

Today is the Feast of Christ the King, the last Sunday of the church year. Next Sunday is the first Sunday of Advent



and the beginning of a new church year. Next year we will read our gospels from Luke, my favorite evangelist. Today, the Book of Daniel was written in the second century BC to fortify and comfort Jews being forced to accept Greek religious practices. It includes stories and visions, a hallmark of apocalyptic literature. Today's vision is a forerunner of the Book of Revelation, a way to envision the end time, especially Christ's Second Coming. We are introduced to the term, the Son of man, a title that later Christian writers would assign to Jesus.

This reading is the last part of the greeting near the beginning of the Book of Revelation-a greeting addressed to the seven churches with whom John is sharing his vision. He commends them to the peace of Christ and then lists Christ's attributes. The phrase, "ruler of the kings of the earth" introduces the notion of Christ's sovereignty, central to the book. The rulers of the earth oppose God's rule until either the King of Kings defeats them or they are converted. In today's reading, Christ's redemptive work is understood in terms of a new exodus. The reference to his blood and piercing evoke the Passover lamb whose sacrifice resulted in the exodus from Egypt. The final phrase, the alpha and the omega, invoke the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. The reference to the Creator who precedes all things and the Lord who will bring all things to fulfillment.

In the gospel, Jesus accepts the title King of the Jews but with a specific meaning: his royal dignity comes from his Father who sent him to testify to the truth. The title is similar to that of a shepherd to whom the sheep listen. Pilate sees the King of the Jews as a conspirator against the empire, while the Jews see the Messiah king as the political-religious liberator who would free a foreign dominated state. But Jesus' kingdom is a reign of truth and justice.

#### From the Pastor's Desk continued...

In one of his recent daily Mass homilies, Pope Francis warned against being rigid with faith. He noted that the Pharisees were rigid, not open to change. "But always, under or behind rigidity, there are problems, grave problems," said the pope. He noted that they appear to be good Christians, "we intend to appear a certain way, we put make-up on our souls, but behind these appearances, there are problems. Jesus is not there. The spirit of the world is there." He then concluded, "And let us be careful with ourselves because this should lead us to consider our own life. Do I seek to look only at appearances, and not change my heart? Do I not open my heart to prayer, to the liberty of almsgiving, the liberty of works of mercy?"

New data shows that an increasing number of babies worldwide are born to unmarried parents. The data, compiled by the United Nations, shows that 40 percent of U.S. children born in 2016 had unmarried parents. That is more than double the percent of U.S. children born with unmarried parents in 1980 and 10 percentage points higher than in 1990. In other countries the percentage is even higher. In 2016, 60 percent of French babies were born with unmarried parents. An exception is Russia where the children born to unborn parents has dropped to 22 percent and the abortion rate has also fallen dramatically. In Japan, 98 percent of Japanese babies were born to married parents. The study also shows that 37 percent of homes with children headed by a single parent were in poverty.

The number of women religious in the United States has declined from nearly 200,000 in 1965 to just 47,000 in 2016. A new report notes that the situation is different in Africa and Asia, but in the United States and Europe "religious institutes of women are likely to disappear in the next few decades. Several hundred orders of nuns are about to become extinct." It also notes that 77 percent of women religious are over the age of 70. As many as 300 of the 425 religious institutes in the United States are in their last decades of existence because of aging membership and declining vocations. The report notes that the Reformation brought about the death of most religious communities but also the birth of new ones. It states that we are living in a similar period-the old church as we have known it is passing away and a new one is yet to be born. Who knows what form religious life will take in that new church.

Fifty-one percent of Dutch people over 15 years of age do not belong to any church or to any religion whatsoever. Seventy-eight percent of Dutch people have never attended a church service in their lives. Among Dutch Catholics, only 6 percent attend Mass regularly.

The number of Catholics in the world grew by 14 million between 2015 and 2016. As of 2016 about 1.3 billion of the world's 7.35 billion people identified as Catholic. Even though there were millions of new Catholics, the global population of Catholics fell by .05% due to the number of deaths and conversions to other faiths. Europe showed the slowest rate of growth among all continents for the third straight year while Africa recorded the biggest increase with 6 million new Catholics in 2016. Worldwide, the average ratio of priest to Catholics is 3,130 faithful per priest. Europe lost 2,500 priests this past year. The total number of diocesan priests in Europe dropped for the fourth year to 53,000 and nearly 11,000 women left religious communities. The report, out of the Vatican, showed that diocesan seminarians continue to decline with Africa, again, being the only exception to the rule.

Wednesday morning the weather was too bad to play golf. I was bored with nothing to do. Suddenly there was a knock on the door. I opened it to find a young, well dressed man standing there who said, "Good morning. I'm a Jehovah's Witness." So I said, "Come in and sit down." I offered him a cup of coffee and asked, "What do you want to talk about?" He said, "Beats the heck out of me. Never got this far before."
