



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In a lengthy section of the Book of Exodus, (20:19-23:33), the terms



of the covenant are spelled out in detail. Included are the proper way to worship and revere God. civil and criminal laws and other exhortations about how to live in covenant relationship. Fundamental is the idea that as God acts toward them, they are to act toward one another. Today's reading singles out the alien, the widow and the orphan, the most vulnerable in society. They had little and perhaps their cloak was the only thing they could offer in payment of a debt. The debt collector could take it from them during the day, but had to return it to them at night. since the cloak was the only thing they had to protect them from the night chill. When the people of Israel were aliens, God heard their cry and rescued them. He will now also hear the cry of the oppressed, the widows, the orphans and the poor.

Paul notes that the faith of the church at Thessalonica is based on Jesus and he strives to imitate the life pattern of Jesus. Paul and his companions, along with the Thessalonians and other believers, transmit the faith by being living examples to others, maintaining joy and hope even in the midst of suffering. Both Paul and the believers in Thessalonica received the Word amidst affliction and suffering. Yet those troubles did not cast them down. The joy that is characteristic of Paul in this letter is also part of the Thessalonian's faith.

In an episode between last week's gospel and this week's, Jesus was in controversy with the Sadducees, who did not believe in resurrection. Jesus provided them with an innovative interpretation of the Torah that supports belief in the resurrection, thereby silencing them. The Pharisees, who shared Jesus' belief in the resurrection, have approved of his answer. When one of them asks which commandment is the greatest, he could be asking a sincere question because it was a

subject of debate among the rabbis. Matthew, however, comments that the scholar is testing Jesus. His answer brings together two positive commandments of the Torah that describe the right relationship with God and neighbor.

Wednesday is the Feast of All Saints, a holyday of obligation. Our Mass will be celebrated at 12 noon in the main church. Thursday is the Feast of All Souls, and throughout the month of November we will remember the dead in a particular way in prayer. All of the names of deceased family and friends which you submitted will be placed on the altar for the month of November and each of them remembered in our Masses.

Next weekend we will pause after Communion to remember all who have been buried from St. Patrick's this past year. Of the 32 funerals we had this past year, only 12 of them were parishioners. The rest were people who didn't belong to a parish, others who were baptized and married here and always told their children they wanted to be buried from St. Patrick's, etc. I'm certainly not going to refuse anyone a request to have a funeral here.

The more amazing statistic is that we had 53 baptisms and 12 deaths during the past year. That is an amazing statistic. Unfortunately, in most of our parishes today, it is the reverse. One priest told me that he had no marriages, 4 baptisms and 62 funerals last year!

Tim NeCastro, CEO of Erie Insurance, recently gave a presentation to the Manufacturers and Business Association of Erie concerning future plans for the redevelopment of downtown Erie. You could feel the excitement in the room grow as he went through what is happening. He also said something that I have longed to hear, and I think I'm quoting him directly when he said, "If you want to make a good investment, invest in the lower eastside or the lower west side as that's where it's all going to happen!" And St. Patrick's sits right in the middle of it. If you were to take a drive through the lower east side from French to Parade Street you will see how much of it has been cleaned up and in many cases dilapidated houses demolished and green space added.

Now that Gannon University has taken the initiative on the lower west side, we're beginning to see similar results in that neighborhood. The new code enforcement in the city has been controversial, but it is badly needed. Since that program began to be implemented, you see people fixing up their homes everywhere you look. Several homes have been demolished now on the lower west side and that will continue. They are working with a much larger footprint than we worked on in the lower east side, though efforts are now moving east of Parade Street and will eventually go all the way to Reed Street. On the lower west side, they are working in an area from Peach St. to Cranberry Street and from the Bayfront south to West 12th Street. On the lower east side, we are only going as far south as East Sixth Street. That will eventually expand in the future.

Christmas is going to be a nightmare this year with it falling on Monday. I'll start with Masses on Saturday evening, Sunday morning, Sunday evening and Monday morning. I'm not looking forward to that marathon.

The new Saint Patrick's Haven on East Twelfth and German Street is set to open very soon. That haven takes in 27 homeless men each night and gives them a shower, warm bed, snacks and then they leave in the morning and go to the Upper Room where volunteers serve them a hot breakfast, the Bishop's Breakfast, sponsored by Catholic Charities and funded through the Catholic Services Appeal. St. Patrick's Haven was originally established by Sister Mary Fromknecht, SSJ when she was on the staff here. It has been housed in a building on East Twelfth St. until now. The facility is now under the care and sponsorship of the Sisters of St. Joseph.






Cathedral Prep and Villa Maria Academy present *Peter and the Starcatcher*


