

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Third Sunday of Advent. The prophet addresses the people affectionately with the term "daughter of Zi-



on"; and in spite of her infidelities, announces salvation. At a time when Israel felt the threat of formidable enemies and did not expect the solution to their difficulties, God promises salvation that will gladden the people. In the face of danger and struggles, God is on our side, ever ready to save us because he loves us. Zephaniah announces the end of the exile and the return from Babylon with a vibrant oracle, a joyful hymn to Jerusalem. The reasons for joy are twofold. First, God revoked the sentence of condemnation and has dispersed the enemies, and second, the Lord promises never to abandon his people.

Paul encourages the Philippians even as he challenges them. When we are kind and perform our service with a view to the good of all, we can live free from the anxiety that spoils peace and harmony. The encouragement "Have no anxiety at all" moves the church to be at peace even amidst persecution, with the guarantee that "The peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." These consoling words do not eliminate the rude drama of life, but they dismiss panic and despair. Joy reverberates throughout the whole of this letter because, as Paul says, "The Lord is near."

Announcing the urgency of conversion, John the Baptist advised his audience to show forth the fruits of a change of attitude and life. When people asked what they should do, John tells them to share everything they have with others. To government people who asked the same question, he replied, "Stop collecting more than what is prescribed." To soldiers, he advises "Do not practice extortion, do not falsely accuse anyone and be satisfied with your wages." Recognizing that the Messiah is at the door, John presses for a more compassionate, less selfish conduct. His advice astonishes us by its simplicity. Conversion will be manifested in dealing with one's neighbor,

being generous, kind and compassionate.

People are asking about the Christmas Mass schedule. On Christmas Eve, we will have two Masses: 5 PM and 9 PM. On Christmas Day we will have two additional Masses at 8 AM and at 10:30 AM. Please remember that the Christmas Eve, 5 PM Mass is always the largest Mass of the entire year. The church will be completely full by a half hour before the Mass. I ask that people not send someone from a family to hold a pew open for them. Because of the large crowd, we simply can't do that. That Mass usually has the entire church full, the balcony and a good hundred or so people standing.

Thank you for your support of the Shining Star program to provide Christmas gifts for children in Erie who would not otherwise have them. Be assured that God does not forget your care for the poor and less fortunate. It covers a multitude of our failings.

The office will close on Friday, Dec. 21, at the end of the workday and re-open Wednesday, January 2. I am here the entire time if you need anything. My private number is 454-4032. There will not be a weekday Mass or Communion Service all of that week between Christmas and New Year's.

A new Pew Research Center survey found that 1.5 million Americans say they practice Wicca or paganism, a rise from an estimated 8,000 in 1990. The report suggests that there are more self-identified "witches" in the United States than members of some mainline Protestant denominations. For example, in 2017 there were 1.4 million Presbyterians in the United States.

The Vatican has issued its annual report on the number of Catholics, etc. In 2017, Catholics numbered 1.3 billion with an increase from the previous year of 14,249,000. There were increases in America, Asia and Oceana and decreases in Africa (-0.18) and Europe (-0.11). The average number of people each priest served is 3,130. The total number of priests decreased again to 414,969. The number of Women Religious decreased everywhere except Asia. And finally, the church has 96,573 elementary schools and

47,862 secondary schools.

As part of Pastoral Planning for the Diocese, we are now in year three. The first year dealt with the consolidation of schools, the second year with the consolidation of parishes and now we begin a program of Faith Formation. The first stage in this asks parishes to examine how we welcome people and make them feel that they are part of the parish. A committee of nine people is working on this project and noted a number of things we hope are making people feel welcome. First is my greeting people before and after Mass, opening the rectory to people, having the bridal couples for dinner in the rectory, hosting cocktail parties for the chairpersons of the various programs in the parish, ie., the Irish Festival, the Homeless Shelter, etc. We also have cocktail parties for everyone who donated more than \$400 to the Catholic Services Appeal. Additional ways are the way people visit with one another before and after Mass, asking people to introduce themselves to strangers at Mass, to congratulate parents who are having a baby baptized, etc. We also noted how Anne Causgrove does the Baptismal Preparation Class one on one rather than waiting and having a large class. Mark Alloway and Jan Gervasi spend a great deal of time with bridal couples planning their liturgy, music, etc. We also distributed name tags for the Greeters, Ushers and Eucharistic Ministers which will help people know who they are.

One new idea that emerged is that we are going to try to get a small group of volunteers who will phone new parishioners about 3 months after they have joined the parish and ask them if they feel welcome, what needs are we not meeting, what can we do for them, etc. We hope this one additional step will help people feel welcome.


