sacrifice and glory are all designed for humans, because Christ died to make humankind what we are meant to be. He died to rid us of frustration, bondage and weakness, and to restore our dignity to what it was meant to be from the beginning. The reference to Jesus as "leader" is a recurrent theme in Hebrews. God's people are on a pilgrimage to the heavenly sanctuary and final Sabbath rest, following Jesus, the leaders, who blazed the trail to perfection through suffering. Now we are to follow him, and this journey includes the way of the cross. Jesus suffered and died, and because of this, he entered into the glory that is our destiny in Christ.

In the episode before this, reading, Jesus had been teaching about the ideals of discipleship; now he is asked about the legitimacy of divorce. Jewish law assumed that divorce was legitimate, and the only point of discussion, what were the proper grounds for it. Jesus' reply goes behind the legislation of Deuteronomy 24 and settles on the principle found in the creation story. He explains that divorce was instituted as a concession to weakness and that lifelong monogamous marriage is the ideal. The final section, using a child, is difficult because children had no status in The reign of God is for those who are like children: the poor, the hungry, the dispossessed people whose rights and dignity were ignored. Jesus invites us to give up all claims to status and rights over others, a theme that will be developed later in this chapter of Mark. Only if disciples become like children can they be received by Jesus and become true followers of the Crucified One.

You might have noticed the new tile in the remodeled Men's Room in church. That is the tile that will eventually be placed throughout the vestibule and the back of church. Now that the work on the pipe organ is finished, we can get started on this project. The total cost is \$52,000 and I'm grateful to two parishioners, each of whom donated \$10,000 toward the project.

Saint Patrick's Haven is a shelter for homeless men. Located on East 12th Street near Parade, it welcomes up to 27 men each night. The Shelter was originally started out of St. Patrick's Parish but is now run by the Sisters of St. Joseph. The men can come in at 7 PM, get a shower, a snack, have a warm clean bed to sleep in and then they have to leave by 7 AM when they can go over to the Upper Room (10th & Peach) and get a fully cooked breakfast, the Bishop's Breakfast, which is provided by Catholic Charities. The staff at the Shelter are looking for some volunteers who would be willing to come in for about an hour one evening a month and simply visit with the men. It is not a time to talk about religion, etc., but is intended for the volunteer to listen as the men tell their story, to lend a sympathetic ear, etc. If you think you are interested in this type of volunteer work, contact the director, Betsy Wiest at betsy.wiest@ssjerie.org.

On Sunday, October 14, we will host an Anointing Service in church at 4 PM. This is not a Mass, but is a brief ceremony followed by a number of priests who will anoint people with the Sacrament of the Sick. I encourage any of the elderly, people who have a chronic illness, etc. to take advantage of the ceremony.

I recently paid the taxes on the rectory and the east parking lot. We sent the City of Erie a check for \$4,524.89.

We've been having computer problems in the

rectory again. We have wireless signals and the problem is that every inside wall in the rectory is eighteen inches thick made of brick. The signals hit those walls and just bounce back.

We also had to remove some walls on the second and third floors of the house because of leaking pipes The pipes have been leaking for some time but we only discovered it when part of the ceiling in the first floor living room came down. The new pipes are in and wall board, etc. is being put in place and all will be well until another pipe bursts. The house is a hundred years old and these things are going to keep happening. My pipes are going to start bursting when I turn a hundred also!!!

In a September visit to Sicily, Pope Francis was told by a man that his pastor's homily had lasted 40 minutes last Sunday. He replied, "40 minute homily? No. Absolutely no. It should not last longer than 8 minutes and the entire Mass should be over in 40 minutes." I've finally been vindicated!!!

In the aftermath of the festival, we have made some decisions concerning next year's festival. We are the only festival in the city that goes until 11 PM each night. By then, the volunteers are exhausted and the crowd has dwindled way down. We're also convinced that we don't make any money in that last hour. Next year, we're going to only go until 10 PM each night.

It will be several weeks before we have the final figures for this year because of outstanding bills. We certainly had larger crowds than we've ever had before. It was also nice seeing how much it is a family affair. There were young couples with their children, babies in strollers, etc. One of the draws is Abby Lechner's corner for children. They are lined up to get painted, etc. The baked goods booth under the direction of Mary Beth Wachter was also the largest we have ever had. The jewelry booth under the direction of Patty Dailey was also the largest ever. The list could go on and on but it was certainly a huge success
