

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time. Elijah goes to the city of Carephath, a Phoenician cap-



ital eight miles south of pagan Sidon, known for its exports, including wine, grain and oil. The prosperous city is suffering from a severe drought. Just as God ordered the ravens to feed Elijah a few verses earlier, so here he calls a foreigner to feed him. Although she doesn't know it, this widow is God's instrument for salvation, so she stands in contrast to another important woman, Jezebel, the princess who married King Ahab and propagated worship of the pagan god Baal in Israel. The widow who feeds Elijah is at the point of death from famine. Yet this widow, who has nothing to spare in a land devastated by drought, has limited provisions and God assures her that they will not fail her until he sends rain. Thus God's word spreads to a foreign territory. Later Jesus will offer the widow as an example that God freely gives blessings and gifts and not necessarily to persons who suppose they have rights and privileges.

This reading from Hebrews stressed how the sacrifice of Christ is once and for all. In the first place, Christ did not enter a human-made holy place; he entered God's presence. Second, he entered the divine presence not for his own sake but to open the door and intercede for us. Had Christ been one of the high priests he would have had to repeat his sacrifice endlessly, but he offers the single sacrifice of himself as the final atonement for sin. Just as death is the single act that ends a person's life, so Christ's offering of himself for all is the sacrifice that once and for all achieved redemption.

Jesus censures the scribes and Pharisees for their quest for honor. He also accuses them of exploiting widows financially. Because the care of widows and orphans in Jewish society was of paramount concern, the second charge is serious. Mark contrasts the scribes' behavior with that of a widow who donates to the Temple.

Her monetary gift amounts to practically nothing, but it is all she owns and its value in God's eyes is far greater than the donations of wealthy people.

Celebrant of our Masses this weekend is Father Jason Mitchell. Father Mitchell teaches at Gannon University and helps out on weekends at St. Peter's Cathedral.

We recently presented Morgan and Kathy Jacox a photo album which traced the restoration of the pipe organ from the day it began until the day it was finished. The album contains pictures and an explanation of what is taking place. The photos and the compilation of the album was done by Tom Golab.

You might notice the bronze plaque near the entrance to the balcony stairs that indicates the role of Morgan and Kathy Jacox in restoring our hundred year old pipe organ.

During the month of November, the names of all the deceased whom you wish particularly remembered in Masses is placed on the altar and those people are remembered in each Mass celebrated here.

During the recent Synod of Bishops in Rome, a Belgian bishop called for married clergy. He said that the idea has the backing of all of the Belgian bishops, and he further asked that next year's Synod of Bishops address the issue. Next year's Synod will be on Amazonia and new pathways for the church. Several bishops and theologians in the Amazon region have advocated allowing married clergy.

We are in need of additional lectors for the weekend Masses. If anyone is interested, please contact the parish office. Someone will meet with you, explain your role, etc. You may have noticed that we have two young girls who are serving as lectors, and who do a beautiful job with it. If any other young person would be interested in being a lector, please contact us and someone will meet with you and see if you're able to do it.

We also have a need for additional Eucharistic Ministers. Several of our Eucharistic Ministers

and lectors go to Florida for the winter months and it puts a real strain on the ones who remain here. (And note that none of them ever offer to take the pastor along!!) Again, if you are interested in helping in this way, contact the office and someone will meet with you and train you. Again I extend an offer for this to our younger people. Once you are confirmed, you are able to be a Eucharistic Minister.

Everyone seems to be enjoying the recently restored Jacox Memorial Pipe Organ. You may recall that there was one section of pipes that were never installed in the organ when it was first built in 1906. The pipe organ at St. Andrew's hasn't played in over 40 years and would need extensive and expensive repairs to be able to do so again. That pipe organ—also built by the Tellers Organ Company of Erie—has that section of pipes and we have purchased them. They are still at St. Andrew's but will be moved to Organ Supply, be restored and then installed in our pipe organ. It will probably be next year before they are finally installed as they all have to go to Organ Supply and be completely rebuilt.

We recently hosted an Anointing Service to give the Sacrament of the Sick to the elderly, those with chronic illness, etc. There were four priests here—and only about 30 people!! I'm not sure why but there simply were very few people, but it is still worth doing. I'm going to write in the bulletin that anyone wanting the Sacrament can catch me after Mass and I will administer it or I can come to your home and administer the sacrament. Remember we no longer have Last Rites. That was a medieval concept changed by Vatican II.
