



From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary time and our first reading from Wisdom is part of an exhortation to



kings and magistrates. In this book as in other wisdom literature (Proverbs, The Song of Songs and Sirach), wisdom is portrayed as a woman. Here, she is "resplendent and unfading," signaling a perennial beauty. While at times she seems hidden, those who seek her can readily find her. She is sitting at the gate, but will be missed by those who are not attentive. When the many passages presenting Wisdom are brought together, her portrait comes very close to that of God. In today's passage, the author begins a sketch of her that will be more fully drawn in the subsequent chapters of the book.

Some people have no hope. In his letter to the Thessalonians, Paul explains why believers should not be counted among hopeless people who grieve over those who have fallen asleep. Paul is not referring to the natural sadness that people feel when a loved one dies; that loss is real and painful. The hopelessness that concerns Paul comes from thinking that death is the end; there is nothing beyond our earthly existence. He reminds us that hope is founded on our faith in Jesus' death and resurrection. He also emphasizes that Jesus will come again. The Thessalonians were afraid that those who died before Jesus comes again would be left out. Their concern is not only for those who have already fallen asleep but for themselves as well. Paul tells them that those who die before his Second Coming will be the first to rise.

The parable in today's gospel is taken from Jesus' final discourse in Matthew's gospel. Its focus is on the last things, particularly God's final judgment, which will mean condemnation for the wicked and salvation for the just. In this part of his long discourse, Jesus uses parables that explain how believers should live in the present age as they await the second coming of Christ. The scenario comes from the first century Palestinian

custom of the bride going in procession with attendants to meet the bridegroom and share in the wedding banquet. The sufficient "oil" that everyone should have represent all the good works, such as mercy and justice and faithfulness. Those who do not possess these virtues can be expected to be excluded from the great wedding banquet.

Celebrant of our Masses this weekend is Father Michael DeMartinis, chaplain at Villa Maria Academy and theater director at Prep and Villa.

I'm thrilled to tell you that the chairperson for our Irish Festival for 2018 and 2019 is going to be Eric Albright. Eric and Lisa have been parishioners at St. Patrick's for over 8 years, have volunteered at past festivals and now Eric is going to step up and assume the leadership. Gary and Becky Johnson have done an outstanding job in that role the past two years, and they have very generously offered to work closely with Eric to teach him the ropes as we continue to make the festival larger and better every year. It's almost unbelievable what Gary and Becky have done for the festival. They greatly expanded it, tightened things up and brought real class to the event. I can never thank them enough for what they did. Now Eric and succeeding chairs can continue to build on that momentum. We will host a meeting of chair people after the first of the year, and you will have a chance to meet Eric if you do not already know him.

I've tried to explain this before, but we're running into a dilemma with our wedding schedule. The parish has grown considerably in the past five years. In the past, we have welcomed nonparishioners to have their weddings here and have really gone out of our way to welcome and accommodate them. However, we're now finding that, in some instances, a parishioner calls to schedule a wedding, and the date has already been taken by a non-parishioner. To help with this dilemma, we are going to limit weddings to people who have been active parishioners for one year prior to scheduling a date. I really don't like to do this, but we have a responsibility first to the families who are parishioners and who support the parish. I don't like turning people away, but we're—along with the cathedral—the two

most popular venues for weddings in the entire diocese.

Tim NeCastro, CEO of Erie Insurance, informed some of us recently that the work of the Erie Downtown Development Corporation is quickly moving ahead with plans to revitalize the area from Perry Square north to 3rd Street between Holland and Sassafras Streets. They are in the process of recruiting a CEO and hope to have that person on board by year's end. They have been meeting with potential investors (remember that this entire project will be financed by private investment). Their goal for the first phase of funding is between \$20 and \$40 million in the fund and at least \$1 million for EDDC operations. He noted that "I'm confident that we'll achieve our funding goals." This is an exciting moment to finally restore and bring back to life the core of our inner city. And the added good news is that St. Patrick's sits right in the middle of the entire project. It's an exciting time.

Poor Pope Francis must feel sometimes that there are days he just can't win. During an Oct. 1 trip to Bologna, Italy, he dined with 20 prisoners from a local drug rehabilitation facility, along with refugees and the poor of the area. Sometime during the lunch two of the Italian prisoners used the opportunity to escape, and they have yet not been found!!!

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On the weekend of November 18-19, parishes in our Diocese will be taking up a special collection for the "Catholic Campaign for Human Development" (CCHD). In the United States, more than 46 million people are living in poverty. The CCHD is an anti-poverty program to help them find hope and a way to a more secure life. Support offered through this collection reaches those living on the margins and gives them a hand up, not a hand out.

For example, around Charleston, South Carolina, many children live in poverty, creating undue stress and uncertainty in their lives. Compounding these problems, deteriorating school systems struggle to provide quality education and appropriate discipline, and there is a high rate of school-based arrests. By engaging congregations and communities all over the city, the Charleston Area Justice Ministry is working to improve the education system, and keep kids in school and out of the juvenile justice system. With your support of the CCHD Collection, the Charleston Area Justice Ministry is able to provide community engagement to reduce youth arrests and violence.

Each year, nearly half of the funds raised in our diocese from this collection remain here in the Diocese of Erie to fund local anti-poverty projects. We have been able to use our Diocesan share of this collection to provide children and adults with food, clothing, shelter, medical assistance and counseling.


