Today is the Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time. While the Israelites are journeying in the desert, the Ama-



lekites wage war against them. They attacked the weak and cut off from the rear all those who lagged behind. Today's account does not focus on the Amalekites nor the weary Israelites, but on Moses. As long as Moses holds his staff up high, the Israelites will win. With the help of Aaron and Hur, Moses is able to keep his hand steady until sunset and the victory is complete. The overall theme of this story is that God accompanies the Israelites on their journey.

As Paul exhorts Timothy to remain faithful to what he has learned, he writes of two sources of their belief: Sacred Scripture and Christ Jesus. The scriptures convey the Jewish traditions through accounts of God's actions of creating and redeeming, of making covenants and remaining a powerful though unseen presence. Through all of these writings, inspired by God, the Jews learned and passed on their identity from generation to generation. Faith in Jesus opens a new way of interpreting these ancient texts. Rather than abandoning their tradition, Jews like Paul and Timothy found in them an essential means of handing on their faith in Christ. Paul encourages Timothy to be faithful even in the light of hardship, something which Paul faced, including imprisonment.

Jesus often taught in parables. At times, the meaning is given at the end or it is left to hearers to determine the significance. Today, however, the evangelist tells us ahead of time that the parable teaches Jesus' disciples the necessity of praying always. Jesus displays this in his own life, by praying at his baptism, praying in the wilderness, sometimes praying alone and at other times with his disciples. The judge in today's parable who neither "feared God nor respected human beings" sounds much like Amalek in the first reading, who also had no fear of God. The judge is not motivated by justice but because the widow

keeps bothering him. Little is said of the widow other than her persistence. It is an example of how God will secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night. The closing sentence moves the disciples to see the woman as an image of fidelity in prayer, an example they should imitate.

Now that the festival is over, we have replaced some additional sidewalk as well as the apron entrance to the east parking lot from Fourth Street. That area has badly deteriorated over the last years.

The winner of the trip to Ireland at the Irish Festival was Peggy Bly.

Speaking of the Festival, can I ask that some of the younger members of the parish consider volunteering next year. Many of our volunteers are getting older and it is more and more difficult for them to keep doing this. Last year we replaced four committee chairs, and I'm happy to tell you that all four new chairs are newer and younger members of the parish. That festival is so important to getting people into this neighborhood that I would hate to see us have to discontinue it because of a lack of volunteers. I think you would be surprised what fun the experience can be. It's an opportunity to meet new people, to see people you haven't seen in ages and an opportunity to help both the parish and the community. Bringing 13,000 people down into this neighborhood is monumental and helps dispel the image that the lower East Side is crime ridden when in reality it has become a nice place for people to live in an urban setting.

I recently had a wedding in which the only members of the wedding party were the bridal couple, the best man and the maid of honor. I have to tell you it was one of the nicest weddings—why? Because the entire focus of the wedding was on the bride and groom. Many times when a bridal couple get 5 or 10 attendants, it's hard for people to stay focused on the bridal couple. There are so many people up there that the bridal couple get lost in the shuffle. I married this bride's older sister last year and she did the exact same thing and both weddings were over the top. It's worth thinking about as you're making plans for your own wedding. The simpler the better

Unfortunately, we have a water leak in the church. It is above the Sixth Station of the Cross and you can see how the paint is peeling. There is a vent directly above that area, and I suspect that is where the water is coming in. We've had a contractor in (the man who solved our problem with the ongoing leak high on the east side of the church), and he is working on it. Once he gets it sealed, we will have to let the area sit for sometime to dry out and then it can be repaired.

UPMC Hamot has agreed to sell us a small parcel of land directly to the west of the rectory garage. It is inaccessible from their parking lot, and has been overgrown with weeds over the years. We approached them to see if we could buy the parcel and then put up a building to house all of the equipment from the festival. As we continue to purchase more and more items each year, particularly items for the kitchen so that we won't have to rent them each year, we are in more and more need of space to store them. Up until now, everything is stored in the rectory garage, but during the winter the door is up and down as the truck and snow equipment are in and out making the area damp.

I just paid our \$4,36.18 property taxes to the City of Erie. We pay taxes on the rectory, parking lot and grounds. Only the church itself is exempt.

During the month of September, our Food Pantry served 413 families which included 187 children. We distributed 10,253 pounds of food at a cost of \$311.35. Once again I did not have to take any parish monies because of your generosity.

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments -Bullying Prevention Month:

Relational bullying in unwarranted, persistent, unwelcome behavior in the form of criticism, isolation, or fabricated allegations that can damage relationships. Examples include social exclusion ("You can't be with us"), spreading rumors ("Did you hear...?"), and withholding friendship ("I won't be your friend if you...?"). Though relational bullying can often seem ambiguous to outside observers and often garners less attention than physical bullying or verbal bullying, it should not be discounted simply as normal adolescent behavior. In fact, several recent studies suggest relational bullying is more strongly related to emotional distress and teen depression than any other form of bullying.
