

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. Our first reading is a very sad commentary on Israel's un-



faithfulness to God. He, the owner of the vineyard in our reading, has lovingly tended to them but now announces its coming punishment. With the skill of an accomplished poet, Isaiah concludes with a play on words that evokes the contrast between a good crop of grapes and a worthless harvest. God looked for judgment (*mishpat*), but instead got bloodshed (*mispah*); God wanted justice (*sedeq*), but instead heard an outcry (*se'aqah*). Having listened to Isaiah's prophecy, perhaps the people will be moved to repentance.

Paul is writing to the Philippian community while he is in prison and while the community itself is facing persecution. Just prior to these verses, Paul had told them to rejoice for the Lord is near and that he will come again in glory. This is fundamental to everything he says. Whether one is imprisoned or enslaved or free, in poverty or in riches, persecuted or honored, have no anxiety for the Lord is near. They should offer prayer in all forms, with thanksgiving, confident that God will hear. By human standards, both Paul and the Philippian church have ample reason to experience anxiety, rather than peace. Yet, like a guardian of a fortress, God's peace will protect all. Next, Paul enjoins on the church specific behaviors or virtues that will bring about peace and tells them to observe Paul's own behavior, for his life was patterned on Christ's.

Jesus continues his teaching in parables directed to the chief priests and elders. These leaders, as well as Matthew's first century audience, would be well steeped in Judaism, know its traditions, imagery and prophecies. They would know Isai-ah's Song of the Vineyard that we heard in the first reading, as well as Psalm 80, today's responsorial psalm. The owner gives responsibility for care of the vineyard to tenants, clearly understood as the leaders of Israel; the servants sent by the owner are the prophets, harshly treated

and even put to death. But the landowner does not give up; but sends his own son. Now the interpretation moves from the past to the present. The son, of course, is Jesus himself. The treatment of the son allows Jesus to ask the question, "What will the owner do?" The answer from the priests and elders points to their own guilt and the consequences of rejecting the son. Because of their actions, leadership will be taken away from them and given to others. Finally, Matthew states that the chief priests and Pharisees knew he was talking about them and they tried to arrest him.

Celebrant of our Masses this weekend is Father Michael DeMartinis, chaplain at Villa Maria Academy and theater director for Prep and Villa. A group of 58 of us flew earlier this week to Prague and after a few days there are doing a Viking River cruise to Paris. Our stops in Germany will give us an opportunity to visit some of the sights associated with WW II.

Speaking recently to the bishops and priests of the ultra-conservative church in Columbia, Pope Francis told them, "It is of the greatest importance that we who call ourselves disciples not cling to a certain style or to particular practices that cause us to be more like some Pharisees than like Jesus." Those in the early church who stuck so closely to the rules became "paralyzed by a rigorous interpretation and practice of that law." He went on to tell them that "we cannot be Christians who continually put up 'do not enter' signs, nor can we consider that this space is mine or yours alone. Everyone has a place, everyone is invited to find here, and among us, his or her nourishment."

St. Patrick's Parish will once again take a week to sponsor and support the Overflow Homeless Shelter. We begin on Wednesday, Jan. 31, 2018 and finish with breakfast on Wednesday, Feb. 7, 2018. I'm grateful again to Angie Kontur for her leadership in chairing the event, and we will again be looking for volunteers to staff the event as well as prepare evening meals for up to 70 people. Angie will host a meeting sometime this month to begin to organize volunteers, etc. Our January 2018 packet of envelopes will include an envelope in which you might make a donation to

help with the costs of this week. It normally costs us up to \$6,000 to host the week. We're fortunate again with our neighbors at the Russian Church of the Nativity that we are able to use their Social Center to host the week.

Work is well underway on the pipe organ. We signed the contract and made a down payment of \$130,000 to Heritage Pipe Organ so that they can begin. They are now building the new console. In about 1970 some major work was done on the pipe organ and they threw out the beautiful Victorian style console that was originally designed for the organ and replaced it with a rather bland, non -descript console. They also replaced all of the original wooden stops with metal ones. The experts, including our own Mark Alloway, tell me that all of that detracts from the original design. As such, we're going back to the original design. The new console matches the woodwork in church and has wooden stops. Mark has been working closely with Organ Supply of Erie in selecting all of the material.

A great deal of the work on the organ will be done prior to Christmas so that, when we shut it down immediately after Christmas, they can bring that completed work in and assemble it. We will have to remove some pews in the back of church so that we can get a lift in to take things up to the balcony and bring other things down. There will be some inconvenience but not that much.

Once all of this work is completed, we're going to re-carpet the balcony as it is badly in need of it. I suspect the carpet is probably 30 or 40 years old. Up to fifty or sixty people sit in the balcony for the weekend Masses. I think they do that because I can't see clearly if they are dozing off during the homily.


Registration is open for Family Fest '17
