

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, the last Sunday in Ordinary Time.
Malachi's prophecy opens



with a terrifying image. When the Israelites envisioned this type of a day of the Lord, they looked at how other countries would be punished. Malachi, however, issues a sharp indictment against the Israelites, the people of the covenant who have acted corruptly and have not kept the faith of their ancestors. He speaks of how the priests did not lead the people in proper worship, but his indictment extends beyond the priests, for the people have abandoned the requirements of the Torah: the have defrauded widows and orphans, have turned away the stranger and do not fear the Lord. But the final verse of today's reading offers hope with the dawning of a new day for those who repent.

The Second Letter to the Thessalonians was composed by Paul, Silvanus and Timothy. As Jesus worked tirelessly in proclaiming the kingdom of God, Paul and his coworkers also labored day and night. Presenting themselves as a model to imitate, they encouraged each member of the community to conduct themselves in a like manner. The instruction was needed because Paul had heard that some were acting in a disorderly manner. He calls them "busybodies," people who were not kept busy but were instead meddling in the affairs of others.

With the temple of Jerusalem in the background, Jesus addresses the people for the final time before his passion. He begins by telling them that the temple will be destroyed. Without specifying a time, he says the "days will come," reminiscent of Malachi's writing of the Day of the Lord. Like Malachi, he speaks of a time of devastation and turmoil. This talk is often referred to as his eschatological discourse; eschatology treats of events that are connected with the "end," sometimes dealing with the fate of individuals, but more broadly with God's final, triumphant concerning of evil and the vindication of the just. temple was destroyed in the year 70, Jesus' words carry the same note of being faithful to the end, enduring the suffering that will come to Jesus' followers.

A new study by the Pew Research Center notes that "the religious landscape of the United States continues to change at a rapid clip." The recent study shows that "in 2019, 65% of American adults describe themselves as Christians when asked about their religion, down 12 percentage points over the past decade. Meanwhile, the religiously unaffiliated share of the population, consisting of people who describe their religious identity as atheist, agnostic or nothing in particular, now stands at 26%, up from 17% in 2009."

Both Protestantism and Catholicism are experiencing losses of population. Currently, 43% of U. S. adults identify with Protestantism, down from 51% in 2009. And one in five adults (20%) are Catholic, down from 23% in 2009. Self-described atheists now account for 4% of U. S. adults, up modestly but significantly from 2% in 2009; agnostics make up 5% of U. S. adults, up from 3% a decade ago, and 17% of Americans now describe their religion as "nothing in particular," up from 12% in 2009.

The data shows that just like rates of religious affiliation, rates of religious attendance are declining. Over the last decade, the share of Americans who say they attend religious services at least once or twice a month, dropped by 7 percentage points, while the share who say they attend religious services less often (if at all) has risen by the same degree. In 2009, those who attend services at least once a month outnumbered those who attend by a 52%-47% margin. Today these figures are reversed; more Americans now say they attend religious services a few times a year or less (54%) than say they attend at least monthly (45%).

More than eight in ten members of the generation born between 1928 and 1945 describe themselves as Christians (84%) as to three quarters of Baby Boomers (76%). In stark contrast, only half of the Millennials (49%) describe themselves as Christians; four in ten are religious nones and one in ten Millennials identify with non-Christian

faith. These are profoundly basic changes in religious behavioral attitudes. The change for Catholics began in 1968 with the publication of *Humani* Vitae, the birth control encyclical. While the subject was being studied by a commission, a large majority of Catholics made up their mind that they would practice it according to their conscience, and not necessarily what the church taught. When the 80 member commission issued its report to Pope Paul VI, 74 of the members felt the church teaching could be changed. Only six of the members dissented, and Pope Paul VI chose their conclusion. The report was leaked to the media and Catholics came to their own conclusion. Within months after the encyclical was issued, Mass attendance among American Catholics dropped from 75% to 45%.

And, finally, Catholics no longer constitute a majority of the U. S. Hispanic population. In 2019, 47% of Hispanics describe themselves as Catholic, down from 57% a decade ago. Meanwhile, the share of Hispanics who say they are religiously unaffiliated is now 23%, up from 15% in 2009.

Several people have asked me if it is possible to add an additional speaker or two in the back of church as people say they have trouble hearing in the back. I've met with the company that installed the sound system when we restored the church in 2012 and they are exploring the possibility of doing that. Hopefully we can accommodate this request, and I will keep you posted.

UPMC Hamot has presented us with two options for the parcel of land that we are seeking from them. One is to purchase it outright and the other is to lease it. I'm meeting with the Parish Finance Council to see which option they would prefer. It might make more sense to purchase it outright rather than paying \$150 per month for leasing the property.
