



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time. We hear first from a poem by the prophet Isaiah which opens



with a scene of glad feasting on the mountain, most likely referring to Jerusalem, the symbolic locale of God's abiding presence. God sets a plentiful table for all people and following that image is one that depicts God's ability to destroy. The power that the Lord of hosts manifests, however, does not bring rampant ruin for God destrovs only that which inhibits life and wholeness. The veil which is first destroyed is imagined as ignorance of God or as illusions that confuse and divide people. When we read that the Lord wipes away tears from every face, we can add another piece in the portrait of God: the one who acts with motherly tenderness. The poem ends on a note of hope for all God's actions are for the sake of salvation.

In the final portion of Paul's letter to the Philippians, he gives a theological reflection on his own circumstances and those of his beloved Philippian church. When he tells them that he knows how to live in humble situations and abundance, he is not speaking theoretically. Paul's knowledge comes from his personal experience, for his ministry has brought him into situations of persecution and distress as well as abundance that flows from living with Christ. Humility was not common in the Hellenistic world; humility was considered the status of a slave, indicative of subservience typical of the lower class.

The parable of the wedding feast is the final of three parables Jesus addressed to the Jewish leaders. He likens the Kingdom of heaven to a king giving a lavish banquet. The king of course is God who has planned a celebration for his Son, Jesus. The servants sent by God are the prophets of Israel. Two times God sent out the invitation, clearly expecting people to come to the feast. The first time, people simply refused. At the second invitation, we hear more specifics about their declining: too distracted, too occupied.

From the Pastor's Desk continued...

Refusing the king for such a paltry reason is bad enough, but the worst is killing the messengers, the prophets sent by God. The king then invites everyone, good and bad alike. The seeming illogic of a man punished because he does not have a wedding garment may indicate righteousness, or faith or good works. In the early church's reference to baptism, not having a wedding garment meant that someone had initially responded to God's invitation (like being baptized), but did not continue life in Christ.

Celebrant of our Masses this weekend is Father Michael DeMartinis, chaplain at Villa Maria Academy and theater director for Prep and Villa. A group of us have done a Viking River cruise from Prague to Paris and will return home on Tuesday. I'm grateful to my good friend, Michael, for his willingness to cover the parish while I'm gone. Mike is one of the finest priests we have and spends most of his ministry working with young people. His Sunday evening Mass for young people at Blessed Sacrament fills the church each week and not one parent has to force their children to attend; they can't wait to go.

As part of his reform of the church, Pope Francis is transferring some authority away from Rome to the local bishops conferences. Too many times everything has to go to Rome for approval and they are not close enough to the local scene to know what needs to be done. In a recent decree he transferred the translations of the Mass back to the local bishops conferences where it belongs. Hopefully, the English speaking bishops can begin to correct this terrible translation of the Mass and scripture texts which we have been using the past several years. Pope John Paul II took the translations away from the English speaking bishops (our own Bishop Trautman was chairman of the group doing the translation), and the pope entrusted the translations to Italians for whom English was a second language. The results have been disastrous, and hopefully this can now begin to change.

St. Patrick parishioner Chip Wachter and his business partner, Jeff Kidder, have sold the former Rothrock building in downtown Erie. It has a 2 year old boiler in it, and we need to replace the boiler in the rectory (we will never get through this winter with the present one). They graciously donated the boiler to us, it fits perfect and we're all set to move it until I got the bids on moving and reinstalling it: \$28,000!!!! We can purchase a new boiler for that amount of money, and so that is what we are going to do. It's being installed sometime this month. I had budgeted \$5,000 for the installation of the used boiler, so this leaves a \$23,000 gap in the budget, but I have the money to pay for it so we're ok. The brand new boiler will cost us \$14,900 and is already installed in the rectory. It's amazing how small it is compared to the monstrous boiler which we removed. We just have to keep telling ourselves that we're dealing with hundred year old buildings and they are in constant need of repair and maintenance. Thank God there are only two of them!!!

With this work, both the church and the rectory now have entirely new electrical wiring, new plumbing, new heating, new air conditioning and new windows.

Once the pipe organ is restored, I would love to replace the carpeting up in the balcony as it is in terrible condition. During the Saturday 5 PM and the Sunday 10:30 AM Masses, a large number of people sit in the balcony, and I'm afraid of someone tripping on it. Unfortunately, the bids are in the area of \$10,000. A few Sundays ago a parishioner asked me what I was going to do about that carpet, and I told him how I would love to replace it but the cost is prohibitive. He told me to go ahead and replace it and send him the bill!!! I am so blessed with the generosity of people here at St. Patrick's.

The next project I'm going to have to face is replacing the tile that is in the back of church. If you look at it, you can see how it's terribly cracked and starting to come apart. I'll have to see what that would cost and perhaps we can make it a goal for the 2018 CSA appeal.

One Sunday morning, a mother went in to wake her son up and tell him it was time to get ready for church, to which he replied, "I'm not going." "Why not?" she asked. "I'll give you two good reasons," he said. "One, they don't like me and two, I don't like them." His mother replied, "I'll give you two good reasons why you should go to church. One, you're 59 years old and two, you're the pastor."
