

Today is the Third Sunday of Advent. Last week we heard Isaiah promise a renewal of land and people in Israel. In



today's reading, he presents an opposite scenario: the parched land becoming fruitful. He develops this prophecy in three stages: image of a desert transformed; direct address to God; direct address to the people, with the promise of human restoration. After he describes the land coming alive, he asks that God strengthen the people's feeble hands and weakened knees. The God who can bring about life in the desert is also able to heal whatever suffering afflicts God's own people. "Be strong, fear not," has a twofold significance: the people themselves must be strong in the face of adversity, and they should know well that God abides in them. In the third movement he announces that the blind will see, the deaf will hear, etc. Along with the land that will sing, the mute too will sing. In passages omitted from today's reading, Isaiah speaks of a highway which will open through the desert for the redeemed to walk.

The Letter of James is an extended exhortation, reading like a lengthy sermon that urges believers to persevere in the face of trials and testing. The audience, described as "the twelve tribes of the dispersion,: may refer to Jewish believers scattered throughout the Mediterranean. The overarching theme of today's reading is patience, urging specifically "until the coming of the Lord." Because we do not know when this will happen, James urges the community wait in patience. In using the analogy of the farmer, he notes that the soil must be readied to receive the rain. So too those who wait patiently are to be actively engaged in living in accord with the faith they profess. He also notes how patiently the prophets waited for God

While John the Baptist was imprisoned, he heard about Jesus' activities in Galilee. Although Matthew identified Jesus as "the Christ," John wants to know if he is indeed "the one who is to come."

From the Pastor's Desk continued...

John's earlier description of the one coming after him is one who would gather wheat into his barn and burn the chaff. This expectation seems at odds with what John is hearing of Jesus' mercy and healing. In addition to the Messiah as a judge, there were views that he would be a political or military leader. Jesus' answer presents another view: one who heals and forgives. Having replied to John's disciples, Jesus then speaks to the crowd about John. He is a desert prophet, fearless and forceful. He is the fulfillment of Malachi's ancient prophecy, the messenger who prepared the way. John is the greatest of those born of woman.

People are asking about the Christmas Mass schedule. There will be a 5 PM Vigil Mass on Christmas Eve as well as a 9 PM Vigil Mass. On Christmas Day we will have an 8 and 10:30 AM Masses. All of the Masses, with the exception of the Christmas Day 8 AM Mass will have the full choir, pipe organ, trumpet, kettle drums and a bagpiper. Be forewarned that the Christmas Eve 5 PM Mass is the largest Mass of the year. The church is usually completely full by 4:30 at the very latest. I ask that people not try to come and save seats for others. We have to allow those who come first the choice of where they want to sit for Mass.

Just a reminder that the parish office is closed on Fridays. We are open Monday—Thursday from 8 AM until 4 PM.

There will be a concert with Dan Schutte at 3 PM today (Sunday) at Our Lady of Mercy Church, Harborcreek, 837 Bartlett Road, Harborcreek. He is one of the most talented musicians in the church. The concert is open to the public at no charge.

Organ Supply is continuing to restore the pipes from the pipe organ at St. Andrew's which we purchased to add to our organ. The organ at St. Andrew's unfortunately has not been played in over 40 years, and the pipes we purchased are a section of pipes that were never installed in our pipe organ when it was built in 1906. Hopefully the pipes will be installed shortly after the first of the year. In addition, we are purchasing more pipes that were never installed and those, too, will be installed after the first of the year. When all of this work is completed, we will have the finest pipe organ in all of northwest Pennsylvania.

Bishop Persico has made plans to hold ordinations to the priesthood at St. Patrick's Church on Friday, May 29. As you know the cathedral is undergoing a four year \$4 million restoration. All of the plaster inside the building has to be replaced as paint will no longer stick to it. A large section of the cathedral has already been completed, but now the center aisle is filled with scaffolding making it impossible for them to hold weddings or the ordinations this year. It is a real privilege for St. Patrick's to be able to host the ordinations. Once the work on the building has been completed, the pipe organ has to be completely dismantled and shipped to Montreal to be rebuilt at a cost in excess of \$1 million. I always think I have problems here until I hear what other churches face. The cathedral rector, Father Michael Ferrick, is to be commended for the way he is restoring that historic building and has already done so to the rectory.

Gary & Becky Johnson are already working on some aspects of our 2020 Irish Festival. They are in the process of booking various bands for entertainment and securing some additional volunteers to chair various committees. We're hoping as we get closer to the date, that more of our young parishioners might volunteer to help. We desperately need you.

Thank you for your incredibly generous response to the Shining Stars to purchase Christmas gifts for children who otherwise might not receive anything for Christmas. We have been doing this each year through St. Martin's Center, and your response has always been amazing.


