

Today is the Second Sunday of Advent. Baruch consoles Jerusalem with the news that her children will return, that



the dream of restoration is coming true. Jerusalem is invited to take off her robe of misery and adorn herself with the splendor of God. In language reminiscent of Isaiah, God commands "that every lofty mountain be made low," a reference to the excesses of pride, arrogance and materialism. He also states that the valleys will be filled, a reference to the shortage of justice and obedience to God.

Paul opens his letter with thanksgiving, and the dominant note is friendship between the apostle and his community. He writes that charity is the most effective instrument for infusing meaning in life. Paul reassures the Philippians that God will bring to fruition the work in them and us.

Luke speaks ironically when he lists the superstars of Jesus' time: Caesar Tiberius, Pontius Pilate, Herod and his brother Philip, etc. and then reports that the Word of God arrived in a secluded place to an unexpected person, John, son of Zechariah. It is not to the commercial centers that this takes place, but God's Word arrived in the desert. The evangelist sketches a tension between two poles: wealth and power contrasted with seclusion. In both places, God's Word risks not being heard-in the noise of politics and commerce for its lack of attention, but also in the austere desert, for its lack of audience. The encounter with God does not happen apart from our daily lives. Health, happiness and integrity are not achieved by turning away from who we are, they are found in the fertile soil where God's Word takes root. It is in the fragmented projects of everyday life, where God is revealed. The call to conversion is not heard first in society, not even in the chapel at prayer, but in our everyday lives. The desert is ourselves. There the Baptist's message is received, there we prepare the way, iron out the roughness, fill in the potholes and level off the bumpy places of our character. Here, in the

everyday life, under the appearance of seemingly insignificant happenings, in our interior life, God desires to be born in each one of us.

Once again this year we have joined with St. Martin's Center for their Shining Stars program. A tree in the church was filled with stars on it listing the age and sex of a child and a gift they would love to have for Christmas. Parishioners took a star, wrapped the gift and put the star on the outside so that they know who it goes to. We had a deadline for returning the gifts. Last year we had 150 stars and a large number of people wanted one but they were all gone. This year we received 200 stars, thank you to all who helped make Christmas happy for a child whose parents can not afford to give them a gift.

The recent Synod of Bishops on Young People released its final document at the close of the October meeting. The document states that the church has a rich tradition and understanding "on which to build and from which to propose its own teaching" on the subject of sexual morality. "But young people, even those who know and live this teaching express the desire to receive a clear, human and empathetic word from the church." The document goes on to say that sexual morality is often a source of "misunderstanding and estrangement from the Church, as it is perceived as a place of judgment and condemnation." Young people value authenticity, it states, but are often disoriented by the many social changes taking place. "They express more, particularly an explicit desire for discussion on issues related to the difference between male and female identity."

The document goes on to say that "domination and discrimination based on sex offends human dignity," from which even the church needs to free itself. The document also tackles the topic of the body from the angle of sexual immorality, such as promiscuity, sexual tourism, "fascination for risky behaviors," digital pornography and the display of one's body online. "These phenomena, to which the new generations are exposed, constitute an obstacle for a serene maturation. They indicate unprecedented social dynamics, which influence personal experiences and choices, making them the territory of a sort of ideological colonization." We are going to discontinue the use of the cup at Communion until the flu season is over. We have been doing this each year to help protect people from the flu. We will most likely not resume the cup until Easter.

The superiors of 34 orders of Women Religious in Austria, Germany, Switzerland and Luxembourg met recently and are demanding more influence in the church. They are asking that women be admitted to all offices in the church. They wrote, "In the future, more women are to be included at synods of bishops-of course with voting rights. That is the only way they can influence decisions." They called for a new "culture of dialogue, of participation, and of gender equality" in the church. They also noted that the church's teaching should be adjusted to "new scientific findings in the theological and other academic disciplines." They said that an increase of qualified women in the church would bring "diversity and an enrichment on all levels."

It seems that everyone is pleased with the new doors on the front of church, the new tile in the vestibule and back of church and the new Men's Room off the vestibule. With the completion of this work, we will now complete the balcony. The center section of the balcony is going to have a wooden floor which will better reflect the sound of the pipe organ, and this area will not be open to the public. The east and west sides of the balcony will be open, but not the area in front of the organ. Once that work is done, the only thing left to do in the church is erect scaffolding and repair the little bit of damage high on the east wall of the church. That area has been dry for several years and the situation has not worsened, so we're now ready to repair it. We're exploring a variety of ways to do the balcony ranging from carpeting parts of it to putting down linoleum or putting a laminate wood floor up there. The decision depends on the condition of the present floor.


