

Today is the Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Naaman was a commander of

the army of the King of Aram, highly respected and valued even though he was a leper. Having heard there was a prophet in Israel, the Aramean king sent a letter to the king of Israel that he cure Naaman. The Israeli king is filled with fear knowing he has no control over life and death, and sees the request as an excuse for a war. When Naaman met Elisha, the prophet told him to wash in the Jordan seven times, but Naaman's arrogance said the rivers in his country were better than those in Israel. Finally, his servants convinced him and he was cured. Not only was he healed, but his arrogance gave way to humble acceptance of Israel's God.

The Second Reading opens and closes with succinct affirmations of faith. The first one is a short presentation of Paul's own gospel that expresses the core of Christian faith: Jesus Christ raised from the dead. Christ, a descendant of David, is the anointed one who brings to fulfillment all of God's promises. Paul sees his imprisonment as a sharing in the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus. Paul's second affirmation of faith. a trustworthy saying, is a poetic verse with the feel of a liturgical hymn and was probably used at baptism. As Paul does elsewhere, he inserts the hymn into his instructions, drawing on what his audience already knows to reinforce his own teaching. The believers' immersion into Christ's death and resurrection in baptism means that they have died with him and are risen to new life. The remaining verses tell people how they are to live: in perseverance and fidelity.

In the first reading Naaman was a single foreign leper. In the gospel we read today, ten lepers are cured. Having traveled through Samaria and Galilee, Jesus meets these lepers in an unnamed village. While Jews and Samaritans did not associate with one another, their disease groups them together. They stand apart from Jesus as they

cry out to him. Jesus' response resonates with Namaan and Elisha—both tell the lepers to go away for their cleansing. And, like Naaman, the Samaritan, a foreigner, is the one to offer thanks. This story is only found in Luke and it develops several important Lukan themes: the role of Jesus as a powerful prophet; the merciful action of God present in Jesus; the praise and thanks due to God; and the inclusion of foreigners in God's saving deeds.

During the month of October each year, every Catholic parish in the United States does what is called the October count. We count the number of people attending each Mass and the number receiving communion and then report those figures to the diocese. Not only does the diocese use the information to track Mass attendance but the information is also shared with the National Conference of Catholic Bishops who are then able to better monitor attendance trends throughout the country.

A group of us recently did a three-day trip to Montreal and then an additional three days in Quebec City. Both are beautiful cities and well worth a visit. Each contain some magnificent churches, some of which are huge. This area was a longtime stalwart of Catholicism and yet today less than ten percent of Catholics in this area attend Mass. These huge magnificent churches sit practically empty on weekends.

A new study reveals that the average age at which a male college graduate gets married is age 29.8. The average age for a female college graduate is 27.8. In 1960, the average are for a male was 22.8 and 23.3 for a female. Interestingly, in 1890, the average age for a male was 26.1 ad for a female 22. The marriage rate among American Catholics (52% of all adults) was close to that of the overall U. S. population (48% of all adults). The survey also found that among adults, ages 40 to 59, Catholics had an average of 2.3 children, only slightly above the average of 2.1 children for all U. S. adults in that age range.

Another interesting figure in the report is that 58 percent of the bachelor and masters degrees awarded in the United States go to women who now are attaining higher education than men.

We are now in the Faith Formation stage of Pastoral Planning for the diocese. This is why the get -together that Jim & Julie Fetzner extended an invitation to young couples and their children to come together and share their faith is so important. On November 7 from 6:30—8 PM, the Faith Formation office of the diocese will host an informational meeting at St. James Place (directly across from St. James Church on Buffalo Road). The meeting will attempt to inform people how we can form faith formation in our individual parishes. If anyone in the parish would be interested in attending, please contact me and I will put you on the list. Each parish is asked to bring 5—7 people.

We are now at the stage where we can compile some figures on our September Irish Festival. It was certainly the most successful to date. Our revenue was up almost \$10,000 over last year and the crowds were even larger than last year. We never had crowds like we had on Saturday night this year. And when we closed at 10:30 there were probably 150 people still standing around talking in front of the church. The most staggering figure of all is the number of people who were here. Last year we had about 11,000 and this year we were close to 13,000!!!! That is incredible particularly when you realize that Erie has less than a hundred thousand people. Two of the entertainers brought people from Cleveland, Pittsburgh, etc. and we will continue to book these groups as they were a definite draw. Our only drawback is that we need younger people to volunteer to help. Our volunteers are getting older and it's difficult for them to keep this pace.
