

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the First Sunday of Advent and the beginning of the new church year. This year we will read our gospels



from Luke, my very favorite evangelist. Luke wrote in about the year 85 and addressed his gospel to Roman citizens living in present day Turkey. His audience were not the wealthy and the powerful, but people who struggled, were poor and largely marginalized. Luke gives us the all-forgiving Jesus (his last words on the cross are "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do.") Luke either knew Mary personally or knew someone who knew her because his gospel tells us more about Mary than all of the other gospels combined. Luke is the only author to tell us the story of Jesus born in a manger with shepherds, etc. He's the great story teller who alone gives us poignant stories such as the Prodigal Son, the Good Samaritan, etc. Luke's Jesus is totally powerless and therein lies his power. I ask you to listen carefully to Luke this year and you will gain a new insight into Jesus.

Our first reading presents a text framed in a prophecy for the material and spiritual renewal of Jerusalem, devastated by the long siege by Babylon. The reader feels the tension between the routine of our daily life and the hope for a resolution of all stress in God's plan for humanity. Ever faithful, God does not renege on the promise to grant David a descendant, the Messiah, who "shall do what is right and just in the land."

The second reading begins with a prayer. Paul desires a mature, fraternal love, open to everyone, that would be the finest preparation to meet the Lord when he comes. To live in expectation of his coming does not imply a flight from everyday reality. Paul instead invites us to conduct ourselves in a way pleasing to God.

Today's gospel is part of a discourse about the end of time and the Last Judgment. Jesus announces his return to our world and how we are scheduled to meet him. He borrows images from

the prophets: the signs in the sun, moon and stars; the roar of the sea; the anguish that anticipates his arrival. Jesus asks his audience to live in patient expectation when he says their redemption is at hand. The Latin word he uses for redemption, redemptio, can also be translated as ransom, the buying of freedom from slavery or captivity. What do we hope for in the coming of Christ at Christmas but the liberation of our life from attitudes and unhealthy activities that enslave us in the present. It will be a moment much like the pains of child birth and the impending anguish of death. Our world must pass away before a new world can be born.

A group of ten parishioners accompanied me to a Vicariate meeting with Bishop Persico and the new head of Pastoral Planning for the diocese. We are now in stage 4 of pastoral planning. The first stage was the changes in Catholic schools, now under the direction of the diocese rather than individual parishes. The second stage was the consolidation of parishes with the merging of some into others. The third stage focused on vocations to the priesthood, and, ironically, given the recent Grand Jury report, the number of seminarians for our diocese increased significantly this past year. We are now in stage four: Faith Formation, perhaps the most vital of all stages.

The year 2019 will be focused on "welcoming and belonging" to the church. Parishes are asked to identify one thing they do or would like to do to make people feel welcome in the parish. We cited the dinners which we host at the rectory for all of the bridal couples. We felt this move makes them feel more welcome in the parish. We were also asked to identify one area where the parish is helping people "belong" to the parish. In this area we cited the Volunteer Appreciation Night which we host every Mardi Gras at the Yehl Room at Gannon University. Last year we had over 150 people attend with an open bar and heavy hors d'oeuvres. It is our small way of thanking people for sharing their time and talents and hopefully making them feel even more that they belong to the parish. Some of the members noted the way people stand around and talk after the weekend Masses, noting that in other parishes they run to the parking lot to get out of there as fast as they can. We're also going to explore what we can do

to make new parishioners feel welcome. I send each new parishioner a welcome letter along with a brochure on the church, but we want to explore if there is more we can do. And, finally, we are going to have name tags made for Greeters, Ushers and Eucharistic Ministers thinking it will help us get to know one another better.

Each of the next four years will focus on some aspect of faith development. Year two will focus on our teaching the faith to people of all ages, not just our school children. Year three will focus on Sacramental preparation, how do we encounter Christ in the sacraments and worship. And the final year will focus on service, witnessing to our faith through acts of charity and justice.

Another aspect of the evening was to implement a plan to have trained professionals in various aspects of faith formation. The diocese was called upon to develop standards for the selection, hiring and training of leaders who will then assist parishes. This process should help maintain a consistent faith formation throughout the entire diocese.

We already have much of this process in place. We have sacramental preparation for baptisms, First Communion and Confirmation; we try to have a Scripture class during Lent to help people better understand the scriptures. When it comes to service, I have always said that I have never been in a parish with as profound a social conscience as I experience here. We have more volunteers for the Food Pantry than we can handle, we have a full cadre of volunteers for the Homeless Shelter which we host every February; our parishioners volunteer at St. Patrick's Haven, Emmaus Soup Kitchen, the Neighborhood Art House, St. Martin's Center, etc.

A senior citizen recently shared some wise guidelines for dealing with old age. "Death is the number one killer in the world." "Good health is merely the slowest possible rate at which one can die." "Health nuts are going to feel really stupid someday, lying in the hospital, dying of nothing." "All of us could take a lesson from the weather. It pays no attention to criticism." "In the 60's, people took LSD to make the world weird. Now the world is weird, and people take Prozac to make it normal."

#### Naughty or nice? Have breakfast with Santa


