



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time. God's choice of Cyrus must have been a shock both to



Cyrus and Israel. Cyrus had been chosen by the pagan god Marduk, the chief god of the Babylonians, to bring peace and order. When God said he was the only God and there is no other, he took Cyrus by the hand and anointed him. This action would be shocking to the Israelites because only the Davidic kings were anointed. Cyrus did not even know God but was chosen to be his instrument to free the people from their exile in Babylon. When Cyrus allows the exiles to return to Israel, other nations will recognize the power and fidelity of the God of Israel. Thus, the royal title and authority that God gives Cyrus is not for his own sake, but for that of others. The action infers that all people, from the rising of the sun to its setting, all people from east to west, are to know that only the Lord is God.

The first words of Paul's letter tells us that Paul is not engaged in the missionary enterprise alone; he is joined by his companions, Silvanus and Timothy. They greet the community in Thessalonica warmly, affirming that the believers live "in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." At the end of the greeting, Paul also writes of the power of the Holy Spirit. Taken together, we see here one of the earliest foundations of the belief in God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. As Paul and his companions recall the reasons for their gratitude, we hear another important triad: faith, love and hope. The salutation also reminds the church at Thessalonica that they—and Paul—have not lived under easy circumstances but in the midst of their affliction, they have endured in hope.

Today's gospel is the first of four controversies in which Jesus' adversaries question him about the Law, belief and behavior. After Jesus finishes his teaching in parables to some of his harshest critics, the Pharisees initiate their plotting against him. They plan to entrap him and they bring in the Herodians, those who supported the Roman

occupation and system of taxation, which the Pharisees disputed. Jesus would be sure to offend one side or the other when the question of taxes to Caesar was at issue. Once again Jesus turns the question back to the Pharisees and leaves them speechless.

St. Mark Seminary has 11 men enrolled this year. This includes five for the Diocese of Erie, five for the Diocese of Buffalo and one for the Diocese of Greensburg. All 11 study at Gannon University. In major seminaries, completing their last four years of theology studies, the diocese has three men at St. Mary's Seminary & University, Baltimore; and three men at St. Vincent Seminary in Latrobe. Two of those men will be ordained priests for the Diocese of Erie next June. As such, the Diocese of Erie has a total of 11 seminarians. Please pray for vocations to the priesthood so that we can keep our parishes open.

We have to replace the boiler in the rectory and some parishioners graciously offered us one that is being removed from a building which they just sold. Unfortunately, the bids to move it came in around \$27,000 and several plumbers spoke to me saying they didn't think it was a good idea because there is no guarantee that it would work properly and there is no warranty. After consulting with people in the know, we decided to buy a brand new boiler and have it installed. It's now in place and works wonderfully.

Twelve more windows were just put in the rectory, all on the second floor. This now only leaves the large windows on the stair landings that yet need to be replaced. We have spent over \$70,000 replacing the windows in the rectory, but we should notice a huge difference this winter.

There are flood lights which light up the church at night and they're on from dusk to dawn. We recently decided to put them on timers and only have them light the building from dark until midnight. Our electric bill has been out of sight, particularly in the summer months with the A/C and all of these lights going. We should notice a big difference in that bill.

We will be several more weeks before we have the final finances put together for the Irish

Festival. Without a doubt, it was by far the largest festival we've ever had. Much of that was due to the weather, but also the fact that the festival is here on the grounds of the church. I think the smartest thing we ever did was move it from Rainbow Gardens to its present location. To give you an idea of how much it was grown, when we were at Rainbow Gardens we averaged 14 kegs of beer for the entire weekend. This year we went through 71 kegs of beer!!!

We are booked for weddings for 2018, and all but two of them are parishioners. That's an indication of how much the parish has grown. We don't take reservations for 2019 until after January 1, 2018. St. Patrick's and the cathedral have more weddings than any other parishes in the diocese. In fact, the number of weddings throughout the diocese has declined sharply over the past twenty years while they have dramatically increased here and at the cathedral.

Another change that is taking place has to do with funerals as more and more families are opting to do a simply service at the funeral home rather than come to church for a funeral Mass. In many cases, none of the children are attending Mass any longer, and so they opt not to have one. So many times at a wedding or a funeral, I will say, "The Lord be with you," and the only person who answers is the cantor. No one in church knows what the responses are any more. We're certainly living in changing times, and I'm not sure what it all means, but God's in charge.

Most of our generation of 60+ were home schooled in many ways. My mother taught me religion. "You better pray that this will come out of the carpet." My father taught me about time. "If you don't straighten up, I'm going to knock you into the middle of next week." My father also taught me logic, "Because I said so, that's why." My mother taught me foresight. "Make sure you wear clean underwear in case you're in an accident." My father taught me the circle of life. "I brought you into this world, and I can take you out." My father taught me irony. "Keep crying and I'll give you something to cry about." My mother taught me about hypocrisy. "If I told you once, I've told you a million times, don't exaggerate." And finally, my father taught me humor. "When that lawn mower cuts off your toes, don't come running to me."

Mercyhurst Preparatory School's Open House will






